

Connected Through Our Melodies: Kol Nidre

A few years ago, I saw this story that a colleague of mine, Rabbi Jen Gubitz adapted. At this holy time of year, this time of reflection and connection, may this story and so many like it remind us of the ancient connection we have to all the Jews who have come before us and God willing, after us.

A famous Rabbi recalls the then Soviet Union in 1967. During that trip he met a middle aged man with an amazing true story. The man said, "My name is Josef. Many years ago I was incarcerated in a Siberian labor camp, serving a life sentence at hard labor. I never believed I

would be released. I have so much to celebrate. Let me tell you my story... This is what happened."

"I was incarcerated because I was a Jew. I knew the charges were false, but I had no defense. I spent almost ten years in a Siberian labor camp. For most of those long, cold, bitter years, I had no contact with any other Jews. Then, one day, I heard that another Jew had been incarcerated in a cell on the other side of the same prison camp. I decided to seek him out, despite personal danger. I desperately wanted to see another Jew, to talk to another Jew, to say "shalom aleichem" to another Jew before I died in that forsaken wasteland.

I made plans to sneak to the other side of the prison camp. I knew that what I had planned to do was against prison camp rules, but I did not care. I had to see another one of my people. When I found him, I tiptoed over to him. He was walking in the courtvard where the prisoners exercised, and I fell into step beside him. I whispered. "Shalom aleichem, landsman" - greetings and peace unto you.

He turned his head slightly and whispered. "Not now! We are not permitted to talk. The soldiers on the ramparts can shoot us at any minute. They know we are Jews. They will not hesitate to shoot if we break the rules!"

I ignored my fellow Jew's plea and continued to whisper to him, "Do you know what tonight is?"

"How am I supposed to know what tonight is?" he demanded.

"Tonight is Yom Kippur, the Day of Atonement, the holiest day in the Jewish calendar year," I continued.

"So what!" he exclaimed, his whisper growing louder and more agitated. "What good does being Jewish do for us? Where has it gotten us? So what if tonight is Yom Kippur! I've been in one prison camp after another. I just don't care anymore."

I persisted. "Listen, I've been in this prison camp for almost ten years. All this time, I've searched for another Jew. Knowing that tonight is the holiest night in the Jewish calendar year, we must share this night together in some way. Let's sing Kol Nidre together. Do you remember how the melody is chanted?

Tears filled my friend's eyes. He whispered, "I used to sing Kol Nidre with my father in the synagogue as a young boy. I haven't heard it chanted since then."

I begged him to join me in singing. He began to hum the melody softly. He hesitated with the words. Finally he recalled them.

As he sang, his voice grew louder and more distinct.

We did not notice the commotion in the watchtower, for we were so absorbed in what we were doing. It seemed that the guards were aiming to shoot us for disturbing the peace. Then we heard shouting. The captain was ordering the guards to halt.

"Let them be," he ordered.

He descended from the watchtower and walked over to us. We trembled when we saw him standing beside us. He aimed his gun but held it steady. Then he demanded gruffly, "What are you two Jews doing?"

I answered as politely as I could. "We are singing a song."

"Then sing more," the captain commanded.

"Please don't disgrace us by making us sing more. We know you will shoot us. Do it now. Get it over with!" I pleaded.

The captain's voice suddenly became more amicable.

"I am not going to shoot you," he said. "Please continue to sing that melody. I want to hear it."

We resumed singing. As we sang, we saw tears fill the captain's eyes and roll down his cheeks.

When we finished, the captain spoke.

As you began to sing," he said, "I had a vague recollection of hearing that melody before. Suddenly, memories of going to the synagogue with my father swept over me. I pictured myself as a little boy, huddled underneath my father's tallis. When I was 12 years old, I was forcibly conscripted into the Tzar's army. I had no connection with my family for years. I was promoted in the army until I reached the rank of captain and have made a career of serving my country. Now I realize that I am still a Jew, although it has been at least forty-five years since I had anything to do with my people. Tonight I understand that I am still part of the Jewish people."

Spontaneously, the three of us began chanting Kol Nidre again. Our eyes overflowed with tears. I do not know if I will ever experience such a holy moment again.

After we finished, the captain promised that he would do everything in his power to hasten our release from the Siberian labor camp. It took time; the waiting was interminable. I even doubted the captain's sincerity. We waited the better part of a year. Then, a few weeks ago, orders for our release were received. I came here to Moscow to celebrate Simchat Torah with my people. Bless me, Josef said to to the Rabbi, bless me that next year I will be free like you. Bless me that next year I will be able to dance in the streets of Jerusalem on Simchat Torah."

The prayers and their melodies of our Highest of Holidays have the power to raise us from our depths; in the gulag, in refugee camps, after the devastating events of our lives, our liturgy serve as sources of light even in the darkest of places. They bind us together and unlock what is deep in our souls. As we look toward our High Holy Day season, perhaps from a place of darkness or despair, may these ancient words and melodies elevate us to the holiness we seek and connect us to our community, to our families, and to our past. May they remind us that even though we have missed the mark in this past year, this year, this 5779, we can start again. And maybe in this new year, we may be free.



Repentance, Prayer and Righteous Giving

As summer transitions into fall, we welcome you to High Holy Days at TBS and are confident Rabbis Benjy and Lenette, as well as Gail, Debbie, and the rest of the musicians will provide us all with meaningful and insightful services. We will individually reflect on our past year, consider what we could have done better, contemplate how we move forward, and recall the words of the *Unetanah Tokef* which say "teshuva, t'filah, and tzedakah (repentance, prayer and righteous giving) temper judgment's severe decree."

At this time of personal reflection, we would like to acknowledge TBS's many achievements from the past year. In addition to countless life cycle events and various holidays, our congregation has had several accomplishments.

Most notably, our TBS family made a successful rabbinic transition in which Rabbi Apothaker retired and moved to the position of Rabbi Emeritus. Rabbi Benjy moved from Associate Rabbi to Senior Rabbi, and Rabbi Lenette came on board to serve as the Assistant Rabbi and head the religious school. Transitions such as these are never easy, but through planning and coordination TBS made a seamless shift into its future.

TBS strongly values the communal responsibility of educating our youth. By making a congregational commitment to education, we have ensured our religious school fees were not increased and we are pleased to say that this year will mark the sixth consecutive year of steady tuition. Our education program (named Kehillah Torah) is a premier religious school and an example to others in our Jewish community.

As a response to concerns regarding outside threats and safety, we have increased security at major events and have added live security at our religious school. In addition, TBS was able to obtain a \$100,000 grant to make security improvements to our building. The enhancements were completely paid for by the grant and have added tremendous benefits to our building, such as new outside lighting. We wish to extend a huge "Thank You" to Bonnie Abramowitz and others for their hard work and commitment to this crucial project.

Roughly 10 years ago, TBS embarked on a Capital Campaign – *The Campaign to Insure Our Future*. The final pledges will be paid in over the next 2 years and the campaign is considered complete. This is an amazing accomplishment, and as a result of this campaign, we can now continue our mission and focus on personnel and programming rather than on principal and interest.

Looking forward, it is our intent, in conjunction with our Board and staff to:

- ♦ Continue to provide innovative education and programming for the youth of our congregation
- Support Rabbi Benjy's vision of providing additional engagement opportunities such as affinity groups (*k'hillot*) for our members.
- Complete a draft of a five-year strategic plan for TBS and present this plan to the congregation. Our goal through this process is to make sure the temple is continuing to meet the needs and vision of its members. We welcome your input as we begin drafting.

We hope that you will enjoy the opportunities TBS provides during the High Holy Days for repentance, prayer, and reflection. Our wish for the upcoming year is for you to join us in fulfilling the third part of the *Unetanah Tokef*, *tzedakah*, when you receive your annual appeal in the days following Yom Kippur. Every contribution has an impact on our ability to provide programming and services to each member of our temple community.



The Works of Yuval Noah Harari

In this article, The Kosher Bookworm departs from our usual. Normally, we review a fiction or nonfiction work having a Jewish theme or content. This article is about a critically acclaimed Israeli author of nonfiction, Yuval Noah Harari, Ph.D., and his works. His published books have little-to-no Jewish content, per se; yet, they raise controversial insight and content that chal-

lenges the inquisitive Jewish mind.

Yuval Noah Harari is a professor at the Department of History at the Hebrew University of Jerusalem. His lectures tend to specialize in world history having been awarded his Ph.D. in history from the University of Oxford. His research has focused on broad-based historical (if not philosophical, political and theological) questions:

- What is the relationship between history and biology?
- Is there justice in history?
- Did people become happier as history unfolded?

Harari's first book, *Sapiens: A Brief History of Humankind*, originally published in Israel (in Hebrew) in 2011, is an international best seller having been translated into over 40 languages. The book directly resulted in: 1) an online course (A Brief History of Humankind), 2) several Youtube lectures, and 3) Harari being the 2012 awardee of the Polonsky Prize for Creativity and Originality in the Humanistic Disciplines.

This book is a must read for anyone interested in discovering the "roots" of our species and the anthropological journey our species has taken to arrive at the point we now find ourselves. This book is on the TBS Library bookshelves.

Harari's second book, *Homo Deus: A Brief History of Tomorrow*, originally published in Israel (in Hebrew) in 2015, is very much a sequel to *Sapiens*; although, the author makes no direct claim of this. The book is a historian's academic projection of the future for humankind. Harari explores and shares his considered opinion on such topics as:

- ♦ The main products of the 21st century economy will not be textiles, vehicles, and weapons but bodies, brains, and minds.
- The way humans have treated animals is a good indicator for how upgraded humans will treat us.
- Democracy and free market will both collapse once Google and Facebook know us better than we know ourselves, and authority will shift from individual humans to networked algorithms.
- Humans won't fight machines; they will merge with them. We are headed toward marriage rather than war.

Homo Deus, as a set of predictions is not science fiction. Rather, it is a thought-out likely scenario for future-minded readers. This book is also on the TBS Library bookshelves.

Harari's next book, *21 Lessons for the 21st Century*, due to be available this month of September, is a critical eye evaluating humankind's present situation. Such current issues as the following will explored:

- How do computers and robots change the meaning of being human?
- How do we deal with the epidemic of fake news?
- Are nations and religions still relevant?
- What should we teach our children?

If 21 Lessons is only half as good as Harari's previous two books, it will be an important contribution to our current day debate having considerable controversial content. The Kosher Bookworm looks forward to its publication release and the opportunity to read more insight from Israeli academic, Yuval Noah Harari.




