Jim's Tech Tip Installing the Horn Rod

When installing the small C-clip on the end of the horn rod, use an old wooden yardstick or something similar up at the steering wheel end to hold the horn button down. Slip the yardstick under the wheel on one side, go over the horn button, then gently flex the yardstick and slip the end under the steering wheel on the opposite side. The yardstick will hold the rod down while you work at the other end, pushing up on the spider against the spring, and inserting the C-clip keeper.



OIL PUMP SPRING

Over the years I have seen altogether too many Model A engines with a bolt in the hole at the oil pump. These bolts were presumably installed not only to prevent oil loss but also to hold the oil pump in place - this is wrong! This hole has a 1/8" N.P.T. thread not a machine thread. The hole was originally fitted with a short 1/4" pipe plug with a screwdriver slot, much the same as the one supplied with some intake manifolds.

Red E. Power

There is a 3/8" N.F. set screw and lock nut in the side of the head to lock the distributor in place. Don't confuse the two situations.

The oil pump is to be held in place with a spring attached to the pump or in early models with the spring attached to the pan. The only situation tolerating a 3/8" N.F. bolt in the side of the block would be to hold the oil pump in place when installing the pan.

The bolt must be removed before starting the engine and replaced with the proper pipe plug. Failure to do this can cause the oil pump body to break.

The 1/4" pipe hole was put there to test the pump or to install fittings for an accessory oil pressure gauge.

"Overall Appearance"
What the Judges Look For

As an entrant and a judge, this area has a special "mystique" on how it is judged. "Overall Appearance" is the only area that has no "guidelines" as to what score a judge would put down. I'm hoping this article will take some of the mystery of how it is judged.

Overall Appearance, is judged in every category. It can be the determining factor for "Best of Show" or an Award of Excellence. It is the judge's <u>personal opinion/discretion</u> if the entrant looks like they stepped into the judging room during our Model A era. Here is how I judge this area and what I look for in the entrant.

As an entrant comes into the room, I immediately look for color, tones of fabrics, and is the outfit "complete" in my mind. Does the outfit require a hat, purse, coat, etc.? I'm not actually judging whether the individual areas are correct, but how the entrant has put together the <u>complete</u> outfit. Have they gone the extra "mile" with era style makeup, hair and nail polish?

The major garment determines how I judge if the entrant has put together their outfit in my mind. Assuming from the above picture, the entrant is a woman as a point of discussion. I would not give her full points because my eyes are drawn to the hat and its' color. It's too bright a color for the outfit worn by the entrant. If it's evening or daytime, did they add a wrap, coat, fur, etc., did they carry gloves, and the style of purse and shoes helps determine the score. Did she wear leather shoes with an evening dress, or did they wear an evening hat with a daytime dress. I next look at the fit and year the entrant has put on their entry form. If it's a 1928, is the hemline at or below the knee? If it's a 1930, is the hem at mid-calf. Length isn't the only area of concern. How tight is the bust and hip area? I'd deduct a point if it appears that the fabric is stretched in these areas. This is my opinion on what I look for in judging "Overall Appearance".
