RIO BOSQUE WETLANDS PARK



Wyler Tramway Hawkwatch Project




ON THE TRAIL

MEXICAN JAYS & PAINTED REDSTARTS

Southeast Anizona is one of the best birding locations in the country. Its deserts and mountains create a birding wonderland and combined with the closeness of subtropical Mexico allow for a diversity of birds found nowhere else in the USA.

We will concentrate on trying to find *Broad-billed*, *Violet-crowned*, *Magnificent*, and *White-eared HUMMING-BIRDS*. Also *Spotted Owl*, *Sulpher-bellied* and *Buff-breasted Flycatchers*, *Tropical*, *Thick-billed* and *Couch's Kingbird*. Most of these species are found only

in this Sky Island area of <u>Southeastern Arizona</u>. In addition we could see *Gray Hawk*, *Elegant Trogon*, *Bridled Titmouse*, *Bell's Vireo*, and *Abert's Towhee*. We <u>will find</u> the *Mexican Jay*, *Acorn* and *Gila Woodpecker*, *Cassin's Kingbird* and *Painted Redstart*.





A trip up I-25 (about 1 1/2 hours) to Percha and Caballo Dams State Parks. A Herring Gulls and Common Loons are frequently spotted at Caballo and a Golden-crowned kinglets and both Eastern and Western Bluebirds at Percha. Mergansers and Cormorants fish in the Lake just above the dam and many gulls are continuously flying by.

El Paso Heritage Week


A Synerbration of Regional Art, Culture, and History

Help Keep Our Raptors Alive

Are you looking for opportunities to make a difference? Please join us on Thursday, April 11, 10:00 - 11:00 A.M. at the Texas Parks and Wildlife Building, 200 N. Clark Drive for an informative meeting on how you can help save our raptors from being electrocuted.

Elda Rodriguez from El Paso Electric Company (EPEC) will be presenting on the new EPEC "Aviary Program". She will discuss the modification and retrofitting for the existing power poles in El Paso County, the new construction standards and Elda will instruct us on how to identify the potentially dangerous power lines.

The EPEC has 1,000 retrofitting safety devices to install in El Paso County. This is an opportunity to assist the EPEC in locating power lines that can be retrofitted in hawk habitats. Help us make sure that they will install the safety features in the best possible locations for raptor protection. I will provide detailed maps and volunteer groups will divide El Paso County, locate and mark the appropriate sites for safety features. I will compile the information for the electric company.
