



BY LAWS OF THE APOSTOLIC FAITH BIBLE COLLEGE, INC.

Article VII Doctrine

It is recognized that the true church of Jesus Christ consists of all believers who believe in the saving grace of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ and who have accepted Him as their personal Savior. It is recognized and agreed that no organization or man has been granted authority by the Lord to exclude from or accept anyone into the Kingdom of Heaven, as this is done by Jesus Christ only. It is further recognized and agreed that we as Christians are to love all members of the Body of Christ (Christians), and this love and fellowship derives from the unity instilled by the Holy Spirit. Although differences in doctrinal beliefs and interpretations should not influence our love for one another. adherence to similar doctrinal beliefs and modes of worship have bonded together those of the Apostolic Faith Movement as founded by Charles F. Parham in the early 1900's. The scripture teaches us to adhere to the truth and proper doctrine. The common doctrinal beliefs are essentially as follows.

- * Triune God; Father, Son, and Holy Spirit
- * Creation and Formation
- * Man is basically sinful and in need of salvation
- * Salvation by Grace upon repentance toward God and acceptance of Jesus Christ as one's personal Savior, which is the conception of Spiritual Life
- * Sanctification of the Spirit, Soul, and Body, A second definite work of Grace by the Lord Jesus Christ
- * Baptism of the Holy Spirit; evidenced by the speaking in other languages.
- * Water Baptism (of all believers) by immersion in water in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit
- * Sacrament of the Lord's Supper
- * Washing of feet
- * Divine Healing through Jesus Christ for all believers
- * Do not condone divorce and remarriage
- * Destruction of the wicked
- * Conditional Immortality
- * Rapture of the Man Child Class
- * Return of Jesus Christ to earth again; bodily and visibly
- * A ministry supported by tithes and offerings

These doctrines shall be adhered to in the teachings of the Apostolic Faith Bible College, which in addition to other doctrinal teaching approved by the Board from time to time if they are not inconsistent with the above listed basic doctrines.

God Remembers To Forget

On occasion I have been known to listen to "secular" music. Especially while driving long distances at night. I must admit to singing along with the performer of the music. One such performer recently captured my "talents". It was Barbara Streisand as she sang a 1973 favorite, *The Way We Were*. It wasn't necessarily the performer nor the melodious music that caught my attention, but the words: "Memories, like the corners of my mind, misty water-colored memories of the way we were. Scattered pictures, of the smiles we left behind, Smiles we gave to one another for the way we were".

One of the lines in the song then asks a very interesting question: "Can it be that it was all so simple then? Or has time re-written every line? If we had the chance to do it all again tell me, would we?could we?" Then finally, it concludes with: "memories may be beautiful and yet, what's too painful to remember we simply choose to forget." I confess I have no idea what that song alludes to nor have I seen the movie by the same name in which Barbara Streisand stars with Robert Redford. I am simply trying to make a very important point: Memories pleasant or painful are very important.

This was dramatically brought to my attention recently as I watched a dear friend of several years struggle with trying to remember events long past. My friend looked at me with eyes filled with forgetfulness as I gently tried to probe a mind that could not, at least at that moment, recall events we both had participated in. That certainly did not diminish my opinion of my friend, but only made me want to cherish such past events and friends even more.

It also made me think of my own memories. Like the time when I was only four years old and my sixty year old grandmother caught a horse that we had named "Sparkplug" and hoisted me up onto his back. She then directed me to ride "Sparkplug" over a high rail fence and she climbed up on the fence and then onto "Sparkplug's" back just behind me, and we rode out of the muddy orchard over to the house where she jumped off. Yes, memories are important because through good memories we can once again relive events that meant so much to us. Fortunately, when God created us He gave us the ability not only to remember good events, but like the song says "what's too painful to remember we simply choose to forget."

I wonder if that is what happens when God remembers to forget. Have we, as a human race, brought Him so much pain through our sinning that He simply chooses to forget all our sins? His forgetting sins probably ha alot more to do with His love for us, rather than the pain He feels. Yet, the Bible does teach us that Jesus suffered the pain of death for each of us. Nevertheless, God still chooses to forget our sin. For example, when we repent of our sins the Lord has promised, "Their sin I will remember no more" (Jeremiah 31:34 NKJV). I am so grateful that God has forgiven me of all my sins and that He has chosen, by His mercy and grace, to forget they ever occurred. I pray all who read this will find that same forgiveness, and experience the same gratefulness that fills my heart.

While God chooses to forget our sins, I am also very grateful that He remembers some things about us as well. One of my favorite Bible verses declares, "He remembers that we are dust" (Psalm 103:14 NKJV). In other words, God remembers that He is the creator and we are His creation. Although we are "fearfully and wonderfully made" (Psalm 139:14 KJV) and we should praise Him for His handiwork as the Psalmist did, we are still very much human, and God remembers that we are dust.

I have never been very fond of dust. And dusting furniture is not one of my favorite past times. However, occasionally, it requires attention. Not too long ago it required mine. As I dusted, first in one room and then another, I would pause and remember people and events associated in the receiving of each little trinket or picture. I finally got to the last bedroom. It is the bedroom that has Lavonda's cedar "hope chest" in it. The chest was given to Lavonda by her parents on her sixteenth birthday. I carefully and lovenly dusted the outside, then out of curiosity I opened the chest and for the first time in many years looked inside. I just never made a habit of looking in the "hope chest".

Inside the small box, which did not have a lid on it, I found the original, marble look-a-like, "ring box" with the words "Genuine, Keepsake Registered" on the lid. The word Keepsake was underlined. Also, underneath the ring box and inside the small white box I found the "Certificate of Registration and Guarantee" papers for the rings I had given to Lavonda when we were engaged on June 6, 1951. The certificate had been signed by Tony Drachenberg from Webb City, Missouri. Underneath the certificate papers was a little card with a picture of red roses on it with the words," "Roses for You" which was on the roses I also gave Lavonda that night. Lavonda had saved the "ring box, small card, and certificate safely in the "hope chest" all these years. Needless to say, a couple of tears ran slowly down my cheek and memories of the "way we were" flooded my mind.



I sat down on the bed and held the small ring box in my hand for several minutes and then got up and went to the book shelf close by and picked up my first preaching Bible. It is a worn-out, brown, real leather, KJV, Thompson Chain Reference Bible. Two pages in from the leather outside is a yellowed piece of paper held to the page by yellowed scotch tape with these words on it: "A little gift to remember June 6, 1951. To the sweetest guy I know". Underneath these words, signed in her beautiful handwriting, "Lavonda". As I looked at my Bible and the words Lavonda had written I thought, "I also did a little bit of saving."

And isn't that what God does through our Lord Jesus Christ? Maybe not just a little bit of saving, but a whole lot of saving. He takes us and places us in Christ, like that small, white, ring box and He saves us and keeps us and one of these days He will reveal us. We have the firstfruits of the Spirit, but dust still waiting for redemption. "The creature made subject to vanity, not willingly, but by reason of him who hath subjected the same in hope, because the creature itself also shall be delivered form the bondage of corruption into the glorious liberty of the children of God" (Romans 8:20-21 KJV). And He did it all for us because "God remembers to forget". If Satan keeps trying to harass you for past failures and sins, just remember that God has promised that, if you have repented, your sins are forgiven and He does not remember them. Thank Him for a completed salvation and the promise that He loves you, and will keep you safely in His "hope chest" until the redemption of our body (Romans 8:24 -25 KJV).

During the closing business meeting of the Apostolic Faith Bible College recently, Rev. Ted. Barker gave a recent report on the Retired Minister's Benevolence Fund. He shared that the purpose of the fund is to help retired ministers who have dedicated their lives in the spreading of the Gospel of Christ. Through this fund each one of us can say "Thank You" for a lifetime of service.

These funds are serviced through a special account at the Bank of Laverne, OK through the incorporation of the Laverne Trinity Faith Church. Sis. Willa Dean Johnston of Enid is the secretary and has done an excellent job. Every cent that is given to this fund goes to ministers and widows. There is no money taken for supplies or labor.







Rev. Wayne Wheeler - 1944-2013

Rev. Wayne Wheeler, D.D., 68, Carthage, MO went home to Jesus on April 20, 2013. Wayne passed away at his home following a courageous five-year battle with cancer.

Harold "Wayne" Wheeler was born on July 14, 1944 in Helena, AR to the late Doce Wheeler and Daris Horne Wheeler. Wayne was raised in the Assemblies of God and was saved at a young age. He was called to preach when he was 12 years old. he lived with his family in West Texas until entering the U.S. Navy on July 27, 1961.

In 1969 Wayne was introduced to the Apostolic Faith Church by his fiancée, Kay Cass. Wayne fondly remembered his 1st Baxter Springs, KS Campmeeting, and often said that the "Apostolic Faith" people seemed like a big family-"I loved how everyone knew each other and welcomed others in". Wayne's love for Kay and for the Apostolic



Returning to West Texas, Wayne pastored 3 Church of God churches. Then in 1981, he returned to Baxter Springs, KS and hung sheetrock in the new facility of the Bible College. In the fall of that year, he was asked to pastor his 1st Apostolic Faith Church in Taneyville, MO. He also pastored churches in Cave Springs, AR and Pine Hill AL. In 1991, Wayne was asked to pastor the Apostolic Faith Church in Prosperity, Mo. Bro. Wayne led that congregation faithfully for the next 20 years, touching many lives and winning hearts for his Savior. After retirement, he spent the last few years of his life as an evangelist as his health permitted.

Wayne greatly enjoyed being outdoors, especially when he was hunting, fishing and camping. He truly loved the mountains in Idaho and often said he would like to "live there in a log cabin, live off of the land and maybe, hunt bears."

He was a guitar player and enjoyed collecting guitars. In addition to his pastoral duties he also worked in construction and owned Wheeler Drywall for several years.

Wayne was preceded in death by his parents, a brother Jerry Wheeler and his father-in-law, Ed Cass. He is survived by his loving wife, Kay Wheeler of the home, mother-in-law, Alice Cass, Carthage,MO,, three daughters, Cassie (James) Shannon of Austin, TX; Jenny (Brian) Harris, Joplin,MO; Sabrina (Steve) Stockton, Granby,MO; two grandchildren, Trey and Lily Stockton; two sisters, Cherry (Jimmy) Milburn of Wichita Falls, TX, Pamela Thayer of Burkburnett, TX; two brothers, Charles (Karen) Wheeler of Denton, TX and Ted (Connie) Wheeler of Wichita Falls, TX. Wayne also leaves behind numerous nieces and nephews, other relatives and many friends who will miss him very much until the day of our reunion in Heaven.

A Memorial Service was held on April 26, 2013 at the First Nazarene Church in Carthage, MO with Rev. Randy Dalton, Rev. Brian Harris and Rev. J.R. Slater officiating. Interment was in the Missouri Veterans Cemetery in Springfield, MO.




and music. In 1963, while they were living in Dodge City, KS, Charles passed away at the age of 10. Soon after the family moved back to Wichita.

Interment was in Baxter Springs Cemetery, Baxter Springs, KS.







4-State Camp Grounds

The 4-State Apostolic Faith Camp Grounds has been in operation at the same location, just outside of Baxter Springs, KS, for over 50 years. In the last few years, repairs to the waterlines were made, a new cafeteria roof and air conditioning units for the cafeteria were installed. Vandals had stolen components of the old a/c units, but through your generous giving, like-new units were purchased before church camps were held on the grounds last summer (2012). Then in mid-September of 2012, it was discovered that once again the campgrounds had been vandalized. This time not only were the a/c units the target, but also wiring in the cafeteria attic and dorms as well as pots and pans stored in the locked walk-in cooler

were stolen. The loss has been estimated at just under \$35,000.00 to replace what was taken (including labor costs, but not including any upgrades). Members of area churches as well as Board of Trustees decided that the necessary repairs that needed to be done to host camps would not be able to be completed before the summer season got underway, so we sought out a place to rent for this year. This summer, youth camps will go on at the Midwest Campgrounds located close to Carl Junction, MO. Junior Camp will be under the direction of Jacob and Charity Oakes and be held June 12-15. Senior Camp will be conducted by Rex and Jana Eaton June 17-21. Camp Meeting will be held at the Apostolic Faith Bible College under the direction of Bill Waggoner.

The rented camp has similar accommodations (an outside tabernacle, snack shack, cafeteria, boy's dorm with separate bath-house) with a few exceptions (air conditioned dorms with a nurse's room, pre-campers room, and 2 bathrooms in the girl's dorm as well as a separate workers dorm with washer/dryer and bath facilities.)

We are looking forward to the Lord once again, blessing the students and children that attend this summer's youth camps and all those who will gather for Camp Meeting.

The current Board of Trustees for the 4-State Camp (Darrel Oakes, Rex Eaton & Brian Harris) are asking for your prayers for direction regarding the campgrounds in Baxter Springs, KS. Many important decisions will need to be made and we are seeking the Lord's wisdom and guidance in making these decisions. The Lord sees the future and can bring us revelation and insight on the path that we are to go as it pertains to our campgrounds. Please join us in praying for God's will to be done! Thank You!

We do thank the Lord and the trustees of the Midwest Camp for their generosity and sweet spirit as we work together to see young lives blessed. God truly never fails! May He richly bless them!
