# Yizkor: We Will Remember

During our Shavuot service at 10:00 am on Sunday, June 9, we will focus our attention on remembering our loved ones who have passed away. This memorial prayer and section of the service is called "Yizkor," which means, "remember." Four times a year, on Yom Kippur, on the last day of Sukkot, on the last day of Passover, and on Shavuot, we gather together to formally remember those who helped shape us and make us who we are. And while we traditionally say kaddish for parents, we recite it also for anyone who we are

remembering. Yizkor allows us a few minutes in the craziness of our day to day lives to dedicate ourselves to remembering and mourning, to bring our loved ones to the front of our minds and perhaps even learn from them.

We are painfully aware that none of us knows the length of our days, that are lives are constantly hanging in the balance. All we can do is live the best life we can, fill our days with blessings, and be good to other people. That was definitely the case with a man you may have heard of named Dr. Randy Pausch who died in 2008 at the age of 47. Dr. Pausch was a gifted professor of computer science, Human Computer interaction and design at Carnegie Mellon University in Pittsburgh. He was an extremely accomplished person, even in his short life. He was most well known though, for a lecture he gave near the end of his life known as The Last Lecture. It is the custom in many universities for professors to deliver a lecture predicated on the idea that they have one more class to teach before they die, one more lesson to impart. They are to teach on matters that mean most to them and try to present what pieces of wisdom they would like to impart to the world.

For most professors and students it's more of an intellectual exercise, but for Randy Pausch it was as real as it gets. Carnegie Mellon had a tradition of asking professors to deliver their last lecture. But a short time before he was asked to participate he learned that his cancer had metastasized to his liver and he only had months to live. So, Randy decided to give the lecture that he called "Really Achieving your Childhood Dreams."

Four hundred people packed the hall to listen to the lecture. As of today, 19 million people have viewed it on youtube. The book has sold more than 5 million copies. If you haven't ever seen the video, spend some time on youtube this summer and watch it. The lecture and the speech read like a yizkor manual: When you think of me in the future, remember the following lessons. Randy Pausch lived every day of his life like it was his last and when that became a reality he lived even more. Here are a few examples of what he taught the students.

- Give yourself permission to dream and keep dreaming until the day of your death.
- Don't complain, just work harder.
- Look for the best in everybody. With enough time and patience people will show you their good sides. Almost everyone has a good side.
- Watch what people do and not what they say. Actions speak louder than words.
- Always say thank you and show a deep sense of gratitude
- Tell the truth all the time. It's an effective long-term strategy.
- Never give up. Climb over the brick walls of life.

There is so much to learn from Dr. Pausch's lecture. But perhaps the most salient question it asks us is, what do we want to impart to those who follow us? What are we doing with our lives that will survive us? When we leave this earth, how do we want to be remembered? Who will say yizkor for us when we're gone? May this lecture inspire us to make positive changes in our lives, to reach out to those who need us most.

I invite you to join us for our next Yizkor on Sunday, June 9 during the 10:00 am service. Join us in remembering those whom we love, spending a little time learning from those who have already departed this world.

Near the end of his lecture, Dr. Pausch talked about a head fake. His goal was not to teach people how to attain and achieve their dreams, but how to live their lives. "If you lead your life the right way, the karma will take care of itself. The dreams will come to you. Then, on his next to last slide, he wrote, "Have you figured out the second head fake?" He became emotional. "It's not for you, it's for my kids."

Summer is finally upon us, which means more visits to the library and our Netflix queues! Below are a few of my own recommendations - mostly, but not all with Jewish themes - that you might want to consider reading and watching this summer!

### **Books**

The Sacred Calling: Four Decades of Women in the Rabbinate ed. Rabbi Rebecca Schorr and Rabbi Alysa Graf

This inspiring anthology includes reflections and essays about the revolutionary impact of the ordination of women in the rabbinate in every aspect of Jewish life. Writers of all genders contribute to this celebration of four decades of women rabbis, including the first woman ordained in America, Rabbi Sally Preisand, who will be visiting Temple Beth Shalom as our Scholar in Residence this November. This is an excellent read in anticipation of her visit!

# The Cooking Gene

Michael Twitty

Twitty is a culinary and cultural historian, as well as the creator of the blog Afroculinaria, which he describes as "the first blog devoted to African American historic foodways and their legacies." In his memoir The Cooking Gene, Twitty explores his multifaceted identity - African American, white, Jewish and Southern - through the lens of cuisine and food culture. His memoir is not only a powerful statement on multiculturalism in America, but also contains several of Twitty's delicious family recipes.

### We Spoke Out: Comic Books and the Holocaust

Neal Adams, Rafael Medoff, and Craig Yoe

Today, our students grow up learning about the Holocaust in public school, religious school, and many other ways. But in the '50s-'70s, Holocaust events and stories were largely untold, even within the Jewish community (this began to change with the Eichmann trial). This fantastic anthology details the significant role comic books played in educating American teens about what happened during the Holocaust, including stories from Captain America, Batman, and the X-Men. Ever since Captain America, in his first cover, clocked Hitler in the jaw a year before Pearl Harbor, the comic book industry (pioneered by Jews) has been a medium of Jewish literature and gave a voice to these horrific events when there was largely silence. Includes an introduction and afterword by the late Stan Lee. Find it in our TBS library!

## TV shows

Love You. America

Both seasons streaming on Hulu.

Comedian Sarah Silverman's show is a combination of comedic monologues, interviews, and powerful moments of Silverman meeting with folks across America who have different views than her (including a family who, upon meeting Sarah, was also meeting a Jewish person for the first time). Silverman's goal isn't to convince people to change their minds, rather to spark a connection in spite of their differences. Segments on her show range from hilarious (faith leaders play the basketball game "Horse" to determine which religion is correct) to deeply personal (a segment on end of life planning for Sarah's father). Some of you may have a particular idea of Silverman from her previous work...I highly encourage you to try her show regardless!

### Patriot Act with Hasan Minhai

Watch the entire first season on Netflix and new episodes of the second season are available for streaming weekly on Sundays.

Of all the political comedy satire out there, Hasan Minhaj's Netflix show Patriot Act just might be my favorite. Minhaj is the first Muslim and second person of color to host such a show, and he focuses on important but often overlooked topics, including affirmative action, elections in India, and the state of the Amazon rainforest. His episode on Saudi Arabia was even censored in that country!

# Crazy Ex-Girlfriend

The first three seasons are available on Netflix (with the final season on CW's app)

Don't be fooled by the title! Crazy Ex-Girlfriend is a critically acclaimed show that portrays mental illness, sexuality, romance and parenting in a deeply thought-provoking and comedic way - and also through fantastic musical numbers. There is also a strong Jewish theme in the show as creators and writers Rachel Bloom and Aline Brosh McKenna are both Jewish, and Bloom also stars as protagonist Rebecca.

# For kids and kids at heart

Regina Persisted: An Untold Story

Rabbi Sandy Sasso and Margeaux Lucas

This fantastic children's book tells the story of Rabbi Regina Jonas, whose story has been tragically untold for over 40 years. In 1935, Jonas became the world's first ordained woman rabbi in Germany, but not before many years of teaching, leading and of course persisting, when the male rabbinate repeatedly turned her away. Though the book references the Nazis' rise to power, it is still more than appropriate for children (the book ends before Jonas' death in Auschwitz, explained in the afterword). Regina Persisted, written by the first female Reconstructionist rabbi, Rabbi Sandy Sasso, is an important opportunity for our children to know Jonas' story and the power of persistence.

# The Prince and the Dressmaker

Jen Wang


This gorgeous, heartwarming YA graphic novel follows Prince Sebastian, who has a secret – he loves wearing dresses. Sebastian employs a young gifted seamstress, Frances, to create dresses for him so that he can become the Lady Crystallia, who wows the crowds of Paris. Frances accepts Sebastian, but will his parents and his kingdom? The Prince and the Dressmaker is a wonderful romantic story for audiences of any age and gender with a beautiful and gentle message of accepting yourself and those whom you love. Includes a lovely behind the scenes section at the end by Wang encouraging young readers to create their own artistic works.

# Looking Back At The Religious School Year

The 5779 school year for the Kehillat Torah students has passed quickly. I can honestly say that I have enjoyed teaching every one of our students. I am pleased with the amount of repertoire the children have learned and the effort and enthusiasm they exhibited throughout the year.

The sixth graders met in the music room for thirty minutes each week to study Torah tropes. Each word of the Torah has a cantillation, or trope mark, that represents how to sing the word. There are 42 different Torah tropes and the class learned 19 of them over

the course of the year. The 19 tropes that I selected for the students to learn are the most commonly used tropes. Learning these musical tropes gives students a head start when they begin their training for their Bat or Bar Mitzvah. The Temple Beth Shalom B'nai Mitzvah tutors have already seen the benefits of this class for their students.

The sixth graders also participated in a partnership with 6th graders from the Remes School located in our sister city, Kafar Saba, Israel. We exchanged videos and letters. What a wonderful way to learn firsthand about Israeli culture.

Each Kindergarten through fourth grade class met once a week for 20 minutes. During that time we spent a lot of time preparing for their grade level Friday Night Shabbat Service. It is always a joy for the children to have the opportunity to make their family and friends proud of their hard work, accomplishments and involvement in Shabbat Services. During the last class of this year, each grade sang a part of all of the songs that they had learned during their Sunday School careers. After this review, each student told their favorite song. The results for the top two songs in each grade are:

Kindergarten: Tree of Life and Tumbalalaika First: Tree of Life and Tumbalalaika

Second: Am Yisrael Chai, Tree of Life and Alef Bet (3 way tie)

Third: Tree of Life, Love Adonai Your God and Alef Bet (2 way second place tie)

Fourth Wonderful Shabbos Sound and Tree of Life

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

Hopefully, a time when the pace of life slows down and you have time to catch up on activities that you treasure the most. We hope one of them is reading! Specifically, we hope that you have had a chance to read Temple Beth

Shalom's newly passed Strategic Plan.

You may have received a copy of TBS' new Strategic Plan at the Annual Meeting. If not, you will receive one in the mail in July. We hope that if you haven't had a chance to read it, that you will soon. Phil Goldstein, one of TBS' Trustees at Large was instrumental in drafting this Strategic Plan. We are beyond thankful to Phil who spent countless hours meeting with board members and congregants to draft a plan that will take us through the next 5 years at Temple. Thank you Phil!

If you attended the Annual Meeting, you heard detailed communication regarding The Strategic Plan. The Plan, has FIVE major areas of concentration:

- 1. Increase Member Engagement
- 2. Recruit New Members
- 3. Plan for the Long Term/Improve Financial Stability/Maintain ♂ Upgrade Facilities
- 4. Maintain High Quality of Education/Continue to Innovate, and
- 5. Engage More Congregants in TBS Social Action Initiatives

We would like to call your attention to a few highlights. Under "Increase Member Engagement", one of TBS' goals is to "create and implement a small group model." We have already rolled out many affinity groups and they are thriving. Another one of TBS' goals is to "continue to innovate Shabbat services." The Rabbis and lay leaders are already offering some alternative services, such as the healing service on Saturday mornings when there are no Bar/Bat Mitzvahs. Be on the lookout for additional upcoming alternative services, such a "pop-up" experiences in the future!

We would also like to point out the third component of the plan: "Plan for the Long Term/Improve Financial Stability/Maintain & Upgrade Facilities." We are in the process of identifying some of Temple's long-term needs and fundraising opportunities. This is an area of focus because we cannot support all that we do with our current sources of revenue. We will be rolling out a new voluntary "above and beyond" dues structure to better align with contributions and expenses. Hear more about these opportunities in the near future!

# B.R.E.A.D. Update

Twenty one members of TBS attended the Nehemiah Action in May and heard updates on issues that B.R.E.A.D. has been working on.

Highlights from the B.R.E.A.D. Nehemiah Action:

- 1. "Higher and Better Pay! Don't Throw Away!": On our jobs campaign, we celebrated that our work toward a worker-owned business in an inner city neighborhood has been awarded a \$58,000 grant through OSU Connect and Collaborate which will allow funding to partner with the Democracy Collaborative and 1/2 year funding for a full time coordinator!
- 2. <u>Juvenile Justice</u>: Columbus Public Schools will monitor the progress of the Restorative Practices Initiative, evaluate the program by the end of July 2019, and meet with BREAD quarterly beginning in August!
- 3. <u>Eldercare</u>: Lt. Matthew Parrish, Columbus Division of Fire agreed to meet with us following an evaluation of the pilot program. This program in the Columbus Fire Department connects a COAAA Social Worker to older adults who are frequently calling 911- many of whom are in vulnerable neighborhoods. He also agreed to exploring possible funding options, and to attend BREAD's Annual Assembly on November 11th. Joe Mazzola, Health Commissioner of Franklin County Public Health committed to co-lead a "Life Expectancy Task Force" with Director Michelle Missler from the Franklin County Office on Aging. He also agreed to strongly recommend that agencies at the July "Health Works Meeting" participate in this task force. The goal of this effort is to gather existing agencies to research the 27 year gap in life expectancy between neighborhoods and collaborate on evidence based solutions.
- 4. "Welcome Columbus": No Columbus City Councilmembers attended to commit to work with One ID Columbus to advance the ID program. The committee will continue to look for a new champion on Council. This champion would be expected to convene a meeting of stakeholders, develop a finance plan for the program, and introduce [the already drafted] legislation by the end of this year.
- 5. <u>"Families First and Housing Now"</u>: Columbus City Councilmember Favor agreed to work with us on a plan to encourage developers to set aside 20% of new units for families making LESS THAN \$42,000 a year. However, she did not agree to work to secure an additional \$5 million for the Trust Fund. BREAD leaders stood firm and we want to work to change that "no" into a "yes". We will meet with her in September in order to move forward.

# Typically Jewish Nancy Kalikow Maxwell

# **Typically Jewish**

Typically Jewish, by Nancy Kalikow Maxwell, is a delightful 2019 Jewish Publication Society addition to our literature. It is an enjoyable light read generously sprinkled with humor.

Maxwell takes us on a tour of the "things" that "typically" characterize, if not stereotype, the modern Jew. More than simply "things," it is the complex way Jews are commonly perceived to do "things" by both the Jewish and non-Jewish communities. Being both introspective and extrospec-

tive, the author often takes a position of gently poking a bit of fun at ourselves. She freely admits every Jew does not completely fit her characterizations and that her characterizations may manifest themselves in some non-Jews. After all, we are each a unique being and "typical" is Maxwell's operative word.

Maxwell examines the "things" by devoting a chapter to each of the following: worrying, kvelling, dying, noshing, laughing, detecting, dwelling, and joining. A familiar Yiddish word or expression is often part of her narrative helping to connect the "thing" to modern Jewish culture. For those unfamiliar with the Ashkenazic language, any Yiddish has a parenthetical English translation to aid understanding.

In the Kosher Bookworm's opinion, the most valuable part of the book may very well be the comprehensive Discussion Guide included at the end of the book. As an appendix, there are discussion guides for each of the chapters. The discussion guides have at least four intended usages:

- **♥** To stimulate talk between conversationalist having similar interests
- ♥ To supply a template for discussion among book club members
- ☼ To serve as a detailed curriculum for interactive adult education classes


