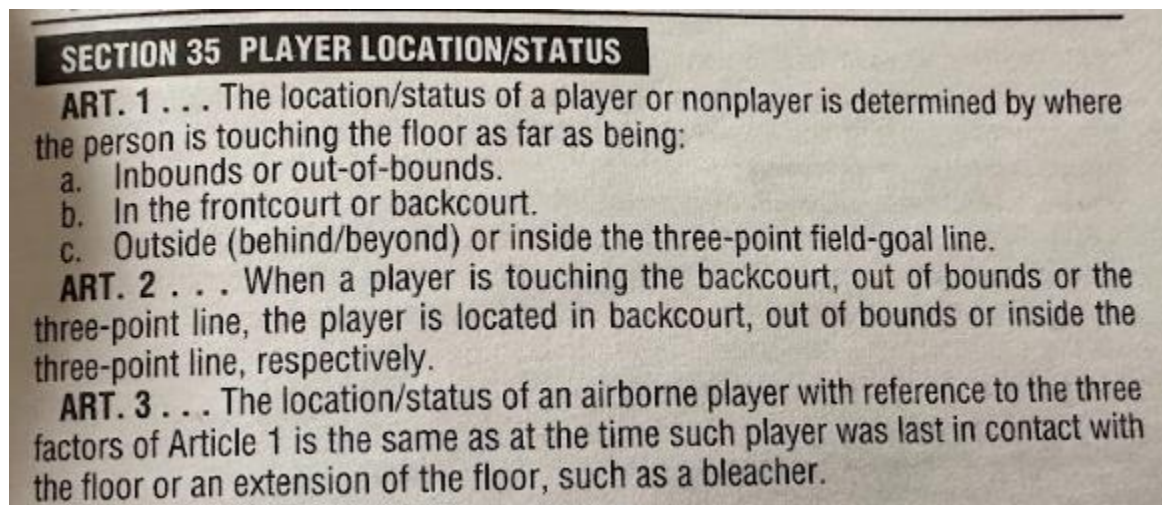


Good morning!

Player location has come up several times recently. Rule 4.3 is player location:



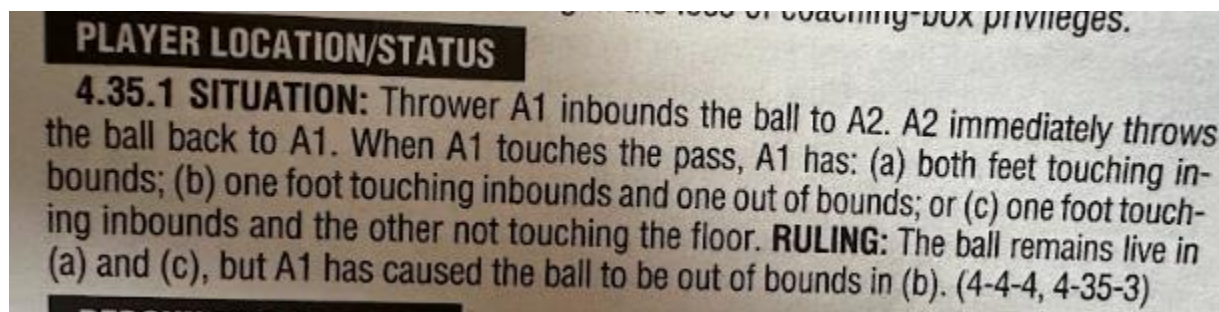
A very good official once said about player location that 'You are where you were till you get where you're going'. Think about it, very true!

Take a look at a play [here](#) (Thanks Jeremy Sabo for the clip).

In this play, the thrower passed the ball inbounds white 5, who in turn passes it back to the thrower. The problem is that the thrower jumped from OOB, caught the ball in the air, then landed inbounds. "She was OOB until she landed inbounds" so when she caught the ball, she still had OOB status.

What does it take to establish back inbounds? ONE FOOT inbounds and the other foot *not out of bounds*. Establishing inbounds does NOT require both feet to be on the floor inbounds.

Here is case play 4.35.1:



This is more verification that one foot in and the other not out is sufficient to establish inbounds!
