Luke 13:1-9



"Some people told Jesus about the Galileans whose blood Pilate had mingled with the blood of their sacrifices. Jesus said to them in reply, "Do you think that because these Galileans suffered in this way they were greater sinners than all other Galileans? By no means! But I tell you, if you do not repent, you will all perish as they did! Or those eighteen people who were killed when the tower at Siloam fell on them—do you think they were more guilty than everyone else who lived in Jerusalem? By no means! But I tell you, if you do not repent, you will all perish as they did!" And he told them this parable: "There once was a person who had a fig tree planted in his orchard, and when he came in search of fruit on it but found none, he said to the gardener, 'For three years now I have come in search of fruit on this fig tree but have found none. So cut it down. Why should it exhaust the soil?' Pastor's Study Desk Notes



Dear St Anthony & St Pius Families,

3rd Sunday Lent

Year C

Luke 13:1-9

Why do bad things happen to good people? A perennial question for people of faith, is the question of why there is evil in the world that afflicts all of us! Why? Even if we refer to the 1st biblical example of how sin entered the world by our first parent Adam abusing his human freedom (Original Sin when Adam rejected God), we still might ask, "Why did God allow the serpent's evil presence to be in the garden to sour the sweetness of Paradise?" These are stimulating and foundational questions that express our God-given desire to know and discover God's purposeful meaning to creation— How does evil come about and how should we respond to it? One clear lesson of the Adam and Eve story is that accusatory 'BLAME' doesn't do anything to get us closer to the solution of the problem of evil. Adam blames Eve & Eve blames Serpent, and we all blame them to excuse our sinfulness!

Jesus does address this problem of evil in today's gospel (Luke 13:1-9) by recounting the human tragedies that would have been all the news in his time, of the terrifying tower collapse at Siloam that killed many, or of Pilate's slaughter of many innocent Galileans. I hear Jesus saying that everything is a 'teaching moment' or moment for good to triumph (think of how natural disasters bring the best out of people by their good-hearted responses wit charity aid). Jesus insightfully points out that if we focus on shaming victims, quick to see them as 'guilty', then we ignore the reality of life's suffering (call to mercy within us) and we lose grace offered to us even in a 'bad situation'. Jesus addressed this same problem of evil in the world, in John's gospel (Jn 9:2-3), when Jesus was asked about the sad case of a man born blind. His apostles asked Him, "Rabbi, who sinned, this man or his parents, that he was born blind?" And Jesus answered wisely, "Neither he nor his parents sinned; but it is so that the works of God might be made visible through him." Of course, Jesus goes on to heal the man of his blindness, but Jesus was basically telling His apostles that a lot of other people were going to be offered 'sight' into the work/glory of God, by Jesus' encounter with the man. Not only was the blind man going to see, but Jesus was going to open all of our eyes to how God can bring even greater goodness from (out of) what seems a 'bad situation'! Confronting and coping with evil, requires taking a 'longer view' or a higher perspective to appreciate how the good ultimately overcomes evil.

Granted, it may not seem to bring any comforting resolution initially, but it all does come down to 'God's ways not being our ways' (Isiaah 55:8-9 & Matt 16:23) and that the providence of God befuddles our plans and humbles our pride. What do we know? Our frame of reference is so finite, and our judgement so conditioned on the moving marks of life. This is why Jesus says in today's gospel (Luke 13:2-5) "Do you think that because these people suffered in this way {that} they were greater sinners than all other Galileans? **By no means!** But I tell you, if you do not repent, you will all perish as they did." Jesus is saying that, every moment is an opportunity for us to find God's grace. Rather than shaming/blaming others, we need to put ourselves in their shoes ('there but for the grace of God, go I') and be grateful and respond with grace (compassion) ourselves. It is about the 'longer-view' of life and ultimately eternity!

Here's a great story that teaches us to be wisely patient and careful about assigning blame/evil/loss:

"A farmer had only one horse. One day, his horse ran away. His neighbors said, "I'm so sorry. Such bad news. You must be so upset." The man just said, "We'll see" A few days later, his horse came back with a wild horse following. The man and his son corralled the horse. His neighbors said, "Congratulations! Such good news. You must be so happy!" The man just said, "We'll see" The wild horse threw the man's only son, breaking both his legs. His neighbors said, "I'm so sorry. Such bad news. You must be so upset." The man just said, "We'll see" The Communist army came through the village to conscript every young man to fight in an unjust war, but due to the injury the farmer's son was spared. His neighbors said, "Congratulations! Such good news. You must be so happy!" The man just said, "We'll see"............

So, taking God's long-view and understanding the proper use of our human freedom, may be the ultimate answer to the problem of accounting for evil's presence in our world. As people of faith, we would say that Jesus provides a solution to evil, by His own life of trust in goodness, and of Him strongly accepting circumstances as they come, teaching us to respond to our circumstances by applying our own measure of will and good to each step. We'll see. Maybe, I don't know why I am suffering, but I trust that the Good God, that brought me here, will also take me there-to better things (or as we say "For the greater glory of God"-Greater Good that God has planned!)
