

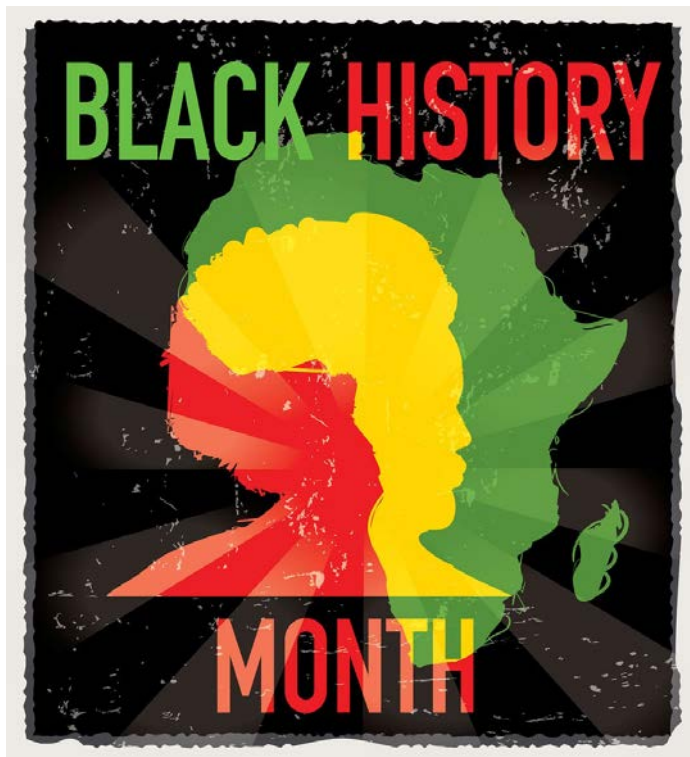

## Pastor's Pen

Genesis 48 recalls Jacob blessing the sons of his son Joseph. The backdrop to the story is that Joseph's brothers sold him into slavery because of his dreams of greatness. They hated him because he was the favorite son of their father Jacob.

The Lord promotes Joseph in the midst of his perilous adventures. Joseph reminds us that character counts regardless of what house we find ourselves in. Joseph walks with integrity in his Father's house, Potiphar's house, the Prison house and Pharaoh's house.

Because Joseph's brothers have lied to Jacob, he never expects to see Joseph alive. But God does something wonderful. He allows Jacob to see and bless Joseph's sons.

Several thoughts emerge from this account. There ought to be multigenerational relationships in our families. Grandparents should have a wealth of biblical knowledge and life experience to pass along to their grandchildren. The relationships between parents and children should be such that we are able to overlook one another's mistakes for the benefit and blessing of grandchildren.

Jacob was not perfect. His sons were not either. Nor would his grandchildren be. Yet they cherished the time they had together.

We should make the best of the time we have. Heal old hurts. Talk through hitches in the relationships and pass along useful helpful experiences and wisdom.

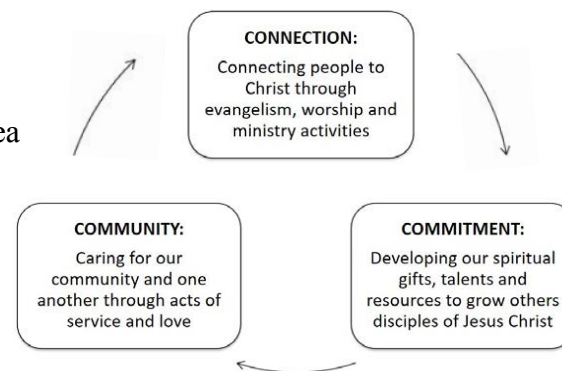

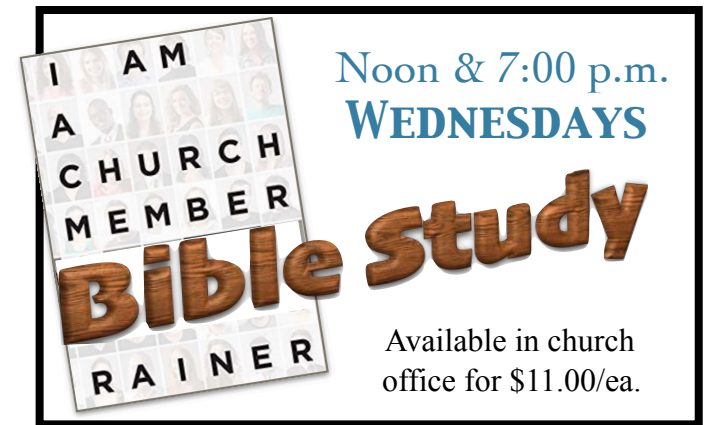


## COMMUNITY

Cathay Williams was the one and only female Buffalo Soldier, posing as a man named William Cathay to enlist in the 38th infantry in 1866. She served for two years before a doctor discovered that she was a woman, leading to her discharge.

Both Condoleezza Rice and Martin Luther King, Jr. started college when they were just 15 years old. She studied political science at the University of Denver; he majored in sociology at Morehouse College in Atlanta.

Journalist Ida Wells-Barnett refused to give up her railcar seat for a white man in 1884, and bit a conductor on the hand when he tried to force her. She was dragged off the train. She sued the railroad and initially won, but the decision was overturned.

The media made the Black Panthers notorious for their Afros, dark apparel, and willingness for armed self-defense, but their manifesto for change launched programs that benefited Black communities nationwide, like free dental care, breakfast for low-income children, even drama classes.

Lincoln University in Pennsylvania is the first institution of higher education founded for African-Americans. It paved the way for the 104 other historically Black colleges, which have produced distinguished alums like Thurgood Marshall, Spike Lee, and Oprah.

Liberia was founded and colonized by expatriates. The West African country is one of two sovereign states in the world started as a colony for ex-slaves and marginalized Black people. Sierra Leone is the other.

Before he was a blockbuster actor, Will Smith was The Fresh Prince and, along with partner Jazzy Jeff, won the first-ever Grammy for Best Rap Performance. They boycotted the awards because the category was barred from television.

The hair brush, lawn mower, cellphone, refrigerator, and — thank heavens — the air conditioner were all the fruits of African-American inventors' creative laboring.
