

American Cranberrybush Viburnum

This native shrub is a good nectar source for butterflies and insects. Viburnums are larval hosts to the Spring Azure and Henry's Elfin butterflies. The fruits feed songbirds and gamebirds including the Ruffed Grouse of which it is a staple of their diet. This shrub provides good cover for many small mammals and birds. The fruit is edible both raw or cooked and makes excellent preserves that are high in Vitamin C. The Cranberry Bush Viburnum has a good flower display in the spring and excellent fall color.



Viburnum trilobum

- Hardiness: Zone 2-7
- Size: 8-12' x same width
- Habit: Upright, multi-stemmed, round-topped, medium growth rate. Forms colonies
- Flower: White, mid to late May, impressive
- Fruit: Bright red, 1/3", September often until February, edible
- Culture: Prefers well-drained, moist soil and Sun to partial shade. Adaptable, except overly wet.
- Uses: Screening, informal hedge, high wildlife value, birds, butterflies, edible, fall color
