
Hawkinsville, GA Duo Perform at Shepherd Hill Opry

On Saturday, July 22nd, Shepherd Hill Opry hosted its first ever July edition of 'Concert on the Hill', as four musicians performed for those in attendance. Co-founder Becky Williamson Martin said that the turnout was a bit lower then usual, but suggested that it was due to the concert being the first ever in July. Approxi-mately 30 people were in attendance to enjoy gospel music from Mike Till from Northport, Shannon Knight from Guin, Alabama, and Clay Holmes and Wayne Hol-comb from Hawkinsville, Georgia.

Holcomb opened the evening by singing to the audience, followed by Till and Holmes, before Knight finished off the evening. Clay Holmes said that this was the third time he had played the Opry, but it was the first for Wayne Holcomb, as the two travelled from Georgia to perform at the Shepherd Hill Opry.

Clay Holmes said that he had not been singing gospel for very

long, but had became very fond of playing at the Opry during the past few years. "I've always played guitar for as long as I can remember, but I never got serious with it until I got serious with Jesus," Holmes said. "I went through drugs and alcohol, lost every-thing I had. Jesus is faithful. He never left me, and he never forsaken me." Holmes said he was saved six years ago and had been traveling the south and playing the gospel ever since. He has two albums that have been released, titled 'Finding My Way Home' and 'Wind Of Change'. "I love Shepherd Hill Opry," said Holmes. "The Williamsons are wonderful people. They're true followers of Jesus, there's no doubt in that. They love to offer a place for people to sing about the Lord."

Holmes met Wayne Holcomb through the ministry, and the two became very good friends. It was Holmes who encouraged Holcomb to make the trip to perform at the Opry his very first time this past weekend. Holcomb had always been in the entertainment industry since his 20s, when he formed a band. "When I was almost 34 years old, I just bottomed out," said Holcomb. "I called on the Lord to help me and not leave me like I was; to help me be a good father; to help me be the right kind of husband." Holcomb said that it was only then that he truly gained enjoy-ment out of playing his music. "The Lord showed me that I could still love music and play music, and I could even come to places like this to play music."

Holcomb is pastor of Elko Baptist Church in Hawkinsville, and said that he was planning a trip to hear a gospel group perform at a church in Berry, Alabama when he was urged by Holmes to ride over with him and play the Opry. It
