The title of the book, You Don't' Have to Be Wrong for Me to be Right, by Rabbi Brad Hirschfeld, fascinated me, especially its subtitle, "Finding Faith Without Fanaticism." I read the 250+ page book in about four hours.

Rabbi Hirschfield used to be one of those fanatics, committed to reconstructing the Jewish state within its biblical borders. But an important act of religious intolerance carried out by one of his fanatical kind - the random shooting and killing of Palestinian students on the West Bank - combined with a harsh justification about the greater good that will be realized as a result of this injustice - brought him to a new understanding of himself and of the way in which he wanted to live in the world. He wrote this book as a personal journal to describe how he could hold

strong religious convictions even as he found ways to find common ground and to harmonize his life with those who held alternate beliefs.

It was the first modern Chief Rabbi of Palestine and mystic, Rabbi Abraham Isaac Kook, who wrote: "It is precisely the multiplicity of opinions that derive variegated souls and backgrounds which enriches wisdom and brings about enlargement. In the end all matters will be properly understood and it will be recognized that it was impossible for the structure of peace to be built without those trends that appears to be in conflict."

For a fabric to be strong, threads have cross each other - ply against each other, but just enough so that the warped and the woofed can work as one.

As we enter the time for the national political conventions, I have thought - and worried - a lot about the political dialogue in the country. I worry about political fanaticism - broad-ranging, often rage-filled, proclamations without subtly ... intended for headlines that belong in the National Enquirer, not part of the national debate. I am worried about easy answers, single threads for complex issues.

And I am worried about political fanaticism, some of which has already led to violence.

Over the years, I have tried to engage in both a religious and political practice called "passionate moderacy." And I have found that such a philosophy gets little play in the popular press. It's boring compared to the black-or-white singlemindedness that is the stuff either (1) of idealistic fanaticism - "This is the way the world works and you can't tell me otherwise!" - or (2) of relativistic fanaticism, resulting in a kind of individualistic nihilism - "I've got mine; too bad for you."

The first kind of fanaticism is justified either by an outside force like God, or by forces... which are attributed to the nature of the social beast, the forces usually depicted as an economic truism (Marxism; completely unfettered capitalism), which, as we have seen, especially over the past few years, and in light of the evidence arising from the ground-breaking work of Thomas Piketty, no matter the prevailing ideology, turned out not to be completely workable in practice. (The Kansas experiment, for example.)

The second kind of fanaticism arises when a culture - such as ours - over-values the rights of the individual ("The world revolves around me and mine, and everyone else must get out of the way.") compared with the health of the building blocks - communities and beyond - of civil society ("We're all in this together, so we have to invest some personal comforts on behalf of the common good.")

Think of this imperfect analogy. In college, I was an oarsman in an eight-man crew. To become a better oarsman, even for an "eight," sometimes one had to go out in a "single" - just you by yourself - and learn

BThe Buzz with Rabbi B



Before becoming a rabbi at Temple Beth Shalom, I used to spend my summers at Camp Interlaken JCC, a Jewish camp in the North Woods of Wisconsin. For sixteen summers I was a camper, counselor, unit head, program head, and Camp Rabbi. In my later years at camp, around this time of the year, I had the same issue to work through every year: How do we, as a camp, observe the Jewish holiday of Tisha B'Av. Tisha B'Av, a holiday named for the date on which it is observed (like 4th of July) is one of the least known holidays, thanks to it happening on the Ninth of Av, which usually falls in the middle of the summer. Unless you grew up going to a Jewish camp or with a more traditional background, it is likely that you've never even heard of this Fast Day. On it's surface, Tisha B'Av is a simple holiday - it commemorates a number of tragic events in Jewish history, that supposedly all happened on the 9th of Av, the most important being the destruction of the 1st and 2nd Temples in Jerusalem. Over time, it has morphed into a day to commemorate many of the calamities that have befallen the Jewish people.

If we look a little deeper into Tisha B'Av, we will see a number of important lessons waiting to be taught. One of the most important of those is that we must remember to treat people humanely, and we cannot stand idly by when someone does not. We cannot stand by when someone is being hurt, we must act. The rabbis wanted to find a reason that the Temples were destroyed, and illustrated the reason with a story:

A wealthy man had a good friend named Kamza and an enemy named Bar Kamza. He was holding a party and sent his servant to invite Kamza. The servant made a mistake and invited Bar Kamza instead. When the host saw Bar Kamza sitting at the table, he said, "What are you doing here? You tell tales about me! Get out!" Bar Kamza, said, "If you let me stay, I will pay for what I eat and drink." The host refused. "Then I will pay for half the party," he said. The host again refused. Bar Kamza then offered to pay for all of the party. The host refused and kicked him out.

Bar Kamza said to himself, "Since the Rabbis who are the leaders of the community were all witnesses to my humiliation and did nothing to stop it, they must have approved of how he treated me! I will then go and inform on them to the Roman government!"

He went to the Emperor and told him that the Jews were rebelling against him.

"How can I be sure?" the Emperor asked. "Send them a calf to sacrifice and see if they will do it." So the Emperor sent a calf with Bar Kamza. On the way, Bar Kamza made a blemish on the calf, which would have made it unfit for sacrifice.


When the Rabbis received it, they were inclined to sacrifice it so as not to offend the authorities. One rabbi, Rabbi Zechariah ben Abkulas, objected saying, "People will then say it is OK to sacrifice unfit animals!" The Rabbis then proposed killing Bar Kamza so that he would not go back to the Emperor telling him they did not offer his sacrifice. Rabbi Zechariah ben Abkulas objected again saying, "People will then think it is OK to kill people who blemish animals!"

Said Rabbi Yohanan, "It was because of the actions of Rabbi Zechariah ben Abkulas that the Temple was destroyed, Jerusalem burned and the people exiled." On the surface, it seemed like Rabbi Zecharia ben Abkulas was doing what was right. He wanted to preserve Jewish tradition, but in so doing, he forgot to act when Bar Kamza was being humiliated in front of an entire party.

Many of us feel a sense of despair as we have watched the news and



Advisor to BeSTY (High School Youth Group) and JuBeSTY (7th/8th Grade Youth Group)



balance and technique. Otherwise, sometimes you practiced your oar techniques in a simulation tank. And then of course, there was the endless on shore training with running hills and weightlifting. All that effort was meant to build up the individual oarsman.

But most of us would never compete as a single. What we had to do with that individual work was to take all of that personal training and talent and making it harmonize with the rest of the oarsmen in the boat. That's why its called "crew." You might have been as an individual of brutish strength, but you had to tone it down when the boat needed more speed and technique. You might not have the lung strength, but, no matter: You had to keep pace with the team's rhythm no matter what. Because you might be a bit taller or a bit shorter, your reach would differ from the oarsman fore and aft. If you did not adjust, your individual effort might be superior, but you boat would drag.

Indeed, sometimes a technically inferior oarsman individually would often "fit" the crew better due to some factor which even experienced coaches could not fathom. And some folks could not or would not harmonize. Those teammates were constitutionally better suited to be individuals in single shells, or in smaller "fours."

Let me make the shift: Just as there is no ideal oarsmen for a given situation requiring harmony, there are no perfect ideas for every given situation. In crew, everyone uses his/her best talents and training and then modifies to fit the boat's needs under the many water and weather conditions under which any practice session or meet might transpire. And in any situation, the oarsman that you were yesterday might have to be measured and modified to fit the circumstances - in and outside the boat - that prevail today.

In the realm of ideas, we must similarly look, in our cooperative enterprise, be it in our religious life or our political life for strong and talent folks who also are cooperative by nature. Most such people speak in measured ways, whether in their religious or their political life.

As for me, I enter each day with a direction, burnished by time and experience (trial and many errors). But am ready and open to redirect when such doubt arises that it requires a re-gauging of the givens. My faith and my political world view are constantly evolving as I remind myself of the view of Reinhold Niebuhr who once famously wrote about when orthodoxies claim, "We are right.": "It is when we are not sure that we are doubly sure."

Those who are passionately moderate know, per Rabbi Hirschfeld, "You Don't' Have to Be Wrong for Me to be Right." We can work off of what is working for us now, with the openness to moderate. The poet, Yehuda Amichai put it this way: "From the place where we are right, flowers will never grow in the spring. The place where we are right is trampled like a yard. But doubts and loves dig up the world like a mole, a plow."

And one more thing: Passionate moderates must also learn to find ways to hear fundamentalists and to channel their energy and idealism. Like crew coaches teach the oarsmen to do in a boat, we must press ourselves to find a common end and to combine our efforts cooperatively to achieve it.

Our crew team was always pretty good, not the top winners in every meet, but competitive always. And when we did well, it was not because we had the better athletes, or were in better shape, or had better training (analogous to a person's ideas). We could have had all that and still lost. It was because our boat was in sync, the oars all hitting the water at the same time, channeling our passions into the kind of harmonization that made for winning times.

Let us look for the harmonizers. They are not namby-pambies. They are the smart ones that realize that, like the efficient and successful crew teams, when we account for all the conditions, and still pull together, we may achieve greater success.





social media this summer. We have witnessed violence in our own country against the LGBT community, against people of color, and against law enforcement officers — all of whom were just living their lives, doing their jobs, when violence erupted. The Tisha B'Av fast begins at sundown on August 13, through the evening of August 14. May we observe it with our prayers and our hearts, and may we observe it by working to make a difference in our world.
