## **Exploring Facts About Our Bibles**

## **Facts About Our Bibles**

<u>Facts are sensory perceivable</u>. They are not products of interpretation. Compare the following Facts to your Beliefs about your Bible.

The Bible, in the singular, does not exist.

There are many books called "The Bible" but they are not the same.

Different communities have different Bibles.

The two primary communities in this discussion are Jewish and Christian.

- Jewish and Christian Bibles are comprised of different books.
- The Jewish Tanakh and Christian Old Testaments have the same books, but the books are not in the same order.
- Jewish Scriptures and Christian Bibles are written in many different languages.

## **Communities & Their Bibles**

Jewish Communities have the Tanakh.

Christian Communities have an Old Testament and New Testament.

The Jewish Tanakh and Christian Old Testaments differ.

Old Testaments differ among the various Christian communities.

In order to clearly understand the facts above, <u>Click Here and see the books of the Tanakh</u> and <u>Christian Old Testaments</u>. Each list begins with the same book, <u>Genesis</u>, but <u>they end</u> with different books.

- Tanakh 2 Chronicles
- Roman Catholic Old Testament Malachi
- 1611 King James Translation has 13 books that come after Malachi.
- Protestant Old Testament Malachi

We will explore those differences on a future tour.

## **How Communities View the Tanakh & Old Testament**

The Tanakh and Old Testament are not self-standing books today.

A common assumption among Christians seems to be that because their *Christian Bibles* and *Jewish Scriptures* share the same books, the words in those books mean the same thing in both communities. I have witnessed many conversations like the one described below.

- A Christian, tells a Jew, "You obviously don't understand your Bible because, if you did, you would see how it predicts the Messiah Jesus!"
- The Jew responds, "Not only do you Christians see things in the text that are not there, you mistranslate and you yank verses out of context."

This reveals the primary difference between the way both communities read the words of books found in both of their Scriptures.

Christians read the Old Testament with Jesus.

Jews read the Tanakh without Jesus.

Although they share books, the communities interpret the shared verses differently.

- Jews read the Tanakh through the lens of postbiblical Jewish commentaries Mishnah, Talmud, and others.
- Christians read their Old Testament through the lens of the New Testament, as understood through the doctrines of 40,000 different denominations/paradenominations.

I will end this tour with this fact.

Sometimes "original" meanings of the words of the books they share have important differences from both Jewish and Christian readings.

The institutions of modern Judaism (*Rabbinic Judaism*) and Christianity (*Roman Catholic Church*) did not exist until after the 4<sup>th</sup> century CE. *Protestant Christianity* was created in the 16<sup>th</sup> century CE.

- Second Temple Judaism existed between the 5<sup>th</sup> century BCE until 70 CE.
- Jesus led his movement from 27 until 30 CE.
- Early Christianity began after 70 CE and ended in the 4th century CE.

We find different meanings of words of the Tanakh and Old Testament within Jewish and Christian documents. However, "the original manuscripts" of those books exist now, but science-based linguistic models make it possible to reconstruct options of what they meant in the cultures, time periods and places of their authors.

How do the facts above compare with your beliefs about your Bible?
