NOVEMBER MEETING

On November 17, eighteen Broomfield Spellbinders and one guest (David Spiro) gathered at Brunner FarmHouse for our monthly meeting. **Julie Toepper** opened the meeting by asking attendees to introduce themselves and to name their favorite Thanksgiving food.
