Dear brothers and sisters in Christ,

Christ is risen! He is risen indeed!

Because of the late date of Easter this year, we have the wonderful opportunity to celebrate the Easter season throughout May.

This late date of Easter also means that the Day of Pentecost, and therefore Confirmation, will be celebrated on June 8, 2025.

Consequently, Old Church Sunday must be moved to June 15, 2025, with one (1) combined service at 9:30 a.m. in the Old Church, followed by a light meal and a presentation in Fellowship Hall by the Reverend Doctor Karl Krueger.

Our Summer Schedule begins on June 22, 2025, with a service at 8:00 a.m. in the Old Church and at 9:30 a.m. in the air-conditioned Brick Church.

Last year, due to the attention and diligence of Trappe Borough, our sidewalks were replaced at no cost to Augustus through grants obtained by the Borough. Indeed, many sidewalks on Main Street were replaced, saving taxpayers a significant amount of money while also beautifying our Borough and making us a more walkable community. Over the winter a hairline crack has developed in one of our blocks. We have been assured by the Borough that the problem will be rectified when the contractors return this spring and summer as they replace more worn and decaying sidewalks in the Borough on Main Street. This effort has brought a renewed and welcoming appearance to our campus and the many shops and houses around us.

Augustus will again serve as the starting point of the annual Collegeville-Trappe Memorial Day Parade. This wonderful community event was initiated by the Collegeville-Trappe Ministerium, largely through the inspired leadership of our own Pastor Dr. Martha Kriebel when she was still Pastor of Trinity Church in Collegeville. Other groups have since taken on the leadership of the event, which has grown larger with each passing year. Augustus will again have a float with a replica of the Old Trappe Church on it in this year's parade. Mark your calendars and watch the parade on Memorial Day, on which our country honors those members of our armed forces who have died in the service of their country.

#### Ten Important Dogmas of the Lutheran Church By Bo Kristian Holm, Associate Professor, Systematic Theology, Aarhus University



#### 9. The priesthood of all believers

No one Christian is closer to God than others. Therefore, there is in principle no difference between ordinary people and pastors. The ministry of the pastor has been established to ensure the pure preaching of the Gospel and the right administration of the sacraments: baptism and holy communion. The pastor carries out this ministry in the congregation where he or she serves, but he or she is not the mediator between Christians and God. See Article V of the Augsburg Confession.

Augsburg Confession: [V. Concerning the Office of Preaching]

"To obtain such faith God instituted the office of preaching, giving the gospel and the sacraments. Through these, as through means, he gives the Holy Spirit who produces faith, where and when he wills, in those who hear the gospel. It teaches that we have a gracious God, not through our merit but through Christ's merit, when we so believe.

Condemned are the Anabaptists and others who teach that we obtain the Holy Spirit without the external word of the gospel through our own preparation, thoughts, and works."

Speaking to his disciples, Jesus said, "If anyone comes to me and does not hate his father and mother, his wife and children, his brothers and sisters – yes, even his own life – he cannot be my disciple" (Luke 14:26).

He tried explaining his task to them. He told them about the coming suffering he would endure, that he would be killed, but that he would rise again. "Never!" exclaimed Peter. How did Jesus reply? "Oh, thank you, Peter. That's so thoughtful and brave of you, Peter." No, that's not what Peter heard. "Get behind me, Satan! You are a stumbling block to me; you do not have in mind the things of God, but the things of men" (Matthew 16:21-23).

It's difficult for us to understand Jesus' command to leave our families, even to hate them, so that we can follow him. Our difficulty comes because we have in mind the things of men, not of God.

We know Jesus loved his family. On the cross, his request of John was to care for his mother. We know he loved his friends. He wept at Lazarus' tomb. We also know that Jesus never wavered in his love for us, and that's why he "resolutely set out for Jerusalem" (Luke 9:51). Because he had in mind the things of God, he

could accomplish the eternal good of all mankind.

What about you? Are you keeping in mind the things of God? Can you say, "Get behind me" to well-meaning family or friend who would deter you from the path on which you know God has set you? Be encouraged by your Savior who has fulfilled perfectly all that he asks you to do. Be inspired by him who set aside honor and glory to pay the price of your failures. Then pick up the cross he gives you and be his disciple (Luke 14:27).

#### Ashamed of Christ?

The streets were packed with people shouting, "Hosanna! Blessed is he who comes in the name of the Lord! (John 12:13). Although he rode down that street on a donkey, the crowds still saw him as the king who would deliver them from oppression.

The disciples, too, envisioned an earthly kingdom with Jesus ruling overall and themselves sitting at his right and left hands (Mark 10:37, 41).

As the events of the week unfolded, however, that hope had evaporated. Still, the disciples and the faithful few followed their Master and stood at the foot of the cross, watching and waiting, unashamed as the One they loved and trusted hung nearly naked, bruised, and bleeding in seeming defeat as he died a death reserved for the vilest criminal. Were they responding to Jesus' words that, if they were ashamed of him, he would be ashamed of them before his Father? "If anyone is ashamed of me and my words, the Son of Man will be ashamed of him when he comes in his glory and in the glory of the Father and of the holy angels" (Luke 9:26). Perhaps, but more likely their love surpassed any feeling of shame that their cause, along with their Lord, was lost.

1 Corinthians 13:13 tells us, "And now these three remain: faith, hope and love. But the greatest of these is love." At times faith is dim, and hope is distant. Love overcomes shame and fear and doubt. Love brought Jesus here the first time, and love will bring him back again.

While driving in Pennsylvania, a family caught up to an Amish carriage. The owner of the carriage obviously had a sense of humor, because attached to the back of the carriage was a hand printed sign: "Energy efficient vehicle ... Runs on oats and grass. Caution: Do not step in exhaust."



Is Your Light Shining?

One of God's greatest blessings is sunlight.

Light is so basic, so necessary, and so wonderful. It is essential for life. Because of the light from the sun, we can see the beauty of God's creation. We have light because God said, "Let there be light, and there was light" (Genesis 1:3). Until God made light, the world was dark.

What the Creator God did for the earth, the Redeemer God does for us humans. John, the apostle, tells us how this has come about.

"In the beginning was the Word, and the Word was with God, and the Word was God. The Word became flesh and made his dwelling among us... (John 1:1, 14). In Jesus, John told us, "The true light that gives light was coming into the world" (John 1:9).


Jesus is that true light, and he told us, "You are the light of the world" (Matthew 5:14). It is his light within us being reflected that allows us to carry out his command: "Let your light shine before men, that they may see your good deeds and praise your Father in heaven" (Matthew 5:16). An old epitaph reads, "What I gave, I have; what I spent, I had; what I kept, I lost."
