

42. (Cont'd) with straight hoodmolds. A low hip-roofed, five-sided bay window featuring a wide bracketed cornice and row of vertical slats below roof-line protrudes from the north wall. Wrap-around front porch displays lattice, turned columns and pilasters and pediments over entry. A wood water table rests above the foundation. Additions and alterations include a back kitchen window and an enclosed back porch entry.

43. (Cont'd.) 1869 to Michael and Bridget Brennan who immigrated from Ireland to the U.S. in 1853. In the late 1860's, Michael was a laborer in Norman Kelley's quarry (ER-339), and lived on the island's south shore, and by 1900, he was a foreman in the KIL&T Company's south quarry. Married in 1851, he and his wife, Bridget, had 9 children, most of the boys growing up to work in the quarries. Around 1900, son, Hugh, was a bookkeeper for the KIL&T Co., and by 1906 was superintendant of the south quarry (ER-338). Six years later he was general superintendant and had his office on the north side (ER-336), but by 1913 he resigned and was replaced by Arnold Deringer.

The house then was rented by Philip Rosswurm around 1914 until about 1930. Philip followed his older brother, Henry (who came to work for Sabra Hamilton on her northside farmstead around 1880. He later worked as a teamster (c. 1900), and owned his own home near the intersection of Huntington and Bookerman Rds. that was later used by the KIL&T Co. for their offices (ER-337). Philip Rosswurm and his wife, Minnie, were married in 1890. Around 1900 they rented a home (ERI-1550) on Chapel St., and Philip was employed as a blacksmith, probably for the KIL&T Co. By 1910, the family was renting a home on Division St., and Philip was employed as a machinist in the KIL&T Co. shops. Their daughter, Ruth, was a teacher in the public school (ERI-1610). By 1914, they were renting this house from the company. The family was joined by James Self around 1922, who came to live with them after the death of his wife, Lydia Titus Self. (The Selfs had lived in the former Robert Hamilton house (ERI-1663).
