



Municipal Issues in the Provincial Election

First, no matter who is elected in the June 7 provincial election, we, as Whitby Council, will always strive towards developing good things for Whitby through a solid working relationship with our local MPP (Member of Provincial Parliament).

But now to business: Our council has sent its priorities to our provincial government as well as to our local candidates and party leaders. Let's hope they're paying attention

because as you will read below, what we are asking for is a partnership that will make our community a better place to live, work, and play.

Broader media will focus on the province-wide issues but locally, these issues will have the greatest impact on each of our households. It's worth a read to understand the local issues and pose your own questions at the door when they come calling.

Whitby Releases Election Priorities Publication

Ahead of the 2018 provincial election, the Town of Whitby has released a new publication highlighting several local provincial priorities for residents and local candidates to be aware of.

To support local priorities and Whitby Town Council's 2014-2018 Goals, the Town has identified the following seven provincial priorities:

- spur local job creation through funding for local initiatives, such as Whitby's Innovation Accelerator and District;
- · improve traffic flow and build a more equitable and effective transportation network in Whitby, including removing tolls on Hwy 412 and local control of historic Downtown Brooklin;
- partner with municipalities to create complete and connected communities, such as the Transit Village in Port Whitby;
- consider the impact of legislation on lower-tier municipalities and small businesses, such as Bill 148 (Fair Workplaces, Better Jobs Act) and cannabis;
- explore more opportunities to as-tow_priorities_final.pdf sist municipalities to promote the

development of affordable housing in their communities, particularly in our downtowns:

- provide sustainable programs to help fund critical municipal infrastructure services like roads and bridges; and,
- adopt new enhancements on public safety, including changing the Ontario Building Code to require the installation of fire sprinklers in all new residential construction.
- "As a Town, we are committed to making Whitby the best place to live, work and visit," said Mayor Don Mitchell. "Partnership at all levels of government is critical to enabling positive change in our community. We believe that provincial support of these seven priorities will make a true and positive difference to Whitby and its residents."

struction of a new arena in 1948, allowed for more indoor events such as the Ladies and Children's Exhibits and a Fiddle Competition.

In the 70s, the Fair expanded to three days adding Bed & Bathtub Races, Square Dancing, Police Tug of War, Horse Pull, and a rab-

bit show. Our 'Dairy Princess Competition' has evolved and today is called the 'Brooklin Spring Fair Ambassador Contest' which allows for both male and female participants.

The Brooklin Spring Fair expanded to its current four day format in the early 1980s. It now includes a Midway, Demolition Derbies, a Truck and Tractor Pull and other entertainment.

For the last 11 years the Fair has organized a fun, interactive Education Day for local Grade 3 students to learn about agriculture and conservation.

Each year over 30,000 people enjoy the Fair. Our remarkable success and longevity can be attributed to the efforts and dedication of many volunteering individuals, community organizations and generous sponsors.

Did you know that the Brooklin Spring Fair started in 1911? It was a one day event held by community residents on the site of Grass Park in Downtown Brooklin. The Fair was originally held on May 24 to showcase the highest quality of livestock in all of Southern Ontario. The local youth participated in running races and other sporting events. Fair day finished with a community dance. Admission to early Fairs was .25c for adults, .10c for children, .25c for rigs and .50c

In 1914 the Fair moved to Meadowcrest Farm (Meadowcrest Subdivision) which was owned by John Vipond. Our first President was the Great-grandfather of Gary Young, Thomas Hall, who was a farmer in Brooklin. During the First World War, the Board donated all Fair

Community Park. Some of the long standing families involved with the Fair include: Batty, Ormiston, Vipond, Grandy, Duff, Patterson, Medland, Disney, Jackson, Holliday, and Dryden.

40s expanded to include lacrosse, football, and softball games as well horseshoe pitching. The Fair grew to a two day event, held the first weekend in June because it usually rained on May 24. The con-

How To "Bee" Busy Running A Spring Fair

The next time you mutter you're too busy to do something, consider contacting the president of the Brooklin Spring Fair for a proper definition of busy.

Her name is Kristin Williamson and, till the last bit of cleanup is done after this year's fair, she will be right there, on site, directing, advising or

helping. Next Wednesday, the day before the much-anticipated George Canyon concert, she'll be examining the site with colleagues to ensure all is ready for the approximately 4,000 fans.

A Durham water treatment operator, Williamson is also a Brownie leader for the 4th Brooklin Brownies, and plays softball when not keeping the mammoth Spring Fair production on task.

Lots of meetings

The fair just doesn't happen, as she knows all too well. Since it's been held at the current location for 107 years, there's a certain sameness to some aspects of planning. Never-



theless, the number of hours of meetings and details is practically incalculable. And, every year, there are some new twists.

When she began her two-year stint in September, high on her list was to have an opening concert. She got together with various board members and narrowed down the possibilities till they landed Nova

Scotia country music star George Canyon. "He's a real good person to have for our first attempt at this," she says. "His music, though based in country, crosses over a lot of demographics." Canyon will appear on Thursday evening, May 31.

Williamson began her involvement in 2004 when she was named Fair Ambassador. The next year, she offered to serve on the board and has been there since in various capacities.

"From the start, I considered it a privilege to be a part of it," she says. "At first I helped in the arena as a coordinator of events."

Directors stay

Every fall, the Fair board - officially under the auspices of the Brooklin Agricultural Society - is disassembled and new directors voted in. Except this has become such a well-oiled machine that few members step away, thus creating a consistency in approach and execution. As Williamson proudly points out, the board is a wonderful mix of over and under age 40-ers to give it a broader perspective.

A key planning component involves scouting other fairs, examining what they do and how they do it to find ways to improve the Brooklin one. "Our four-day fair is actually quite large by comparison," Williamson mentions. "Markham is probably the Disney World of Ontario fairs. The Western Fair in London is 10 days long, but aside from it, Brooklin is one of the biggest."

Once winter hits, the Fair board is in budget talks as they try to nail down sponsors and keep the approximately \$300 k budget in line. (The Fair comes under Ontario's Agricultural and Horticultural Act which makes funds public knowledge.) From then on, a lot of the tasks include either putting out little fires or finalizing projects. Her personal favourite is dealing with the student volunteers, about 30 of whom assist with various on-site tasks. They're all high school students who obtain community service hours as per Ontario Ministry of Education rules that require 40 hours of volunteer work over the four

years of secondary. Most of the students return from year to year.

Improvements

This year, Williamson and the Fair directors will oversee a number of changes and improvements including improved security in light of last year's incident when a teen was assaulted at the midway one night.

"We're going to wanding (wand scanners) and bag checks," says Williamson, "which will happen prior to entering the grounds. Everyone will be checked by the security company we hire."

Albion, which runs the midway, will also hire police officers to patrol and lighting will be checked for dark spots. She adds that, as always, they review every potential aspect of an emergency plan to cover injury, lost children, secure gates and fences, and so on. It is one component of the fair's organization she does not take lightly.

During the four days, she'll be on the grounds helping "where needed" and making the volunteers aware she's available any time. On Friday, when grade three classes descend on the Vipond Arena for their tour, she'll be front and centre with them, too.

Given this year's Fair is being called "The favourite place to bee!", how appropriate its president will "bee" as busy as one.

George Canyon Tickets

There will still be some available at the gate but they're cheaper online ahead of time.

Tickets are available online until May 30th at \$30 each or limited tickets at \$40 at the gate on the day of the concert.

Note that admission to the Fair is not included in the ticket price.

The Back Forty will only be open to concert ticket holders on the evening of May 31.



West Nile Virus Surveillance Begins

Durham Region Health Department Durham Region had three confirmed has started West Nile virus (WNV) surveillance and control activities for the 2018 season. WNV is a mosquito-borne disease that is spread to humans through the bite of an infected mosquito. Mosquitoes become infected by feeding on the blood of birds that carry the virus. The disease is not passed from person to person or from bird to person.

human cases of WNV in 2017, compared to two human cases in 2016.

The Health Department routinely traps batches of adult mosquitoes, known as mosquito pools, as part of its ongoing WNV surveillance activities. In 2017, 10 of the mosquito pools trapped by the Health Department tested positive for WNV. This represents the same number of positive mosquito pools seen in 2016.

Cover standing water

"Mosquitoes lay their eggs, which then become mosquito larvae, in standing water," explained Ross MacEachern, Acting Director, Health Protection with the Health Department. "Therefore, area residents are reminded to remove or cover any standing water around their homes to help reduce the development of mosquito larvae."

The Health Department recommends the following to help minimize potential mosquito breeding sites:

Chlorinate rain barrels or cover

them with mosquito screening.


- · Drain water from areas such as pools and chair covers, and also from containers such as ceramic pots, wading pools, bird baths, planters. etc.
- Check that roof gutters are cleared and draining properly.
- · Clean and properly maintain swimming pools and outdoor hot tubs.
- · Remove all unused tires from your property.
- · Ensure that drainage ditches are not backed up.

To help reduce the possibility of being exposed to WNV, residents are encouraged to take these precautions:

- · Wear shoes, socks and lightcoloured clothing with long sleeves and full-length pants when outside, especially overnight, between dusk and dawn, when mosquitoes are most ac-
- · Use insect repellent containing DEET on exposed skin, following Health Canada's safety tips on using personal insect repellents. More information on using insect repellents containing DEET can be found at https:// www.canada.ca/en/health-canada/services/about-pesticides/ insect-repellents.html? ga=1.1 90416748.61038264.1464190
- · Ensure doors and windows have screens that are tight-fitting and in good repair.
- · Keep grass, shrubs and hedges trimmed.
- · Turn over compost piles regularly.

Throughout the summer, the Health Department will conduct activities to monitor WNV concerns, including implementing a weekly adult mosquitotrapping program, a larval mosquito surveillance program and a larviciding program involving regional catch basins, as well as identified mosquito breeding stagnant water sites.
