The Superstition Foothills are widely known for beautiful vistas, iconic flora and fauna, precious water resources and remarkable recreational opportunities.

However, the present resurgence of development and growth toward the south border of the Superstition Wilderness Area requires that we act NOW to save the functional ecosystem that gives rise to these very features.

Conserving the Superstition Foothills was the driving force for formation of the Superstition Area Land Trust (SALT) in the 1990's.

In recent years, we have focused on stewardship, education, outreach, and advocacy. Our Speakers Series, Trail Builders, Outreach Table, website (azsalt.org) and social media (www.facebook.com/azsalt/) have helped raise awareness of the need to conserve the open spaces that enhance our quality of life, boost our economy, and protect the fragile ecology of the desert.

However, SALT's ultimate objective is unchanged: to conserve the Superstition Foothills. And the only way to achieve this goal is to purchase as many acres as we can and convert them permanently to conservation lands.

As an all-volunteer 501 © (3) non-profit organization, our operating cost are low. However, our mission is both challenging and expensive.

While we have expenses related to production of trails guides and other educational materials, equipment for our trail building crew, insurance coverage, etc., our greatest challenge is to grow our land acquisition account.

We are aware of packages of private land within the Superstition Foothills footprint that are currently available, but we must greatly increase our land acquisition funds in order to make realistic bids for these and other parcels in the Superstition Foothills.
