DREAM IT BE IT




At right, three teams compete to see whose spaghetti/marshmallow structure is the tallest—an exercise in frustration and teamwork!



"LET'S KEEP ON MOVING FORWARD" TOWARD EQUALITY, DEVELOPMENT AND PEACE

"Not one of the 50,000 people at the opening ceremony of the 4th World Conference on Women (4WCW) in Beijing 1995 could ever forget the power of voices singing together at the largest event ever held on women's issues. The Beijing Declaration continues to be a "guiding document" articulating the 12 critical issues impacting women of the world. The parallel NGO conference, themed "Look at the World through Women's Eyes," was attended by 45,000 women in the nearby city of Huairoa and presented over 2000 scheduled events in the ten-day period.



More than 100 Soroptimists participated in both the 4WCW and the NGO Forum – led by then SI President Patsy Daniels, SI Leaders and UN Representatives. Soroptimist leaders served as advisors to the Government delegations, particularly on Human Rights issues and Education. At the NGO Forum, workshops were presented by Soroptimists on topics such as: *Women in Prisons, Women's Rights in Kenya*, and workshops on education. Ironically, the issue of Human Trafficking was hardly on anybody's minds in 1995 and only mentioned as an afterthought in the Beijing Platform for Action (PFA) – although there were a few great workshops on the subject.

The two conferences focused on Poverty and recognized that a lack of education, lack of paid employment and violence against women are key contributors to the issue. In 1995, there were few elected leaders in power, a great disparity in all services for women, and many countries had prohibitions against women owning property or even making decisions for their children. Technology was revealed in 1995 as something that would positively impact the world and microcredit loans were being given to women to remediate poverty. I attended over 50 workshops and programs, including an 8-hour tribune on *Violence Against Women*, a workshop on *Muslim Women's Experience of Violence*, an amazing play from the Philippines on human trafficking, and I soothed my soul at a singing workshop with a

gospel group from Washington DC. My life was forever changed.

Fast Forward to Beijing + 25 and the world is now focused on the UN's Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs). Since 1995, the Commission on the Status of Women (CSW) annually addresses the progression toward areas of the PFA and the SDG's related to gender. What is better—what is worse now? It is affirming that due to constant and persistent NGO presence, gender is now being addressed. Much to the surprise of many, UN Women was formed in 2010, giving women a seat at the BIG UN Table. Poverty reigns as a predominant issue, human trafficking has gained a front seat of concern, climate change, overpopulation, food security and violence in society are also gaining recognition as key issues affecting women. There has been some progress made for women in education, a slight increase in elected women leaders, and some economic advances. Yet, there is much to do. We, as Soroptimists and as citizens of the world, must continue our own work and partner with like-minded organizations through advocacy and service. We must "keep on moving forward, never turning back, never turning back" (Reference Holly Near song, sung at the Opening Ceremony)."





"Journey of Grace" Survivor Retreat

Editor's Note: The information below is part of SOAP PROJECT'S retreat for female survivors of domestic abuse and trafficking. If you know someone who is a survivor and might be interested in attending a healing retreat such as this one, please forward them this information. The cost is free to survivors but SOAP PROJECT needs help fundraising for this. SOAP pays for airfare as well. An average retreat of 30 survivors costs \$14,000. Frequently Asked Questions are below.

Where is the retreat held?

The retreats are generally located in Michigan or Ohio at various locations each year. We will pick you up at the closest airport if you are flying. No visitors are allowed while at the retreat.

Are survivors required to participate in the all activities and meals provided?

No but there are some required sessions for the entire group. Most activities are optional and by selection. We ask that everyone join the entire group for meals. Activities are important to the healing process and have been carefully planned. We ask that everyone give it a chance.

Is this a religious or Christian retreat?

The retreat is spiritually based but not specifically Christian. Our volunteers come from a variety of faith backgrounds. Many of them have chosen to assist with the retreat because of their faith and beliefs. Survivors of any faith background and sexual orientation are welcomed.

What services are provided?

Rooms are generally double occupancy. We will send out a list of the names of everyone attending the retreat so if you know another person and want to room with them, just let us know. We provide breakfast, lunch and dinner. There are also snacks and drinks. We also have healthy snack options at certain times of the day. In the past, activities have included budgeting/finance assistance, jewelry making classes, massage, haircuts, makeup, self-defense, yoga, nutrition, how to be a professional speaker, etc.

What are the requirements for "The Journey of Grace" Survivor retreat attendance?

Must be at least 18 years of age
Must be willing to try all the classes offered
Must bring all prescribed medications
Must not be currently in a "program" for trafficking or recovery.
Must agree to stay on the property the entire weekend.

What does a retreat weekend look like?

A typical weekend includes:

Rooms – Each woman will share a room with another survivor in a safe environment and is able to go there when they need some time alone.

Common Dining – Three meals are served each day in a common space. This will allow survivors a way to meet and build relationships with others and learn about options and healthy nutrition.

Morning Programs – Each morning, activities are planned. These can be outside or inside, depending upon the weather, but are on the property.

Optional Participation – Our goal is to assist survivors in creating the weekend that helps them to rejuvenate, heal and grow. We believe in options and choices as much as possible, but also know the value of our programs. It is sometimes difficult to heal and grow, and because of this, we ask that survivors try everything offered.

Afternoon Enjoyment – Same as in the morning but also break/alone time is built into the schedule to allow reflection, journaling and bonding.

Evening Fun – Each night, we will host activities which are fun such as a drum circle, female comedian, music, etc.

What do survivors need to bring with them to the Retreat?

Many of your needs will be provided at the retreat but you should bring comfy clothing, toiletries and a list of current medications. Phones are permitted. We are fortunate to get many donations to make your stay comfortable.

What if a survivor plans to come but needs to cancel at the last minute?

Space is very limited for the retreat and we ask that a survivor commits to coming once accepted. We understand things happen though. If you have to cancel, we ask that you let us know a week prior to the retreat so another survivor can attend. *IF we have purchased an airline ticket, it is your responsibility to repay the SOAP PROJECT.*

Who are the volunteers at the Retreat?

It is important to know that ALL retreat volunteers are Female. Retreat volunteers help us make this an amazing experience for you. They are trained professionals, doctors, nurses, therapists, pastors, various religious orders, law enforcement, bankers and much more. It is important to know that they have given up their weekend and some have traveled far to be able to facilitate this retreat for you.

What is the long-term goal for "The Journey of Grace" Survivor's Retreat?

Our hope for the future is to have retreat venues that can maximize the number of survivors who can experience a retreat weekend. We also are hoping to expand these services to alumni survivor retreat attendees for continued support, to have an all-male human trafficking survivor's retreat, and LGBTQ survivor retreat. (Currently any female who has been trafficked is eligible to attend the weekend regardless of gender identification or sexual orientation, but we recognize the need for more specialized programs for healing and support to this population)

27TH JANUARY 2020 SIHQ CSW64

The sixty-fourth session of the Commission on the Status of Women will take place at the United Nations Headquarters in New York from 9 to 20 March 2020. Representatives of Member States, UN entities, and ECOSOC-accredited non-governmental organisations (NGOs) from all regions of the world will join together with 100 delegates of Soroptimist International (SI).



SI Director of Advocacy Bev Bucur, says: "I am excited to be coordinating the activities for CSW64. SI President, Sharon Fisher will be leading a delegation of almost 100 Soroptimists from around the world at this important meeting focusing on the anniversary of the Fourth World Conference on Women and the Beijing Declaration and Platform for Action. The theme of this year's CSW64 'Realizing Gender Equality and the Empowerment of All Women and Girls' focuses on the outcomes of the 23rd special session of the General Assembly and current challenges in meeting the 2030 Agenda for Sustainable Development and achieving gender equality and empowerment of all women and girls.

Soroptimist International will have many activities, including several Parallel Events and Side Events, planned in partnership with the Federations, and other partners. 


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Empowering Voters. Defending Democracy.

We just saw history. Today, Virginia became the 38th state to ratify the Equal Rights Amendment – crossing the three-fourths threshold of support required from the states. Now we need Congress to remove the deadline so the ERA can become a permanent part of the U.S. Constitution.

When the ERA passed Congress in 1972, lawmakers attached a 1977 ratification deadline to it, which they later extended to 1982. Earlier this month, the League of Women Voters of the United States_sent a letter to the United States Congress urging them to remove the ratification deadline on the ERA.



Thank you to the many League volunteers who have worked tirelessly for ratification in their states—and who continued to push for ratification even after the deadline passed. Now that the ERA has been ratified, we will not stop fighting for equality under the law and pushing to see the ERA become the next amendment to the U.S. Constitution

Women have waited decades to see the ERA pass, and this is the perfect way to kick off 2020, a year that celebrates 100 years of women's voting rights. It's time for Congress to remove the ERA deadline and make this dream a reality!
