

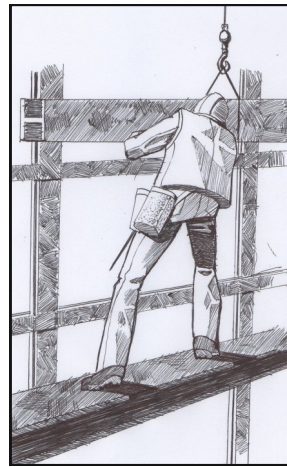
IF YOU DIED TODAY ARE YOU 100% SURE OF HEAVEN?

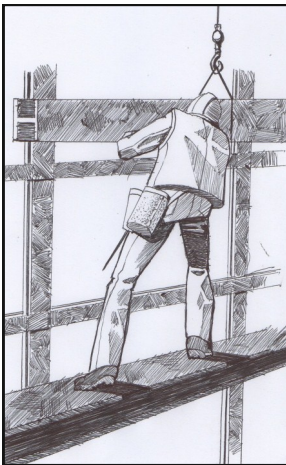

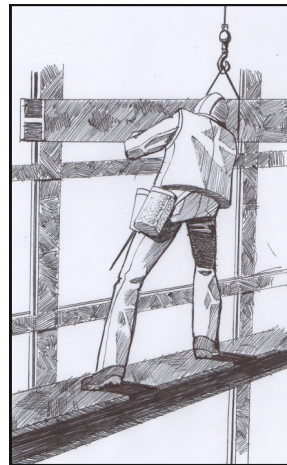
