ACTS Holds Open House at Keystone Addictions Receiving Facility

On July 11, more than 75 people attended an open house at the now open Keystone Addictions Receiving Facility located at the Keystone Residential Treatment Program campus in Tarpon Springs. The new 10-bed facility is a medically supervised inpatient short-term acute care detoxification and stabilization facility for adults with significant substance impairment or cooccurring mental health and substance use disorders. At the open house, speakers included Pinellas County Commissioner Kathleen Peters, Ramona Schaefer from Pinellas County Sheriff's Office, Larry Allen from Central Florida Behavioral Health Network, as well as ACTS CEO Asha Terminello and ACTS COO Cris Riviere who led the ribbon cutting. "We're so happy to be in the community and being the first secure treatment adult addictions receiving facility in Pinellas County," Asha Terminello said before the ribbon cutting. The facility is meant for short stays and is for voluntary and involuntary individuals, primarily in Pinellas County and other parts of the SunCoast region, she said. ACTS Amethyst Respite Center is celebrating its 10th anniversary this August, and Deputy Stephanie Krager with the Hillsborough County Sheriff's Office has been involved since the inception bringing the first client to the ARC in 2009. "For law enforcement, the ARC is an easy drop off for folks with no resources," Dep. Krager said. "Before the ARC opened, Hillsborough County didn't have an alternative for people who were under the influence other than the hospital or jail. Law enforcement can bring a client to the ARC to hopefully start people on the right track." Clients at the ARC must be 18 years of age or older, under the influence of alcohol and/ or drugs, and ambulatory. Do You Know What An Overdose Looks Like?

August 31 is International Overdose Awareness Day. More than 70,200 Americans died from drug overdoses in 2017, including illicit drugs and prescription opioids—compared to 16,849 drug overdose deaths in 1999. Here are common signs of overdose for opioid drugs:

- No response to stimuli
- Shallow, labored or no breathing
- Cannot be woken up
- Snoring or gurgling
- Blue/grey lips or finger tips
- Floppy arms or legs

Overdose symptoms vary depending on the substance used. Click to see common overdose signs for <u>alcohol</u>, <u>depressants</u>, <u>opioids</u>, <u>psychoactive substances</u> and <u>stimulants</u>. If you or a loved one have a substance use issue, call us at 813.246.4899 for help.
