A Time for Thanksgiving

In Psalm 100:4 the psalmist gives thanks and praise to God. It's Thanksgiving! But how can you keep the focus of the festival on giving thanks? Here are some ways to involve the entire family in getting ready for the feast while counting their blessings.

Making place cards is a way to involve even preschoolers in getting ready for Thanksgiving. Fold in half index cards. (They come in some festive colors). Apply a sticker or two for more color. Older children can write a short message of thanks on each person's card. Messages might say: "Thanks for being Matt's friend" or "You're the greatest, Grandma!" Save some stickers to decorate paper napkins.

Stage a family puppet play. Supply paper bags or old socks, glue, markers, and yarn or fabric scraps to make simple hand puppets. For script ideas, have the puppets tell for whom and what they want to give thanks. If you have access to a video camera, film the puppet play for viewing after the meal. A great way to share Thanksgiving's blessings would be to send a copy of the video to shut-ins or to relatives who live far away.

Say "thank you, God, for the birds" by providing a thanksgiving feast for the birds. String popped corn on thread, or spread peanut butter on a pine cone or spoon it into individual egg carton cups. Sprinkle bird seed over the peanut butter. Attach a yarn loop to each treat and hang them from trees.

Ask each person to show one object and tell how that object reminds them of a gift, skill, or talent for which that person is thankful. Suggested objects include: a pen, baseball, ice skate, sheet music, and so forth. Group these items in the center of the table as a "Thankful Cornucopia" table dec-

oration. (If you are unable to collect objects, ask each person to draw or write something for which they are thankful on a small piece of writing paper. Discuss what each person identifies.)

Ask each family member to hold up the object or picture they added to the "Thankful Cornucopia" described above. Together, thank God for the blessing that object symbolizes.

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CHRISTIAN EDUCATION

We are so excited to be together in Sunday school again! All adults and children participating in Sunday school are wearing masks and we have taken all other precautions employed by the local schools so we are finally able to gather in person!

We began the year with a module on the Fruit of the Spirit, which enabled us to sing one of our favorite songs for three straight weeks. We celebrated St. Francis Sunday on October 3rd with our second annual pet blessing, and then our lessons continued with a unit on love, which of course is the central message of Christianity: God loved the world so much that he sent his Son to us. And if we love God and love others in all that we do we will fulfill all the commandments.

Reformation Sunday is on October 31st this year—the actual date that Luther nailed his famous 95 theses to the door of the cathedral! We'll celebrate that event and then follow with our All Saints Day celebration on November 7th. In November we'll be collecting hats and gloves for Gemma Services (formerly Silver Springs – Martin Luther School) and talking about thankfulness.

3-in-1, our confirmation program also began in September with in-person (masked) instruction. It's delightful to be together once again.

Please continue to pray for our wonderful young folks at Augustus.

Christian Parenting **Taking Care of Me**

Our bodies are a gift from God. God expects us to take care of them. As soon as they're ready, young children should be taught the importance of hygiene, grooming, exercise, sleep, and nutrition.



As they grow, broaden their concept of taking care of their bodies by discussing 1 Corinthians 6:19-20 where our bodies are called temples of the Holy Spirit. Ask your children to think of those things that wouldn't be appropriate to drag into the Holy Spirit's temple. Help them understand that just as lack of sleep, no exercise, poor hygiene, and junk food can stunt their physical growth, unwholesome attitudes and behaviors can stunt their spiritual growth. Then discuss which behaviors would enhance their spiritual growth and glorify God. Be prepared to reflect on your own lifestyle as well. Let's help our children grow strong both physically and spiritually so they can glorify God with their entire beings.

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Money Matters

Personal Financial Stewardship

Reducing and Eliminating Credit Card Debt

Because desires often exceed the ability to pay, many of us have a lot of debt. Our dependence on debt is possibly the most widely abused principle in God's Word regarding money. Scripture does not forbid us from borrowing money, but it does point out its disadvantages. "The rich rule over the poor, and the borrower is servant to the lender" (Proverbs 22:7). Despite God's warnings, our dependence on debt continues to grow.

Some debt is unavoidable. In the case of a job loss or health problems, it may not be possible to avoid debt. In addition, some debt is acceptable,



such as debt for educational purposes or home mortgages. Debt that is acquired for the purpose of spending money to make money makes economic sense.

The most troublesome debt in our society is credit card debt. Credit is a means of renting money when we need it, for as long as we need it. Credit allows us to enjoy something now and pay for it later. Unfortunately, for many of us, credit cards are easily accessible, and, in today's society, we are encouraged to take advantage of them. With so much available credit, it is no surprise that the number of bankruptcies and divorces related to financial tension is high. We may enjoy the spending that gets us into debt, but it is not much fun getting out of it. In spite of all the warnings about debt, we are still willing to buy now and pay later. Credit cards should contain the clause, "This credit card can be hazardous to your financial well-being."

It has been said that there are three types of people. Those who "have," those who "have not," and those who "have not paid for what they have." Many people are paying five to 20 percent or more of their budgets toward credit card debt, which places a great burden on family expenses. The financial burden is caused by having to pay for things you bought in the past at the same time you are paying for current expenses, as well as the high interest rates that credit card companies charge. For example, if you have a credit card balance of \$2,000 at a 15 percent annual interest rate and you remit only the minimum payment, it will take 17.5 years to repay the \$2,000 balance. The total cost, including interest charges, increases to \$4,517.62. In the time it may take to pay off your credit cards, most things that were purchased will have been lost, stolen, or worn out. We live in a society in which enough is never enough. One of the biggest reasons we get into debt is greed. "Watch out! Be on your guard against all kinds of greed; a man's life does not consist in the abundance of his possessions" (Luke 12:15). Jesus was criticizing the notion that the value of life is determined by the number of possessions we have. In order to avoid going deeper and deeper into unnecessary debt, a change in attitude is required. Curbing wants and desires leads to greater success in staying out of debt.



The Neonatal Intensive Care Unit (NICU) is a place where survival is on the heart of each mother and father, doctor and nurse. And that is the story of Jackeline's newborns. Each little one who finds themselves in the unit has a team of nurses and doctors-- *a family*-- that is doing all they can to ensure the baby's survival. Jackeline's joy on the day of NICU discharge gives us a reason to rejoice. Please take the time to click the link above and join us in the celebration.

We have once again been in a whirlwind of activity and will try to get you caught up on recent months! We were able to travel back to the States this past summer to receive our COVID vaccines, attend a Global Mission Summer Conference virtually (for us, this was in a loft at Jodi's parents at the lake!), and spend time with extended family. We were also able to visit a few churches that were in a close proximity to us and were meeting in-person. We were especially grateful for time with our parents. It was also a special time for our children to reconnect with their grandparents. They have been a source of love and support for us for all these years.

And finally, the most recent update, I (Jodi) have finally received my renewed Tanzanian Work and Resident Permits, after considerable time! Thank you for the many prayers offered up for this need. I am happily back again at Selian Lutheran Hospital, and look forward to new collaboration with my Tanzanian colleagues.



Tiny Feet, Big Steps: Advancing Care of Critically Ill and Premature Babies in Tanzania

Next week we will be hosting what is a "first-of-its-kind" clinical neonatology conference in Tanzania, and possibly East Africa. We have doctors and nurses arriving from 40 government and faith hospitals across Tanzania. Mission hospitals in Kenya, Ethiopia and Malawi are also sending their NICU staff. It's been a huge undertaking, and the culmination of years of work demonstrating that *sick babies need not die!* We have worked hard to train providers in northern Tanzania, and now we take our training to a broader audience. Fortunately, we have also been able to raise funds to make the conference affordable for all.

If you love this picture of Tanzanian mother with her baby, it was a painting by a local Tanzanian artist (Victor Tarimo), created for our NICU. The artist was inspired by our work with babies, and created this unique painting to celebrate both mothers and new life. We took an image of the painting to advertise our neonatology conference. The original painting now hangs outside our NICU.

Continual skin-to-skin holding of a small baby is called "Kangaroo Mother Care" (KMC), and is essential for the survival of low birth weight & premature babies in hospitals across Africa. It is being adopted worldwide for its benefits.

Grateful for this time in the wilderness, disconnected from devices and the call of work, we paddled, portaged, laughed, and slept under the stars with the sound of the wind in the pines. The Rev. Patricia Ann Curtis Davenport assumed office as bishop of the Southeastern Pennsylvania Synod of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America (ELCA) on August 1, 2018.

Overwhelmingly elected by the Synod Assembly on May 5, 2018, she is the first African-American woman to be elected a bishop in the 3.8-million-member ELCA. She currently serves as Vice-Chair of the ELCA Conference of Bishops

"Southeastern Pennsylvania Synod is already a great Synod, and our mantra is we can do more together than we can alone," Bishop Davenport says. "I believe I was elected because I lifted up: We can do more, and we can do it together. How do we move from the mentality of 'the church is declining,' to building up the kingdom of God? That's what we're called to do."

Bishop Davenport is leading SEPA Synod in making disciples through information, education and inspiration that leads to transformation. She believes this is the way the Synod makes a difference in the five-county area she is called to serve.

At the time of her election, Bishop Davenport served the Synod as Director for Evangelical Mission and Assistant to the Bishop, with responsibilities for new and redeveloping congregations, congregational vitality, and urban ministries.

Bishop Davenport is a member of Spirit and Truth Worship Center, Yeadon, which she served as its founding pastor/developer. She received the master of divinity degree from the former Lutheran Theological Seminary at Philadelphia, now United Lutheran Seminary. She received a Certificate in Black Church Concentration from the seminary's Urban Theological Institute and is a certified ELCA Level One Coach.

She has served the national church in a variety of capacities, including co-chair of the ELCA's Guiding Coalition, member of the Congregational Vitality and African Descent Strategy teams, and secretary of the board of Lutheran Services in America. She is a lifetime member of the Philadelphia chapter of the African Descent Lutheran Association and is active with the Black Clergy of Philadelphia, Metropolitan Christian Council, the Religious Leaders Council of Greater Philadelphia and Vicinity, and Christians United Against Addictions.

She is the widow of Joel Davenport, with three adult children: Joel, Shanena and Jamar; and seven grandchildren, Joel III, Dominic, Chance, Cristian, Kayden, Justice and Kaleb, who are her heart's delight.
