Harmonica Musings

Have you ever heard of a condition called "Stage Fright"? Of course, you have and many of us to some degree suffer from it. It's the inability to focus on some specific task while being in front of an audience. What essentially is a manifestation of the "fight or flight" instinct has a useful evolutionary purpose but there's no real good reason for it to kick in when you're just going to play harmonica or talk on stage.

There are a number of useful strategies to keep your lizard brain from engaging and inhibiting your ability to perform. The number one thing experts say to do is "practice, practice, practice, practice". If you are sufficiently prepared (through practice) you are much more likely to succeed. Still, those <u>scary</u> people are still staring at you and judging you! ...No, they're not! Try practicing in front of a mirror. Look at yourself and the imaginary people all around you. Purposely, while you're playing, think about other things with the goal of still getting through your song effectively. Imagining things that could potentially make you anxious, greatly improves your confidence when you're finally performing.

A few other helpful hints include trying slow deep breathing exercises before you get up on stage. This oxygenates your brain and often relaxes you. Some silly mental imagery also sometimes works. If everyone in the audience is naked, then you certainly have no reason to be embarrassed. Thinking about the crowd as a bunch of diaper wearing babies is stupid but funny. Who couldn't perform in front of a bunch of children?

There are a lot of other techniques to employ but ultimately maybe you should try saying, "Oh screw it! I'm just going to have fun!"
