liked to swim in a pool when it was warmer and then roll in the dirt.

"He is just like a dog. I like him a lot. We leave the gate open and he doesn't even try to get out," Chuck said.

"He's such a sweetheart. He likes to play. I have to put on my old clothes to play with him," he said.


If they find him a good home they will just give him away. He needs a fenced-in yard out in a rural area.

"He was quite wild when we got him and he was afraid of everything," Smith said. They found him about four miles from the shelter in Wedowee.

Now he likes to play and butt people when they butt him. He has been eating and now weighs 80 to 90 pounds.

"A lot of people tell me pigs are smarter than dogs. He's plenty smart," Smith said.

Among other unusual inhabitants of the shelter are two turtles a person brought in that would be good for a young family. Turned in with them were a heating element, food and a terrarium. There will be no charge for them, but the shelter will always accept donations, he said.
