The week we've all been waiting for is here, the 139th Westminster Kennel Club All Breed Dog Show, and this year there is something for everyone. Agility, America's fastest-growing canine sport, came to Westminster for the first time last year; it was greeted with tremendous enthusiasm by spectators in the sold out event as well as by viewers at home seeing it live on television. The Masters Agility Championship returned on Saturday with more dogs (a 45 percent growth from Westminster's first agility contest last year) and tougher entry qualifications. Qualifying rounds started in the morning, and on Saturday night, winners of Masters Agility Championship were determined in the exciting Championship Finals. A 5-year-old Border Collie named, "Tux, "owned and handled by Rose Savkov of Long Valley, New Jersey, took his place in the Winners Circle along with Roo!, owned and handled by Stacey Campbell, winner of Best All-American (mixed breed).

This year for the first time, Westminster partnered with the American Kennel Club as Westminster presented "AKC Meet the Breeds" brought by Purina Pro Plan. As soon as the doors opened to Pier 92, a steady stream of visitors strolled through two large hallways lined with booths decorated in themes relevant to the breeds found within. In this immensely popular hands-on education venue, the public met "up close and personal" their favorite breeds, as well as some rare ones, while learning from the dogs' owners what it's like to live with their dogs.

This morning, conformation judging begins, and over the next two days, 192 Best of Breed/Varieties will be determined. After last year's Best in Show line up, I thought it would be a long time before another seven dogs would gather in the same ring that had among them 522 Bests In Show, a number unparalleled in Westminster history, or in the history of dog shows anywhere, for that matter. It's possible that 2015 could come close, and we'll find out Tuesday night when one dog is crowned Westminster's Best in Show for 2015.

By now you've determined that also new this year is this blog. There's always so much happening at Westminster that we felt you deserved to be given an expanded view of the goings-on at Pier 92 and Madison Square Garden. Helping me bring you an "insider's view" is Susi, a long time Puli fancier and self described Westminster "junkie." I'll let her take it from here.


