I am working on my third cookbook, The Happy Appetizer. If you have a favorite and would like to have me put it in my new cookbook, let me know. This is one of my favorite recipes that I've been working on.

Hummus has been around since ancient times. It plays a major part in mainly the Middle East and Mediterranean area. But it has become very popular in the United States.

Here is the basic recipe for Hummus with several different ingredients you can add to change the taste. It goes great with crackers, but also with flatbreads and pitas cut in quarters.

Basic Hummus

1 (15-ounce) can of chickpeas, rinsed. Save the liquid from the can.

1 clove garlic

1/4 cup olive oil

2 tablespoons tahini (sesame seed paste which can be purchased at supermarket)

2 tablespoons lemon juice


1 teaspoon ground cumin

Salt and pepper to taste

1/4 teaspoon paprika for topping

In a food processor, puree the chickpeas and garlic with the olive oil, lemon juice, tahini, cumin and salt and pepper to taste. Puree until creamy. If needed add one or two tablespoons of the saved chickpea liquid to achieve a smooth consistency. Transfer to a fancy serving bowl, top with paprika. Serve with crunchy veggies or flatbread.

Here are two other recipes for hummus using the basic recipe.



Use the above basic recipe and add to it: 1 large or 2 small avocados.

Cut up and place in the food processor with the rest of the ingredients.

Add a ½ teaspoon of coriander.

Blend and serve with crackers, veggies or flatbreads.

Pumpkin Hummus

You'll see that pumpkins are not only for pies but for wonderful hummus.

1 can chickpeas, drained and save the liquid

1 cup pumpkin puree

¼ cup tahini

1 lemon, juiced

1 clove garlic

1/4 teaspoon cinnamon

Salt and pepper to taste

¼ teaspoon cayenne

Put all ingredients in the food processer. Process until smooth. If

need to, add some of the saved chickpea liquid to make sure mixture is smooth. Put in a fancy bowl. Serve with flatbreads, crackers and pitas.

Fort Myers Republican Women's Club

Chauncey Goss, Board chairman, South Florida Water Management District, will be the featured speaker at the Sept. 17 luncheon meeting of the Fort Myers Republican Women's Club. Goss was appointed to the Board in March 2019 and will serve until March 2023. The district is a regional governmental agency that manages the water resources in the southern half of the state, covering 16 counties.

Goss will discuss the key initiative of restoration of the Everglades - the largest environmental restoration project in the nation's history. As a long-time resident of Southwest Florida, Goss first became involved with water quality issues when he worked as the executive director of the Gasparilla Island Conservation and Improvement Association on Boca Grande in the early 1990s.

Goss is the founder and managing partner of Goss Practical Solutions – a firm that provides federal fiscal policy analysis and budget forecasting. Prior to starting the firm, Goss served as deputy staff director and director of budget review for the House Budget Committee under

Military News And Notes

More Major Artifacts Added As National Army Museum Takes Shape

Two historic helicopters, a World War I-era Liberty Truck, and an anti-aircraft weapon were the latest macro artifacts installed in the National Museum of the United States Army now under construction at Fort Belvoir, Va.

Crews recently hoisted into place one of the iconic "Huey" helicopters made famous during the Vietnam War. The massive, four-ton aircraft flown by the 129th Aviation Company, 10th Combat Aviation Battalion now hangs above the museum's Cold War Gallery.

Also installed was an R-4B helicopter, more commonly known as "The Sikorsky," in the Army and Society Gallery. The Sikorsky was the world's first mass-produced helicopter and used in World War II. Sikorsky helicopters made history in 1944 conducting the first combat rescue mission in the China-Burma-India Theater and the first helicopter mercy mission when it transported blood plasma to sailors who survived the sinking of the USS Turner.

In April, a World War I Liberty Truck and World War II Bofors Gun were placed into position. The Liberty Truck, also in the Army and Society Gallery, was the first truck specifically developed for military use. Experts say this truck was restored to near-original condition.

The scene displaying the Bofors Gun, a naval and land anti-

aircraft weapon adopted by the U.S. Army in 1941, will depict African-American soldiers of the 466th Anti-aircraft Artillery (AW) Battalion preparing to fire on Japanese aircraft attacking an Army airfield in New Guinea.

The museum will open next year at Fort Belvoir, Va., and construction of the building is largely funded by individual donations made through The Army Historical Foundation. The foundation also raises funds through the Army Brick Program and Unit Tributes, which allow individuals and Army units to order personalized bricks and plaques that will line the museum's outdoor pathways. These permanent recognitions can be ordered through the foundation's website, armyhistory.org.

Environmental And Economic Hazards

Marine life can easily be entangled in fishing line, nets, and six-pack rings. Fish, birds and turtles mistake trash like Styrofoam, plastics, and cigarette butts for food, which may eventually lead to starvation.

Marine debris weakens coastal economies by sapping dollars from the tourism and seafood industries. Tourism in Lee County contributed \$2 billion to the regional economy last year, and we'd like to keep it that way.

Cleaning Beaches

Keep Lee County Beautiful, supported by the Ocean Conservancy and Florida Fish & Wildlife, organizes coastal cleanups in the fall to remove debris along our shoreline. In



the last five years, our Coastal Cleanup program has brought together more than 11,000 volunteers to remove over 90,000 pounds of trash from Lee County waterways.

International Coastal Cleanup

Keep Lee County Beautiful is the Lee County coordinator for Ocean Conservancy's annual International Coastal Cleanup (ICC), the largest volunteer effort of its kind. Every September for 31 years, ICC has motivated over nine million people from around the world to pick up over 144 million pounds of trash from nearly 300,000 miles of shoreline.

Mailbox Maintenance And Repair

Mailbox doors have a closure spring that eventually breaks after thousands of openings. It is important to replace them as soon as they are discovered as they usually result in a broken door, which is a much more expensive



repair. Call **Dennis Shelley**, (239) 887-1042. The cost of installing a new spring is \$34. If the door casting breaks, it costs an additional \$112 to repair the door. Dennis also has specially manufactured flagpole holders to match the lampposts. They are available for \$89 installed. Your mailbox and lamppost can also be repainted for \$49, which will bring them back to their "like-new" appearance. Dennis also offers handyman services.

Lee County Yard Waste Regulations

- Do not place out for pickup more than 24 hours early.
- Yard waste must be containerized (50 pounds or less), or securely tied into bundles not heavier than 50 pounds and no longer than 6 feet in length.
- Up to 50 pounds of unbundled palm fronds may be placed at the curb. Any excess palm fronds must be tied into bundles, each weighing 50 pounds or less.
- When using plastic bags, make sure that the contents can be easily identified by the refuse truck driver (leave a twig or small branch sticking out).
- Call 239-337-0800 for a cost estimate for large-scale yard waste disposal projects when containerizing or bundling is difficult.
