Hazzan's Notes

Dear Friends,

During the month of March, we begin the happy month of Adar II in which Purim takes place. We are in a leap year cycle this year in the Jewish calendar and so we have two months named Adar. Adar I began in early February and was a normal month with no special festivals in it and then Adar II begins early this month. Purim, in a leap year, therefore, is celebrated in Adar II.

The rules and halachah (Jewish laws) of Purim are very interesting and include Taanit Ester (the Fast of Esther) the day before Purim and the frivolity that is attached to this festival. We fast dawn to dusk on Taanit Ester (Friday this year) to remind us of what our people could have lost had it not been for the courageous Esther! Like Hanukkah, Purim has a special prayer attached to it's Amidot (Standing Silent Devotions) called Al Hanissim (on these miracles). In this prayer with the special liturgy for Purim, we thank God for his and the courageous work of both Esther and Mordechai to assist our people in triumphing over evil. We remember all that has been done for us!

We are commanded in the *halachah* to get into a state on Purim where we do not know the difference between Haman and Mordechai. Where we do not know the difference between good and evil. This allows us the unbounded joy of dressing in costumes and giving *Mishloah Manot* (*gifts*) to all around us. Many drink or imbibe other substances to enjoy moving to a different "plane" out of the mundane work a day to enjoy this happy time. In fact, the *halachah* suggests that the entire month of Adar II (this year, Adar in other years) should be festive, happy, and laid back. And of course, in all Ashkenazi traditions, we serve the famous cookie called *Hamantaschen* which is three cornered based on the tradition that Haman's hat was three cornered and it is filled with all types of regional delights, including, but not limited to: Poppy seed (*mohn*), Chocolate chips, almond paste, raspberry, apricot, cherry, strawberry, and plum.

May you all have a joyous Adar II and a marvelous Purim. Join us on March 23 for our 7:30 pm service!

Chukim

The laws of SHATNEZ, TATTOOING and SHAVING

These are certain laws in the Torah that are not explained and therefore, we do not know the reasons for them. We are told by G-d through Moses that such laws are to be obeyed. They go under the general classification of Chukim.

<u>SHATNEZ</u> One of the "Chukim" given to us in the Torah by G-d is the law of "Shatnez". We are commanded not to wear any garment that contains a mixture of wool and linen. This mixture is called "Shatnez". As these two materials are sometimes used in the manufacture of clothing. It is proper to have them checked in a "non-Shatnez" laboratory and have them remove the "Shatnez".

<u>TATTOOING</u> Another "Chok" (singular for Chukin) given to us by G-d is the prohibition of any kind of tattooing. By tattoos this means permanent tattoos that are etched into the skin and can't be erased. Many rabbis felt the reason for this can be found in the fact that tattooing was a common practice among idol worshipers. In order to keep the Jewish people pure in their belief in one G-d, they were forbidden to imitate idol worshipers in any way.

Shaving the temples and face The idea of wearing a beard doesn't come to Jewish men direct from the Torah. It is a custom accepted by some pious Jews. There is a law in the Torah, a "Chok", that prohibits the shaving of the face with a razor. Another prohibition also included the sideburns. Again, we do not know the reason for this.

The theory given by sages is that this custom was also practiced by idol worshipers. If the beard can be removed by another means rather than a razor, it is permissible.

With the invention of the electric shaver, which operates like a scissor, a method was finally found for the removal of the beard without a razor. It has been accepted by religious Jews as a permissible method of shaving and it is used by them to this day. There are some Jews (mostly rabbis and hazzons), who would rather wear a beard to observe an ancient tradition, and so they do not shave in any way.
