






FOREWORD




The Senior play, entitled "Wild Oranges" was unusually successful. A large and attentive audience attended the play.



JUNIOR-SENIOR BANQUET AND PROM





Losses were to Los Lunas, Bulldogs, Menaul, Indians, Socorro, Reserve, and Lourdes. In the District tournament the Steers were defeated by Socorro 31-25. Socorro went on to win the district championship. Total points scored by Magdalena were 492 to opponents 512. Trips were made to Albuquerque, Los Lunas, Belen, Quemado, Reserve, and Socorro.
