"Delegates voted to affirm all three Actions of Immediate Witness (AIWs) under consideration: "Faithful Defiance of Authoritarianism, a Call to Action: Reaffirming Our Covenants for Democracy and Freedom" (98.3 percent of votes), "Funding Global LGBTIQ Freedom Amid Crisis: A Call for Immediate Action and Solidarity" (98.3 percent of votes), and "We Declare and Reaffirm: All People Have Inherent Worth and Inalienable Rights" (99.2 percent). AIWs are statements about a significant action, event, or development in the world that necessitates immediate engagement and action among UU congregations and affiliated groups.".

# **UU Florida Sunshine Cluster's CLIMATE JUSTICE REVIVAL**

On May 31, I dropped in by Zoom to our Sunshine Cluster's Climate Justice Revival. ("Sunshine Cluster" being a network of UU congregations in Florida.) Facilitator of the program was Rev. Amy Carol Webb, minister of River of Grass UU in Davie, FL (retiring). Purpose of this program was to give us time together to consider possibilities and collective future goals for Planet Earth.

Rev. Webb offered a quote "The goal of life is living in nature" (Zeno 450 BC) from <u>greenpeace.org</u>. We've been doing ecological awareness for centuries,

including the first Earth Day in 1970, but we're now in a "state of overwhelm" designed to keep us divided. Nature knows what to do, so we should align with nature, as Thoreau reminded us. There's a difference between Environmental Activism (efforts aimed at saving the earth) and Climate Justice (recognizing the impact of climate change on low income communities and communities of color around the world). Hurricane Katrina exposed the intersectionality of many injustices of those communities.

We were guided into small groups to share our ideas. Other Florida congregations with large physical spaces shared some of their climate actions such as community gardens or composting. I was proud to say that One Island Family under the leadership of Dave Arnold (also attending by Zoom), has for several years participated in a DOT Highway Cleanup program from MM14 to 16 along US 1 where a road side sign credits the "Southernmost UU Congregation" for maintaining that section of the roadside with trash and recycle clean up.

UU Clearwater works with DART to create interfaith rain gardens and "food forests" for teaching people how to grow vegetables. UU Miami has worked in their community to advocate for planting more trees in low income areas, including urban school properties. Other congregations are starting Farmers Markets on church property. Rev. Bob Murphy, who also attended by Zoom, commended efforts like community gardens that bring people together and encourage more folks to get involved.

We can expand the groups with whom we align. (Suggestions included Mutual Aid and health equity groups in low income communities, Sustainable Urban Agriculture Coalition, or university agriculture extension services.) We can look for indigenous climate action, and nurture relationships with indigenous groups. There are people and structures we can join, if we're willing to partner with others whose goals we share. Some families could use Hurricane Supply Kits (donations of essential items such as food to carry in case of evacuations) or Preparation Packs (with donated cash or gift cards for fueling vehicles.) We gain inspiration and strength from each other, so "don't give up"! We don't have all the answers, but try stuff out! What are we willing to do in the next 90 days for Climate Justice?



### ONE ISLAND FAMILY NORTH




