TAPPED FOR ELECTRONIC REGIONAL DAYTON GETS

WOW!!! A new dart tournament is coming to Dayton. Arachnid Inc. one of the major manufacturers of electronic darting equipment in cooperation with Shaffer Distributing. Cleveland Coin, and Gem Music and Vending of Dayton are sponsoring an Electronic Dart Tournament in Dayton on April 16th and 17th of this year. The tournament is billed as part of Arachnid's\$100,000.00, BULLSHOOTER III, WORLD CHAL-LENGE OF CHAMPIONS series for

1988. The event will be held at the Teamsters Local Union Hall No.957, 2719 Armstrong Lane, Dayton. The tourney will be Arachnid's Mideast Regional event and will have an overall prize fund of \$5000.00. There will be seven events open to the playing public at a modest entry fee of \$10,00 per event per person, with a maximum entry of three events per person. Each event will have 128 entries maximum.

THE NUMBERS GAME

 ${f E}$ veryone who starts playing darts always has the same problem. What's the out shot. When I began playing this fantastic sport, when it was just becoming popular in the U.S. of A., the problem wasn't any different than now. Fortunately we had Sam Bowers to lead us in the right direction. Sam, of Fairborn, was a member of the first U.S.A. team to go to England and represent us in a British vs America challenge match. Sam could not only count points and figure the out shots, he could also shoot the eyes out of the board. He spent many years stationed in England with the military and learned the game by scoring games for all the "locals", as they are called. Sam once told me, "I didn't play a game for five years but I could tell you any outshot combination from 170 on down in miliseconds".

So Sam became our teacher in these here parts. The importance of knowing the proper outshot is tantamount to winning or being just another average player. Using Sam's earlier teachings and what i've learned since, let's hope that you can learn the same things with this column in the ensuing months.

A ithough the outshots in the 01 games start with the highest number of 170 to finish a game with three darts, I'm going to start the first series of numbers from 100 to 90. The first thing that anyone has to learn before they can be a successful shooter, is what all of the triples on the dartboard add up to. When you know them by heart the out shots become relatively simple to master. For instance, let's take 93, if you mentally subtract triple 20 (60) that leaves 33, obviously not an outshot, the next triple would be triple 19 (57) which leaves 36 (double 18), aha!!..., thats an outshot. I use this process of elimination every time I go to the board with a potential outshot. This simple system can work for you too, as long as you remember that the best numbers to break on are 40, 36

and of course the best of all the number 32. Let me add a word to the wise here. While it is true that these numbers are the most popular outs, there are 21 numbers to finish on including the double buil, so don't make favorites, they all can win games.

Let's get started with 100, this shot is a simple triple 20 and double 20. So you hit a single 20, most charts will tell you to hit triple 16, double 16 from 80 but my personal choice would be to stick to the 20 and try for the triple again, leaving an easy double 10. Should you hit another 20, then stick with it by hitting the last single 20, leaving you on the double top with your next turn.

What to do with 99, first try to avoid hitting the number on your previous shot that left you 99 is the best advice, because it takes three well placed darts to finish from 99. I like to hit 57 or triple 19 with my first shot but should I hit single 19, then there is my triple 20 from 80 to leave that easy double ten. Why is it easy, practice, practice, practice.

The 98 shot is simply a triple 20, leaving 38 or double 19. OK so you hit single 20, 78 fits very nicely with triple 18 or 54 off to hit the double 12. Should you hit the single 18 then the swing to catch a single 20 to leave forty for your next shot is easily accomplished.

To put 97 out, using your memorized triples it figures that 57 from 97 leaves 40. Great shot.

When working on 96, again using the memorized triples, this number can be had by subtracting triple 20 which leaves one of our better numbers, double 18. Again should you hit only a single 20, stick with it because triple 20 leaves double 16. Of course if you hit another single 20, slide down at hit a single 16 to leave the double top on your next shot.

Looking at a 95 will mean two darts in the same bed, triple 19 or 57 and a double 19. So you hit the single and it leaves 76, back to the triple 20 for a nice double 8. (CONTINUED PG.7)



GREAT DART BARS

I can't remember the first time I went to the Trippple inn on 54TH St. in the Big Apple (New York City). Although it's right across from the famous Studio 54, I wasn't young enough to go in, they pick you from the crowd in front to enter, whereupon they let you pay \$15.00 for the privilege. Well that's the Big Apple.

The Tripppie inn has only one dartboard, located right in front of the door as you enter and barely leaves enough space to get between the board and the bar. When you have only one board and lots of players the incentive to win is greater than if you had \$20.00 on the game. If you lose it may be ten games before you can get back on. The usual wager is either a drink or a buck, if you play for a buck thats usually the lesser, because a drink is about \$2.50 as I remember.

Most of us are used to playing until closing at the Dayton local dart emporiums but in the Trippple inn you can play all nightiong. One time i was there when four cops from New Jersey showed up at about 4:00AM and we played until dawn. Picked up about \$25.00, well so much for the abilities of New Jersey's finest.

Even though the Trippple inn is not very large it does have a kitchen and

serves sandwiches till the wee hours but if you are ever there try to make it on a Thursday night because that is amateur night. The only thing about amateur night in New York is that most of the performers are professionals. They put on a fabulous show and the cost is only the price of a drink.

Having been there on many occasions some of the better nights were times when special dart events happened. One in particular was for a challenge match between a young lady named Bernadette (one of New Yorks best lady players) and Julie Nicoli (one of Dayton Ohio's best lady players). The format was 501 best of 15 games for \$100, Julie won with a score of 7 to 1. Bernadette's boyfriend had put up the wager and then challenged your's truly for \$50 a game, I won three straight and for the first time bought the house a round.... it was a profitable night all around.

So when in New York try the Trippple Inn for some great entertainment, darts and something I really enjoyed, a whole lot of fun. The Trippple Inn, located on 54TH St. at Eighth Avenue. Just tell the cab driver right across from Studio 54.

IT'S A DARTER'S CHOICE

This year's dart season is in full swing and darters have finished digging into drawers and glove compartments in search of that missing third dart that, somehow, got separated from the other two over the summer. Most of us, who enjoy the game and have played for a number of years, have experienced this worry at least once. This problem along with the pains of re-establishing that winning stroke while at the same time avoiding darters' elbow always seem to overshadow some of the greater problems faced in the sport of darts.

Every year, one darting publication For another will attempt to tell dart players what kind of damage is being done to the sport by players who ignore the policies of good sportmanship, courtesy, and good behavior that used to be inherent to the game. That's right, I used the words "used to be". Through the years the game's principles of etiquette have been diluted by an influx of new players whose "win at all costs" attitude has come to be accepted as normal.

Having been around and played at darts for most of my life, I have met and played against most of the types of problem players to be encountered. Let's see if you can recognize some of the more annoying people of the sport.

MATT THE MOUTH That ever present VOICE that goes up ten decibels just as you start your throw. He usually has nothing more interesting to talk about than his romantic exploits of the last six months, but insists on doing it while you and your teammates are shooting. He is strangely silent while his own team shoots.

PETE THE PERFECTIONIST When he misses a crucial shot curses loud

ly and filings his remaining darts in the general direction of the board usually missing it entirely.

EDDIE THE EXHIBITIONIST Who when making a better than average shot, Whoops with joy and insists on loudly "High Fiving" everyone present whether they saw his shot or not.

LEONARD THE LEAPER Who leaps toward the board after what he supposes to be the winning dart, only to discover and curse roundly the dart that didn't go where he knew he threw it.

TERRY THE TORTOISE While shooting reasonable darts requires a full 30 seconds between each and every dart to re-establish his concentration. The only thing that will possibly disturb him anyway is the snoring of the other players waiting to play.

LARRY THE LUSH Between turns at the line consumes as much alcohol as is humanly possible and then wonders how his opponent got lucky enough to beat him. He is almost al ways extremely contemptuous of the game and the other players all through the match.

LOUIE THE LOUSY LOSER Whose poor shooting is only exceeded by the number of excuses for losing and the number nasty comments he can make about his opponent's game.

GESTURING GEORGE. Who can always be seen to follow a bad shot with a universally recognized degrading gesture (middle finger of dart hand portruding upward in the direction of the board and the darts just thrown). Whether this gesture or the usually accompanying verbal epithet is meant for the board or the darts or the air in between remains a mystery.

While these are seemingly humorous examples of many our contemporaries around the darting world, one has to wonder why darting has grown at all when new players see what they thought was a reasonably civilized sport populated by these virtuosos of sportsmanship.

What became of the gentlemanly sport that my grandfather taught me to play over thirty years ago. "How you win is as important to the game as winning." Those were his words to me at age eight when he began to teach me what sportsmanship was all about. Most of the players of his age were always as considerate of new players as they were of old familiar faces found around the bar of the public house of my youth. Those gentiemen reserved their sometimes witty but never unkind commentary of games and shots to the intervals between those games and shots. They were always helpful to the uninitiated. They always ended the game with a smile and a handshake, and many times with the offer of a pint whether they won or lost.

Now that the dart season is well un-derway, with people having already sharpened their games, perhaps a little time spent working on courtesv and behavior would also be beneficial to the game. A lot of the characters mentioned above would find themselves more readily accepted if they would just change their attitudes a little. Here's a thought for those of us that don't fit into one of the categories mentioned. "Perhaps a little peer pressure from us, on those that do fit these unhappy molds, might do a world of good for the game we all enjoy so much." Michael Frith

If you hit a single 20 it's the same as before, hit the single 16 to leave double 20.

To shoot 94, just remember your triples, 60 leaves 34, not so good, 54 leaves 40, again one of the better shots.

Shooting an easy 93, triple 19 does nicely here, leaving the double 18. Again just subtract your triples that you have memorized.

What to do on 92, right back to the area you shoot at the most, triple 20, leaving the best outshot of double 16.

if you need a quick 91, this number ends in a one and so does triple 17, lo and behold, that leaves the double top for a quick two dart finish. Should you hit single 17 that leaves 74 and your next dart should be directed right at triple 14 to leave double 16, should you hit single 14, then slide a single 20 in with your last dart and leave double 20 for your next shot. When left with 90, this number puts you in the 18 bed with a triple and a double to complete this game before your opponent knows what hit him/her. Should you hit the single 18, then swing over to the triple 12 to complete the three dart out if you hit the trip which leaves 36 or back to the double 18. Of course if you hit a single 12 it leaves that easy single 20 to leave double top on your next shot. This completes the numbers from 100 to 90, by the time we cover 89 to 70 you should have those down pat. Look for a pop quiz in the next issue of Flying Dart.

The best way to learn this segment of numbers is to practice each outshot until it becomes second nature to you and you can instantly remember each number combination to complete the shot.
