Dear brothers and sisters in Christ,

Have you ever wondered what the basic function of the church is? What is the one (1) thing God expects the church to do? The mission of the church is so easy to state that it seems obvious.

**Our mission is to help people develop a closer relationship with Jesus.**

How do we accomplish this?

**We do this by making disciples (Matthew 28) and helping neighbors in need (Matthew 25).**

At Augustus we make disciples by gathering each week at Christ-centered worship where we tell “the old, old story of Jesus and his love.” We provide a Christ-centered Sunday School where our young people from age three through fifth grade hear how much God loves them through Bible stories at an age-appropriate level. We gather on Wednesday evenings to teach First Communion and Confirmation students about the wonderful ongoing relationship God has created with them at their Baptism using Martin Luther’s *Small Catechism*. We gather on Wednesdays and Sundays to help our Senior High School youth put their faith into practice.

We help neighbors in need in our local community by collecting non-perishable food items every Sunday for the Daily Bread Food pantry, a ministry that started at Jerusalem Lutheran Church in Schwenksville. Each month we provide a fully cooked meal to neighbors in need in Norristown through the Food Pantry at St. John’s Episcopal Church. This vital ministry was started by the parishioners at Trinity Lutheran Church when it was on Dekalb Street. It moved to St. John’s because it soon outgrew the space available at Trinity. Once a year we help our neighbors in need in Tanzania through our Turkey Dinner fundraiser which supports the work of the Neonatal Intensive Care Unit of the Arusha Lutheran Medical Center. Through their groundbreaking treatment to save the lives of newborn children, they have taught other hospitals not only in Tanzania but throughout Africa how to save the lives of at-risk children.

Yes, we do many other worthwhile things, too. But these are the heart of what it means to be a disciple (follower) of Jesus. Thank you for your faithful support and active participation in our ministry, which changes lives and enriches our community.

# *From the Bench:*

## *The Augustus Chorister Program, Part 2*

In January's newsletter, I highlighted the many benefits of music education that have been substantiated by academic research. Music making acts like a full-body workout for the brain, engaging nearly every area simultaneously - particularly the visual, auditory, and motor cortices - unlike any other activity. This intense, multi-sensory engagement strengthens the bridge between brain hemispheres, enhances neuroplasticity, and links emotional, memory, and cognitive centers. (Harvard Medicine Magazine)

I also described how the Augustus Chorister Program can build on the music experience our children and youth may already be receiving in their schools. Specifically, our choristers receive music theory and sight singing components that are highly motivating, effective and fun!

For this installment of "The Augustus Chorister Program," I'll describe what a typical choir rehearsal looks like. Well, it begins with - pizza! Following our 10:30 service, choristers enjoy pizza and socializing in Fellowship Hall. We then gather our red folders with our choral music, our blue folders with our music theory and sight singing materials, and our ELW hymnal and head to the church.

Chairs and music stands are already set out along with a rehearsal piano and an iPad connected to a TV monitor. We begin with a routinized warm-up that focuses on tall, balanced singing posture and breathing exercises. Choristers sing a variety of vocal warmups on vowels for tone, choral blend and range.

We then turn to hymns that will be sung the following Sunday. At Augustus, we are fortunate to incorporate an excellent hymnody that represents some of the finest hymn tunes of our Lutheran tradition and Christian faith. The melodies and texts provide excellent pedagogical opportunities to focus on singing diction, intonation, tone, and sight singing. Great composers and pedagogues like Zoltán Kodály, Benjamin Britten, and Ralph Vaughan Williams knew the value of incorporating folk songs (which are similar to our hymnody) in their teaching and compositions.

Our attention then turns to choral repertoire while interspersing additional vocal exercises and short sight-singing songs along the way. The Augustus Chorister Program is unique because our choristers learn music from as early as the Renaissance period through the 21st century. They also have an opportunity from the very beginning to experience and perform the best choral music composed for soprano, alto, tenor and bass parts in an intergenerational choir. And remember, Bach directed an intergenerational choir at St. Thomas Church in Leipzig and the tradition of intergenerational choirs remains strong, especially in English cathedrals.


Toward the end of the rehearsal, a new sight singing song and music literacy worksheet are introduced. The rehearsals then conclude with everyone reciting the Chorister's Prayer: "Bless, O Lord, us Thy servants, who minister in Thy temple. Grant that what we sing with our lips, we may believe in our hearts, and what we believe in our hearts, we may show forth in our lives. Through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen."

**Families are encouraged to reach out to me regarding any questions you may have about the Chorister Program. We accept new students throughout the year! After having a conversation with me, children and youth can participate in 4 rehearsals to see if the program is a good fit before making any commitment. There's nothing to lose and everything to gain!**



## Testing your Knowledge of Scripture

Do you know who Joseph the Levite was in Scripture?

If you said Barnabas, you were right. In Acts 4:36-37 we read, "Joseph, a Levite from Cyprus, whom the apostles called Barnabas (which means Son of Encouragement), sold a field he owned and brought the money and put it at the apostles' feet." In the early church, there were no needy people because no one claimed that any of their possessions were their own. Through the working of the Holy Spirit, they shared with one another. Those with plenty gave to those in need. Barnabas willingly gave the land he owned for the work of the apostles.

## Not to Be Served But to Serve

The words of Matthew 20:28 - "*Just as the Son of Man did not come to be served, but to serve, and to give his life a ransom for many*" – remind us that the life of Jesus was one of total sacrifice. It is clear that Jesus wanted to develop a servant spirit in his disciples and in us. He said in Matthew 20:26, ". . . whoever wants to become great among you must be your servant." He lived for his heavenly Father and for others. In the same way Jesus served his Father, we exist to serve him. Being conformed into the image of God we will take on the role of servants.

The concept of serving rather than being served is not a natural one. We have an inborn desire to want to be served ourselves and to have our own needs met rather than to see to others. We by nature prefer to be "number one". In addition, our apathy contributes to our lack of interest in sharing. God loves changing our mindset from wanting attention for ourselves to serving others. Seeing others as our brothers and

sisters in Christ helps us to follow God's command to love our neighbor as ourselves (Mark 12:31).



A life of service and servanthood is contrary to what our society promotes. We are told that we should aspire to fame, power, and wealth. In servanthood there is no glory, spotlight, or fame. A meaningful relationship with Christ is not possible if we put ourselves first and only seek the goals that are important to the world we live in. Living a life of service, we give of ourselves without striving for financial rewards or glory. Unlike the praise we receive from God, worldly praise has no lasting value. Along with the Apostle Paul we say, "*We*

*are not trying to please men but God, who tests our hearts"* (1 Thessalonians 2:4). As a servant, Jesus was not looking for praise from the masses, because he was only interested in glorifying his Father.

Second Corinthians 12:15 says, "*So I will gladly spend for you everything I have and expend myself as well.*" Because of our desire to serve Jesus, we begin to identify with the interest that he has in other peoples' lives. We forego our interests and begin to live a life of Christian service. "*You, my brothers, were called to be free. But do not use your freedom to indulge the sinful nature; rather, serve one another in love*" (Galatians 5:13).

Our freedom should express itself in the form of service. God brings us into a proper relationship with himself so we can understand what service he expects from us. Jesus lived a life of compassion for others. He continually served the hungry, handicapped, and homeless, and we are called to be imitators of Christ (Ephesians 5:1). When we commit to serving others, it is not done for our own satisfaction or to put ourselves on a pedestal. We serve out of love for Christ and to be worthy of his calling.

*Tithing is not a gimmick to solve the economic problems of churches; it is a significant act of remembering who we are.*


