

COVID-19 Safety Plan

STATEMENT

Swartz Creek Hometown Days Festival is operating under enhanced health and safety measures in guidelines for the COVID-19 pandemic for you, our guests, and vendors.

SAFETY PLAN

The health and welfare of our vendors and guests at the festival is our top priority. The procedures and mitigation strategies below have been recognized by the industry for protecting vendors and guests from potential exposure to COVID-19. By minimizing contacts, promoting social distancing, and increasing cleaning protocols and sanitization.

WHAT TO EXPECT WHEN VISITING THE FESTIVAL

General Principles

- If a guest is sick with COVID-19, was recently exposed (within 14 days) to someone with COVID-19, or just does not feel well, they should not visit the festival.
- Anyone who is in a high-risk category, as defined by the CDC, should not visit the festival.
- All guests shall practice social distancing protocols in public areas.

General Health and Safety

- · Provide handwashing and/or hand sanitizing stations throughout the festival.
- Establish protocols when a guest exhibits systems of COVID-19 when at the festival. Organized action with the festival staff shall be taken to remove the party from public interaction.
- Pedestrian traffic flow plans, to reduce bottlenecks and ensure the ability to maintain social distancing at the festival.
- · Signs with health and hygiene reminders will be visible on the festival grounds.

Social Distancing

- · Establish overall capacity limits based on local formulas.
- · Limit the number of and capacity of guests to comply with local regulations for social distancing.
- Establish social distancing in 6-foot increments.
- Festival volunteers will avoid physically assisting guests. If a guest needs assistance, another family member will assist.

Cleaning & Sanitizing

High touch surfaces shall be cleaned throughout the day with cleaning products which meet the EPA guidelines.

Additional Considerations

• Guidelines from the CDC, Michigan Department of Health and Human Services, the Governor's office, and other regulating authorities are constantly changing. This mitigation strategy can be altered and/or changed to meet the most current guidelines.
