At some point in my sermon on June 23rd, I referenced the song entitled, "The Prayer." In this issue of our newsletter, I want to share that song with you again as we enter this new season in the life of the church.

The Virginia Annual Conference of the United Methodist Church gathered in Roanoke, VA, June 20-22. As the clergy and laity filed into the Berglund Center, we found our seats and prepared to being Holy Conferencing for the 237th time. Historically, we open with words of welcome and greeting followed by some announcements (sounds a bit like our own Sunday morning opening, doesn't it?) The opening hymn is always the same, "And Are We Yet Alive?," which is fitting at the ending of the appointment year.

The Holy Spirit spoke to me through the words of "The Prayer." Uncertainty will always be present, and anxiety will rear its head, but may we always remember that Jesus Christ is the head of the United Methodist Church and of this local congregation called Ebenezer!

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Make a Playground Pledge!

Recently, our Ebenezer children collected "Change for Change" to support upgrading the playground at Cople Elementary School. Now it's Ebenezer's turn to upgrade our own playground. The United Methodist Men (UMM) inspected our equipment and found that some of the older wood structures are splintery and in need of repair or replacement, and that additional upgrades to the playground are needed to keep our kids safe and happy.

Ebenezer's playground is used not only by the young children of our own congregation, but also by children in the neighborhood. It is open to all.

The UMM and the United Methodist Women (UMW) have each provided \$500 toward the playground make-over, and the Church Council passed a motion to provide an additional \$1,000 from the annual budget. With \$2,000, we are off to a good start, but the total renovations, which are still in the planning stage, will probably require several thousand dollars more to fund the fun!

The Council, therefore, agreed that we should have a pledge drive to raise the necessary funds. A target amount for the pledge drive has not yet been set, pending additional work to design and price an improved playground. However, it's not too soon to start the "Pledge for the Playground" initiative.

Team Honduras Heads for Tegucigalpa

On June 29, 2019, the Team Honduras – Medical Mission left Dulles Airport in Washington, DC, to fly to Tegucigalpa, Honduras, for a 7-day mission trip. Thirty people from 5 states, including 17 people from Virginia, will be traveling to Honduras to provide medical, dental and optical services to the people there. The Team took with them 30 checked bags of medical supplies, almost 1500 pounds!

Our own Mary Jenkins is among the team members. She will participate in the medical brigades that will be fielded on four days. Every day, though, teams will be doing construction work like painting and repair, and on Friday, Mary will help install a water filtration system.

On Wednesday, the Team will visit Rancho Ebenezer, a school and orphanage, at which Mary says they "will minister to, and love on, the children there." Included in the supplies taken to Honduras were hair scrunchies and other pretty things for the girls, so they will have a "hair-do" party, as well!



In addition to proceeds from Missions fund-raising events, the EUMC Church Council provided \$500 from Second Mile Giving to buy medical supplies, including cortisone crème, nasal spray and decongestants, and other similar items, including 600 pairs of exam gloves. The Team returns on July 6th.

In Other Missions News...

Teresa English will be returning to South Dakota Standing Rock Indian Reservation again this year at the end of July. Contributions from Ebenezer (so far!) include more than 25 beach towels which the children there will use for nap times during the week of mission activities and then will take home as their own.

Please keep all of our missions in prayer as we seek to share God's love.

EMMAUS ... What the heck is it anyway?

Until I came to Ebenezer, I had never heard of a Walk to Emmaus weekend. Various people starting asking me to consider attending a women's weekend, and I of course had every excuse in the book why I couldn't go. But you people are persistent! Again, and again, the invitation would come, and each time I had an excuse. But finally, someone had to give in, and it was me.

I committed to go. I was told I would need to miss one day of work, that my sponsor(s) would pick me up late Thursday afternoon, take me to dinner on the way to camp, and pick me up on Sunday when it was over. I was encouraged to take comfortable clothes, leave my watch/phone/Fitbit/tablet at home, and go with an open mind and heart.

I was told I would have a roommate. There would be surprises. Would I know anyone, or would they like me? Good grief ... what did I get myself into? I'm a picky eater, so would there be anything to eat, and would I like it? Did I need to hide some cheese crackers and Coke cans in my luggage? And how would I survive three whole days without my Bill??? Why did it seem secretive?

The day arrived to go on my journey. The trip there was fun, with several church friends delivering me to Camp Happyland, which is in the remote hinterlands of Fredericksburg (I kept listening for banjos!).

I was there. Too late to turn back now. Would I have regrets? Yes, there <u>was</u> regret. Regret that I had said no countless times before finally saying yes. Regret that I missed the chance to experience God in a way I had never imagined earlier than I did. Regret that I had any thoughts that my Ebenezer family would lead me astray.

What <u>is</u> an Emmaus weekend? In a nutshell, it is a 72-hour encounter with God. The experience is led by a Weekend Lay Director (WLD) and a loving, dedicated group of team members who are personally invited to participate. The team meets throughout the year to ensure the walk is the experience the

pilgrims deserve, praying over unnamed pilgrims even before any have been asked to participate.

A number of us have been blessed by being invited to be team members. Being any part of someone else's weekend nearly matches our own. Watching God work in and through the pilgrims over a weekend reinforces your own faith and love for our Lord and Savior. There is nothing secretive about it, but we don't want to give too much away, so that your walk is the experience it should be for you.

Each year there is a spring walk for men and one for women, and the same thing again in the fall. For 2019, the men's fall walk will be held *October 24-27*, and they will be blessed to have our very own Larry Jenkins Jr. as the WLD for this men's walk. The Women's fall walk is *November 7-10*, and Mary Jenkins and I are blessed to again be team members.

Before my walk, my sponsor told me that if I thought God loved me now, "just wait until your weekend is over." That doesn't even come close to the truth. I'm sorry that I said no over and over, but God knew when I would need my walk the most, and He changed my heart to accept. I left that Thursday a member of Ebenezer UMC, but I returned a Disciple of Christ. I was forever changed.

If you are asked, please consider accepting. You won't be sorry. There is no cost to you. Your sponsor handles everything for you, including checking on your family during your absence.

And if you think you'd like to experience God up close and personal – on His own time – there are several Ebenezer Emmaus Alumni who would <u>LOVE</u> to be your sponsor! Don't wait to be asked! Tell me or Rebecca, and we can take it from there to find you a sponsor. Just trust. You'll have no regrets.

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A New Fifth Sunday Tradition?

Music is an important part of Ebenezer's worship. One More Music Note -



Feeding Our Neighbors: Ebenezer's Food Pantry

Our Food Pantry sure has seen a lot of food being distributed recently. We've observed the typical seasonal drop of clients from our winter season high of 100-110 families to 85-95 families during our late spring season. However, the amount of food being distributed has definitely increased.

We typically give out 8 lbs of dry goods, 8 lbs of produce, 2 lbs of meat, and 1.5 lbs of bakery per client. However, due to an increase in USDA products delivered to our Food Pantry, those numbers have gone up.

Feedmore, the parent of the Healthy Harvest Food Bank of which Ebenezer's pantry is a part, made an intentional decision last fall to distribute more fresh produce and dairy. As a result, EUMC distributed milk on four different occasions, and last month we distributed eggs for the first time. In fact, last month, we distributed over 216 gallons of milk and 120 dozen eggs. We've been receiving a lot of fruit and produce through the USDA program, too. For the last 4-5 months, we've been giving out California oranges; last month we also gave a couple bags of walnuts to each family.

USDA Increases Help Our Bottom Line

In our first year of being a USDA pantry, we only received about 2,500 pounds of dry goods per month. However, at the start of the new year, the USDA program increased their dry goods allotment to more than twice that of the previous year. Food distributed has included beans (navy, pinto, black, etc.), white and brown rice, lentils and split peas.

Concurrently, we have also been getting more meat from the USDA. That, together with the meat we receive weekly from the Montross Food Lion, has overfilled our three Ebenezer in-house freezers most months, and we've needed several coolers to handle the overflow.

The additional food coming free from the USDA has decreased our need to purchase meat at 19¢/lb, dry goods at 19¢/lb, and produce at 7¢/lb from the Healthy Harvest Food Bank.

Food Bank Helps Farmers, Too

All 25 Food pantries participating in the USDA program have expressed concern about giving out more than what we believe the clients are able to use. After a June meeting to discuss the issue, we learned that we should expect to continue to receive large amounts of food until the impact on American farmers of the international tariffs on agricultural trade is relieved.

Healthy Harvest Food Bank Keeps Growing!

Prior to 2010, people from the seven or eight food pantries in the Northern Neck travelled all the way to Feedmore in Richmond each month to pick up the food for distribution. In 2010, the Northern Neck Food Bank was formed using kitchen/storage space at White Stone's Church of the Nazarene. Within the year, they moved to a small warehouse in Irvington. Outgrowing that space, the food bank, now renamed the Healthy Harvest Food Bank, moved to its current Warsaw location in 2013.

The Warsaw location was also outgrown several years ago, so Healthy Harvest is in the process of moving again. Construction of a brand new \$2.25 million facility is expected to be completed later this year. Just over half the money for the new facility has already been committed; additional contributions are still being solicited.

Speaking of Healthy Harvest, did you know that the staff there includes two of Ebenezer's own? Mary Jenkins started as a full-time Community Relations Coordinator in May of this year. Scott Flickinger has been an Agricultural Specialist part-timer since April 2014. He's been seen leading volunteers in the gleaning fields from mid-June till mid-December, picking up donated produce from local farmers every Monday, and making deliveries to local pantries two or three days a week.

Our food pantry is a great opportunity to serve and to work with other churches – and other Christians – in a mission effort right here at home.
