THE LAST RITES

ecently, during a parish mission, we were invited to a service of healing. In the service, the presider invited those of us who felt in need of healing to come forward for the anointing of the sick.

Almost all of those in attendance — and the Church was packed — presented themselves to the clergy. Some were clearly ill, others were elderly, but there were many others, of a different age and appearing very healthy, who went forward. Nearly everyone seemed to be identifying themselves as in need of Christ's healing.

Prior to Vatican II this would have been inconceivable. The Sacrament of the Anointing of the Sick was, back then, a sacrament reserved for those at the point of death. Known as Extreme Unction it was considered to be the last sacrament along with Confession and Holy Communion or Visticum (food for the way) that a person would receive in the moments leading up to death.

'Last Rites' is how most of us understand the Sacrament of Extreme Unction. To be present with someone when they receive these rites is a profoundly moving and privileged experience.

AN INNER PAIN

o refer to the sacrament instead as the 'Anointing of the Sick' helps us to see beyond the death bed to the experience of illness from which so many suffer.

It's not just physical either, but more often emotional or psychological. Hence the fact that people who can appear apparently healthy present themselves, presumably dealing with an inner pain that's not visible to the outside world.

Every time this sacrament is celebrated, Jesus, in assure us the person of the priest, comes to each individual who's and we has suffering. The point of receiving the sacrament is not for us.

that a miracle will occur but that a person will be given the grace and inner healing to live with their pain.

COMMUNITY CARE

ope Francis speaks of this sacrament in relation to the parable of the Good Samaritan in the Gospel of Luke.

The Good Samaritan takes care of the suffering man by pouring oil and wine on his wounds. Whilst the oil reminds us of the chrism blessed by the Bishop at the Chrism Mass in Holy Week, the wine symbolises Christ's love and grace which flow from the gift of his life for us.

The suffering person is entrusted to the innkeeper to continue to care for him and he's told not to spare any expense. Pope Francis tells us that this innkeeper is the Church, the Christian community. In other words, each one of us has a responsibility, a ministry, to care for those who are sick or struggling in mind or body.


Our care of one another is a way of lavishing God's mercy and salvation on those who need it.

Despite a change in name, people are still fearful that if a priest offers the sacrament it somehow implies imminent death. This isn't the case of course, since when a priest comes he does so representing Jesus, who comes to relieve those who are sick, to give them strength and hope.

We should be glad that this sacrament is there for us. Sickness can be a very lonely experience which can leave us feeling vulnerable and fearful. Being offered the sacrament of the sick to strengthen us, helps to assure us that we're not alone, that the Lord is with us and we have the whole community praying with us and for us.
