Private **Henry Stanford** (b. 1845) enlisted 5/15/61 at Madison and was discharged for his youth 11/16/61 at Yorktown.

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Private **James Stapleton** (b. 1820) enlisted 7/9/61 at Madison and discharged 1/10/62.

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Private **W. J. Thompson** (b. 1841) enlisted 5/15/61 at Madison but was dropped soon after.

Private **S. L. Tompkins** (b. 1840) enlisted 5/15/61 at Madison and died of typhoid 8/31/61 in Mrs. Jenkin's hospital, Richmond. He was buried in local Hollywood Cemetery, G/204.

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Private **H. H. Wilder** (b. 1844) enlisted 5/15/61 at Madison and was discharged 9/25/62 for being underage. He reenlisted 12/22/62 in Company I, 2nd Florida Cavalry as a substitute for E. Henderson and was present on the last roll. He transferred to the Kilcrease Artillery in late 1863 and deserted 11/7/63 from General Hospital #1, but returned 4/20/64. He was exchanged to Company F, 5th Florida Cavalry 4/30/64. He was present on the last roll.

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Private **John M. Wilder** (b. 1845 Hamilton Co.) enlisted 5/15/61 at Madison. He was discharged for his age 9/9/62 and was 5'5", fair skin, grey eyes, dark hair, occupation: farmer. He reenlisted 12/23/62 in Company I, 2nd Florida Cavalry as a substitute for J. McCall and transferred to Company F, 5th Florida Cavalry in late 1863. He was absent on detached service driving cattle since the transfer and never reported. After the war, he lived in Lafayette Co. Despite his absence he appears as 1st Sgt in mid 1864. He was sent to Point Lookout prison then paroled and exchanged 2/10/65. He was furloughed to Florida 4/1/65 and paroled 5/15/65 at Madison. He was 6'2", light hair & skin, blue eyes.

Private **Francisco Bartolo Papy** (b. 1838 St. Augustine; d. 1903 buried in the Episcopal Cemetery, Fernandina) was a veteran of the 3rd Seminole War and was a depot agent in Madison Co. in 1860. He enlisted 3/4/61 in Captain Gamble's Company then enlisted 8/20/61 in this company at Tallahassee but was discharged 9/4/61. He reenlisted 3/4/62 as 3rd Cpl of Gamble's Artillery at Tallahassee and was promoted 1st Sgt 9/25/62. He was commended for his performance at Olustee 2/20/64. He appears as Sgt Major on the last roll and was present on the last roll. He was paroled at Tallahassee 5/12/65 and was 5'9", black hair & eyes, dark skin. His brother, Pablo Mann Papy, served in Company H, 2nd Florida Infantry and was killed during the war. After the war, he was active in railroading and moved to Savannah in 1888 to work as the assistant traffic manager of the Plant System. He eventually rose to the rank of division freight agent. Father: Andres Miguel Agustin Papy; Mother: Maria Magdalena Ignacia Mann.

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Private **William Henry Worrell** enlisted 8/26/61 at Tallahassee. He was briefly under arrest in early 1864. He was AWOL in Florida on the last roll and paroled 5/18/65 at Madison.

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Third Florida Infantry, Staff

Major **Lucius A. Church** (b. 1830) was a Lt in Company G, 3rd Florida Infantry before the war and was promoted Major 7/25/61. In a letter to Jefferson Davis, Governor Milton, of Florida, said that he felt Major Church may be the only field officer in the 3rd Florida Regiment who was "of strict sobriety". Church was appointed Lt Colonel 5/8/62. He commanded the 3rd Florida at Perryville 10/8/62, where he was wounded and replaced by Captain Daniel Bird. He resigned 2/19/63 on account of rheumatism. He enlisted 11/1/63 in Company E, 11th Florida Infantry as a private and died 6/30/64 in a Madison Confederate Hospital.

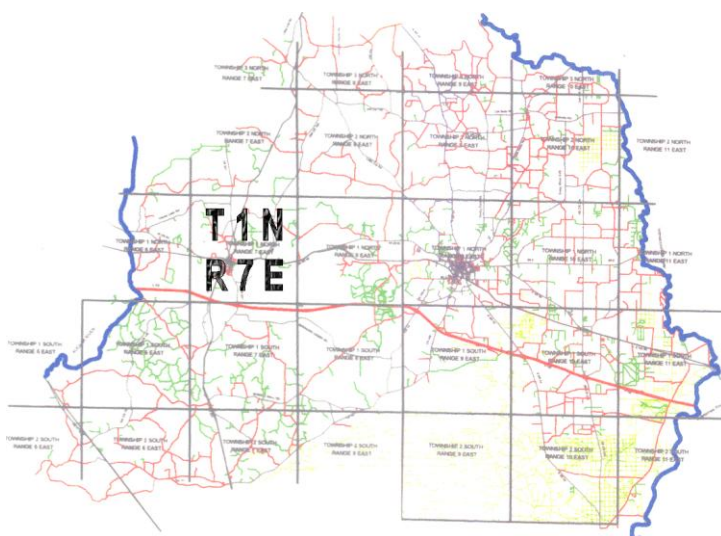

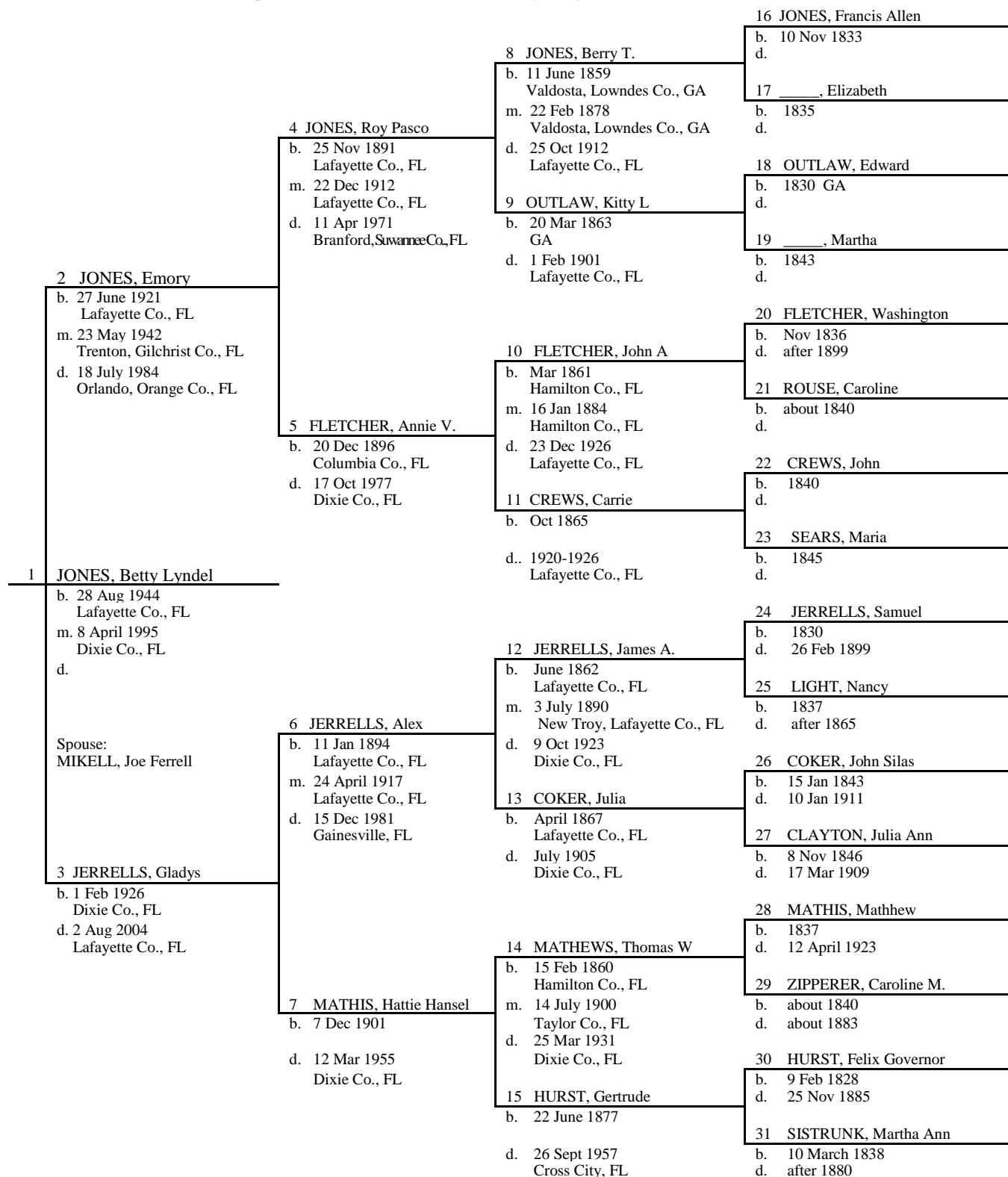

Indians Rough On Madison Countians In 1837

Indian leaders had agreed to the removal of their tribes to reservations in Oklahoma by signing the treaties of Payne's Landing and Fort Gibson. Dispute arose among the Indians as to the validity of these treaties. The opponents of emigration argued that the chiefs who had signed the treaties did not possess the authority to speak for all of the Indians. The chiefs who had signed the treaties, in order to avoid complete repudiation by their people, denied the treaties, and joined the opponents of emigration. This opposition to emigration led to the outbreak of the Second Seminole or Florida War, in 1835.

By 1835 most of the Indians in the area of Middle Florida had been removed. Most tribes had been forced south onto the reservations, while others had been removed to lands in Texas. As a result, there were no extended campaigns involving large numbers of troops in Middle Florida during the Florida War. Instead the Indians waged a guerrilla-type warfare against the settlers in this area. Small bands of Indians would surprise isolated settlers, burn their homes, steal their stock, and often murder entire families. In dealing with the Florida War, major emphasis has most often been placed upon the large campaigns conducted by such generals as Winfield Scott and Zachary Taylor in Central Florida. The war also had a great effect upon the lives of the settlers in Middle Florida, the most populous and most widely-settled area of the territory. Though Indian raids were sporadic, they occurred often enough to disrupt the normal course of settlement for a number of years.

A sampling of reported encounters with hostile Indians shed considerable light on conditions existing in Madison County between 1835 and the end of the Florida War in 1842. The Fort Gibson Treaty had set January, 1836, as the date for the completion of the removal of all Indians from Florida. By late 1835 it had become apparent that the Seminoles were not going to leave voluntarily. Sporadic outbreaks of violence began to occur as early as August, 1835. On January 2, 1836, Governor Jonathan H. Eaton issued the following directive to H. B. Overstreet, chairman of the Madison County militia committee:

"Application has been made to me, to give an order that you construct a temporary Block House, for the safety of your command somewhere near the forks of the Fenholloway River; that it will serve as a safe rendezvous for the rangers under your command in Madison County. Of the propriety of this measure I cannot judge and hence must refer it to your judgment and discretion under a full confidence that you will construct one, by a detail from your command, if it shall be considered necessary for the purpose of security to the portion, and of inspiring to the settlers greater confidence. Vigilance on your part will be necessary to prevent any assault by the enemy, and a knowledge that you are vigilant will at least give greater quiet and confidence to the inhabitants around you. I have therefore, to request and direct that you scour the country with activity and zeal, so that an enemy if disposed may not succeed in making an undiscovered march upon the settlement."

There were a number of fortified outposts established in Madison County as refuges against Indian attacks. In the modern part of the county there were at least four forts built. Fort Jackson was located twelve miles southwest of Ellaville. Fort Jones was near present day Lamont, on the east bank of the Aucilla River. Fort Vose was also on the Aucilla, about four miles northwest of Lamont. There was also a stockade located at San Pedro, then county seat. A contemporary observer made the following comment while visiting one of these forts: These fortified houses were crowded with women and children; mothers pressing their infants to their bosoms had here fled for safety: often fancying they heard the stealthy tread of the savages; and listening in agony for their horrible yells, while their husbands and brothers were out in obedience to the call of volunteers to assist in driving from their fastnesses the ruthless Seminoles, and rid the territory of such vermin."

The principal settlements in Madison County during this period were Hickstown and San Pedro. A contemporary description of these two settlements, written in 1837, indicates the effect of the wars on the settlers of Madison County,

"We visited San Pedro, which is seven miles from Hickstown. In truth the latter was nothing but an extensive field, which had once been the site of an important Indian town; but at the time we saw it, it presented not the least vestige of its former life and bustle, or indeed, of any life at all. San Pedro was a county-town, the county seat of Madison County, and we found it the resort of many fugitives who had left their desolated homes

to escape the rifles and scalping-knife; and were dwelling in miserable shanties that could scarcely protect them from the slightest shower. The few settlers on the road we traveled, who had not deserted their clearings, were suffering very much from alarm of Indians, who were known to be concealed somewhere in the vicinity; for they would frequently, when prompted by their necessities leave their lurking place in the swamps, and commit depredations, and then retire with impunity, loaded with their plunder."

On May 12, 1836, a fifteen year-old boy was shot and scalped while plowing near Hickstown. The Tallahassee Floridian and Journal reported that the Indians "fled to the swamps, leaving their victim welting in his blood. The mother distinctly heard the cries of her child as he was expiring under the scalping knife of the savages."

The state militia was quick to answer calls for help. They were often stymied, however, by the Indians' ability to escape into the swampy areas in the southern part of the county. Indicative of this problem was an incident that occurred in June, 1836.

"A man named Carter was shot and scalped last week in Madison County. A portion of Major Cuthbert's command went in pursuit an hour after the outrage was committed. At the latest dates, they had followed the Indians beyond the Aucilla, without coming up with them, and fears are entertained that the marauders will escape in the swamps of the Steinhatchee. It is unfortunate that the dogs, trained to follow negro and Indian trails, were not in that neighborhood at the time of the occurrence. In that case escape would have been impossible."

Another instance of an extended scout by Madison County militia took place in 1837.

"An express from San Pedro arrived last evening, from Captain R. D. Bradley, commanding the Madison County troops, giving an account of a spirited scout made by a party under his command, in pursuit of a band of Indians which had crossed the Suwannee, and been plundering the plantations and stock of the settlers in Madison. The Indians were closely trailed across the Suwannee several miles, and three different parties attacked. In every instance the Floridians whipped them and forced them to fly to the hammocks. Captain Bradley recovered a considerable amount of the plundered property, retook several cattle and mules, and captured several ponies and packs. Two Indians were killed and scalped, and it is known several others were severely wounded. The express states all the powder horns were taken from the Indians, and there were several that were full of the finest glazed fresh powder."

One of the worst massacres in Madison County during the Florida War occurred in August, 1838. A party of Indians, estimated to have numbered between forty and fifty, attacked the farm of a Mr. Baker, located on the Aucilla River about fifteen miles from Monticello.

"The family was at supper at the time. Mrs. Baker was killed by the first rifle discharged. Mr. Baker at the time caught up his grandchildren, one under each arm, and endeavored to make his escape, but was shot in the yard, and one of the children killed by the same ball passing through both. The other child was found the next morning asleep between the dead bodies of grandfather and sister, by a party from Monticello. A young lady, daughter of Mr. Baker was wounded, but made her escape to a fort about a mile distant. The house was plundered and burnt."

In January, 1839, a party of Indians attacked a group of slaves on the plantation of T. J. Linton of Madison County. The Indians stole two slaves and a keg of whiskey. The Floridian and Journal reported that the Indians "retired a short distance into the cornfield, danced and drank all the whiskey, and decamped with the negroes." The retreating Indians were trailed and overtaken by a scouting party. The scouting party surprised the encamped Indians, and captured all their packs. The Indians soon rallied their forces, however, and succeeded in recapturing their lost packs and the baggage of the scouting party as well.

The continuing conflict with the Indians prompted Nile's Weekly Register to make the following classic understatement regarding the situation:

“.... The Indians in the western part of East Florida and Middle Florida manifest decided sympathies of hostility, such as killing and mutilating persons falling in their way, firing into government steamboats, etc.”

Indians continued to attack scattered farms and plantations throughout 1839. After reporting an Indian attack on the farm of Joseph Lee, which resulted in the theft of several valuable slaves, the *Floridian* and *Journal* declared:

“These facts are a beautiful commentary upon the course of those who would lull our citizens to quiet and security, by the assertion that there are no Indians this side of the Suwannee. The blood of the frontier citizens, who may be seduced into a want of vigilance by the expression of such opinions, will stain the hands of those who thus act. We warn them that such is not the case, and that there is as much, if not more danger from attacks now, than at any time since the war. The Indians are, we doubt not, in want of provisions, and they will soon recommence plundering. Every plantation should be guarded.”

One of the most interesting episodes to occur in Madison County during the Florida War grew out of an incident in Hamilton County. On October 11, 1841, Indians attacked the home of George Overstreet on the Alapaha River in Hamilton County. The Indians killed two of Overstreet's children and burned his home. A pursuing party, headed by Robert Dees, was formed to trail the Indians. The party trailed the Indians into Madison County, where they were re-enforced by General William Bailey and his company of Militia. A scout sent out by Bailey captured eight Indians and two white men who had accompanied the party that had attacked the Overstreet home. The two white men, Stephen Yomans and Jack Jewell, were returned to Fort Jackson, where they were tried, convicted, and sentenced to hang. The eight captured Indians were killed by the scouting party.

“The old diary from which the above is taken, states that every one of the volunteer soldiers was anxious to shoot the captured Indians. It was Mr. Dees who did the hanging. He tied one end of the rope around the Indian's neck, and would throw the other end over a limb, and would draw him up like a bucket of water from a well, holding him in this fashion until everyone had had a chance to shoot the savage. When every member of the party had taken a shot, the Indian was let down and another drawn up in the same manner.”

The war dragged on through 1841 with no apparent end in sight. The people of Florida charged the Federal Government with maladministration of the war effort. Governor Richard Keith Call was removed from office for his criticism of the conduct of the war. The removal of Governor Call did not silence criticism, however. General William J. Worth, commander of United States troops in Florida, announced the cessation of hostilities on August 14, 1842. Despite this fact, the people of Madison County, assembled on August 27, 1842, for the purpose of nominating candidates for the Territorial Legislature, passed the following resolutions regarding the Indian problem:

“Whereas, the citizens of Middle Florida having suffered severely during the last twelve months from the hostile incursions of a savage foe, and whereas, they believe that much of their disaster and loss of life has resulted from the mistaken policy of the government, in entering time after time into treaty stipulations and agreements with them which they have so often violated and which affords them facilities under the protection of the “White Treaty” for entering our borders, murdering our citizens, destroying our property, and, whereas, we see formally announced in the last papers the ratification of another treaty (always portentous of evil to us), assigning a portion of the public domain so long denied them.

Be it therefore resolved by the citizens of Madison County assembled, that we do solemnly deprecate the policy thus indicated, that we consider the effort to conciliate them again by paper bullets and bounties denied them as betraying a want of dignified self-respect and abandonment of the justice of our claims and a trailing of our national arms in the dust.”

The meeting went on to point out in no uncertain terms, the fact that the Indians had never before respected a peace treaty, and that a new treaty would only once again place in jeopardy the lives of the people of Florida. They added that “our pride, though humbled, forbids the idea of concession wrung from fear.” The people of Madison County felt that the regular troops stationed on the frontier for the purpose of protecting the settlers from Indian

attack were “utterly inefficient and inadequate to the task assigned them.” They proposed instead, a command of mounted soldiers, and added “that such a command should be composed of citizen soldiers whose families and interest require at their hands activity and vigilance.” Madison Countians ended their plea by appealing to the Governor “in the name of our bleeding country, our murdered families, and our common rights, to arrest the horrid delusion of conciliation, and press the war to a close.”

The Grand Jury of Madison County, meeting on October 31, 1842, had some very definite opinions concerning the Florida War. Their presentment is of interest because of the jurors’ assessment of the damage suffered by the citizens of Madison County, and their opinions as to how the war should and should not have been conducted.

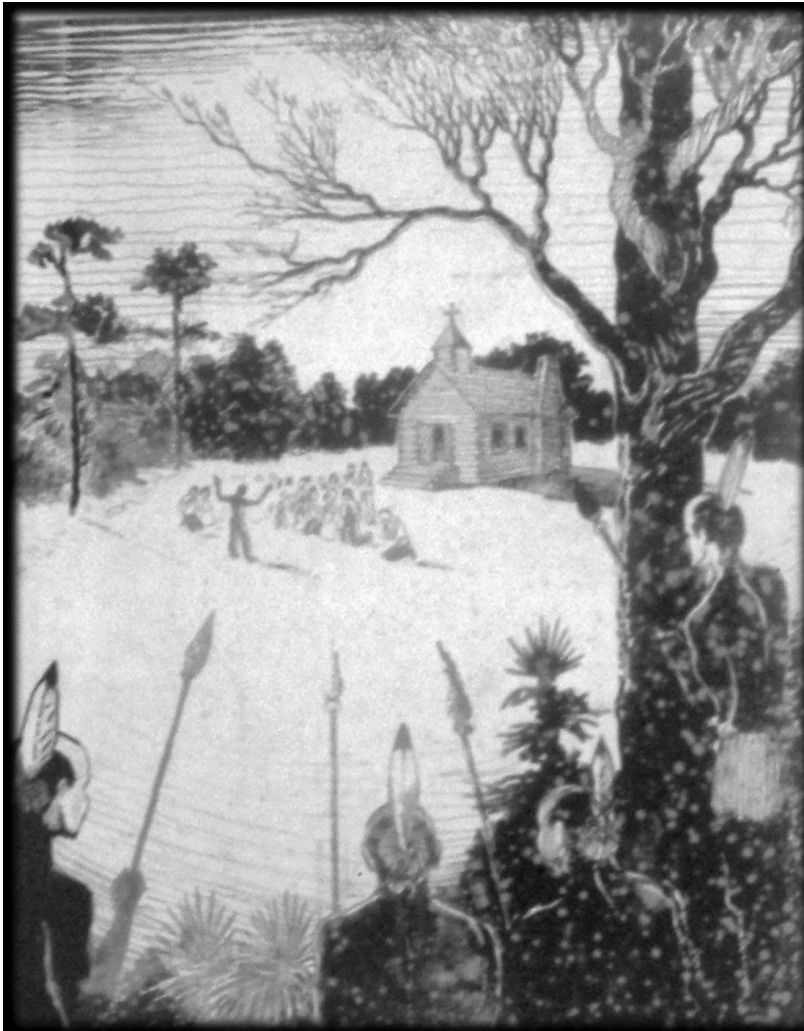
“The jurors in and for the body of Madison and Territory of Florida, would most respectfully ask leave to present as an evil of great magnitude, the protracted Indian War. It is an evil which has had a blighting effect not only on the prospects and improvements of this Territory, generally corrupting to the morals of our citizens, but it has been most disastrous to our immediate county of Madison, a county, once the seat of everything bright and encouraging, combining with its fertility of soil, a salubrity of climate unsurpassed by any part of the Southern country.”

“Yet not withstanding, we are now prostrated from the effects of war. We could still recover for our resources are many, if we were relieved from the mercilessness of a savage enemy. The citizens of our country have suffered greater loss and have been attacked most frequently by the Indians within the last month than they have ever been since the commencement of the war. Without intending any disrespect to the able and indefatigable commander now at the head of the army in Florida, we are unanimously of the opinion that this Indian War can never be terminated by the soldiers of the regular army; the army as it is now composed (the common soldiers) is made up of such material that it is impossible to make them good woodsmen (Indian hunters); it requires the veteran hunter, the hardy frontier man who has spent most of his life in search of game in our forests to make a successful bush fight. We are aware that militia has been tried in this war and proved unsuccessful, that frauds to a large number have been committed, that immense sums of money have been expended, squandered by sympathetic and corrupt agents for whose acts we hold the government responsible. There is a great mistake pervading the minds of many of the citizens of the United States which is truly unfortunate for the people of Florida. It is this that the Florida War is a war of our own, that it was brought on and continued by our own citizens for the purpose of speculation which we deny and pronounce false.

The history of the times will support us in this assertion. We assert that it is exclusively a war of the United States, instigated and brought upon us by the blundering and careless acts of the heads of the department at Washington City. The settlers of this Territory who bought land of the United States were promised protection and a peaceable possession of said lands. And we would ask what has been our protection after many of our citizens have been murdered by the Indians and others have suffered all the anxiety and dread of having their families butchered and their farms laid waste. Their protection has been abused from men high in authority, members of Congress, some of whom were actors in this war upon us. Therefore, believing as we do that our citizens will be continually harassed as long as there is a single Seminole left in Florida, we would recommend to the President of the United States as also to Congress now in session, the propriety of reserving militia in the service of the United States to serve during the Indian War, to receive at the close of said war, a bounty of land with a proper selection of officers to command said militia, without respect to party spirit (which is ruining our country). We confidently believe the war would soon be terminated.”

The protracted Second Seminole War exerted a great effect upon the lives of Madison County citizens. It often required extended absences from home of men who served in the Florida militia. The war also retarded the flow of immigrants into Middle Florida, and severely limited agricultural efforts of those already settled in the area. The long-lasting effect of the war, however, was to clear the area for the rapid settlement that was to take place in the 1840’s and 1850’s.

Indian Band Bent on Massacre Halted By Prayer

Prayer saved the congregation of the first church ever built in Madison County from an Indian massacre. This information was found by W. T. Cash, State librarian, in an old letter which is part of the historical manuscripts he has collected at the State Library.

Cash said the date of the incident is not given in the letter, but that it occurred between 1830, when the church was built and 1848 when the Florida Indian War ended. The church stood in Hickstown, about two miles west of the present town of

Madison. The town was named after a Seminole Indian chief, Billy Hicks, Cash said.

The Indians determined to surround the Hickstown Church one Sunday when a large Congregation had assembled and massacre the entire assemblage, the letter said. When the Indians had gathered close to the church they noticed the congregation was kneeling in prayer. The Red Men then said to each other, "They are talking to the Great Spirit and He will be very angry with us if we kill them."

The letter said the Indians then slipped away quietly, but one of them captured later told the whites how narrowly they had escaped being massacred in the Hickstown church.

Rev. Stephen Crockett

A native of England, 19 year old Stephen Crockett departed as a single man from Amsterdam, The Netherlands on the ship *Schiedam* and arrived in the US on 27 December 1886. He was born on 15 September 1867.

Upon arrival he lived in Kentucky and Illinois for some time, In the mid 1890's he moved to Madison, Florida and accepted the pastorate at the First Baptist Church where he served from 1895-1901. During his time as pastor the church flourished and prospered. The elegant and modern structure that was used by the congregation as a place of

worship was built largely through his efforts.

Rev. Crockett resigned as pastor of the First Baptist Church effective January 1, 1902. He had served in that position for nearly seven years. On 22 July 1902 his wife Mary, a native of Kentucky, died in the hospital in Thomasville, GA. On 1 January 1903 he was married to (Mary) Anna Shepard of Quincy, Florida. Later in 1903 he was instrumental in establishing mail delivery in the Ellaville, Bellville, and Blue Springs area.

He died 16 December 1919 at his home in Bayonne, New Jersey. At the time of his death he was pastor of the People's Baptist Church in Bayonne. From newspaper articles that followed his death, the people of Bayonne loved the Rev. Crockett as much as the people of Madison had.

FORMER PASTOR OF BAPTIST CHURCH DEAD

Friends in Monticello of Rev. Stephen Crocket, formerly pastor of the First Baptist church in this city, will be pained to learn that he passed from this life December 16, 1919, at his home in Bayonne, N. J. of pneumonia, after a very short illness. He was at the time of his death pastor of the People's Baptist Church of Bayonne.

The body was placed in a receiving vault in Bayview cemetery, there to remain awaiting the arrival from overseas of Mr. Crocket's sons, who fought on the side of the allies from the very beginning of the war, going into the English army before America decided to go into the struggle. The body will later be interred in the cemetery at Madison, FL. The deceased was for years pastor of the First Baptist church in this city and made many warm friends, not only in his own congregation, but in other congregations as well.

The Bayonne clergymen of all denominations gathered at the funeral service to pay tribute to the beloved pastor of the People's Baptist church. Monticello News.

A resolution of respect was published upon the death of Addie Edmonson Wadsworth, by her fellow members of the Madison Home Mission Society. It was signed by Mrs. L. A. Fraleigh, Mrs. W. A. Dale and Mrs. R. F. Vann.

CIRCUIT COURT IN SESSION

A Letter from A Civil War Soldier

Letter from Thomas W. Nevius, Jr.

the camp was in Northern Virginia

Camp near Stafford Cort house

April 12, 1863

Dear father and mother and all the family. i taik my pen once more in hand to let you know that i am well and i hope these few lines will find you the same i received a kind letter from Sarah faiday nite and i was very glad to hear that you was all well Father i have not much to write to day we was reviewed by old Aba lincoln and old Jow Hooker old Aba looks like his Pictures he is tal and slim and Pale looking old Hooker is all puft up With Rum they have all the rum they Want that is the reason this war has not ben settled Before now we get a little whiskey once in a While When We get all Wet through in the rain .

But i tell you We dont _et a nuf to hurt us any Father i have ben with out it sow long that When i Get home i dont thinke i shall want any thing strong to drink i think it was a good plan when i enlisted it has learnt me a good leson and i hope i may be spared to come home safe and sound and i hope you all will be spared many years to come i think we shall soon maik a move we are in the 11th Army Core and that is ordered to the front and i supose we shall see some fun i hope i shall be spared to come home to see my little boy once more and to see all the rest tell Mother that i have got my bible and i read it and if i live i mean to fetch it home with me and if i fall in Battle i hope that it will gow with me

Father and Mother keep up good courage and not work to hard i hope the War will soon be over but Father i was never better contented than i have ben this Winter i have had nothing to trubble me Dear Father and Mother and all the children i cant think of any thing more to say i will close by giving my best love to you all write soon as you can

from your ever tru loving son and Friend
for ever

Thomas W. Nevius, Jr.

Thomas was a private in the 33rd Regiment Mass. Volunteer Infantry

He enlisted July 17, 1862 and served until June 11, 1865

He was brother to Abby Ann Nevius, wife of Francis Warren.
