

The Rector Writes

Dear Friends

Death, taxes and the certainties of Easter.

We all know what are said to be the only two certainties in life. Jesus mentioned one of them quite often, the dreaded taxes, and spoke about the other quite a bit, too, before experiencing a painful death himself.

But what about the uncertainties?

It strikes me that at the moment, every time we switch on the news, we are confronted with many huge uncertainties, wars in many parts of the world, climate change, who will be our next government to name but a few. I have absolutely no idea what the situation is going to be in the world or Parliament or Europe this month, or even this week. The uncertainties of life generally have a habit of making us worry: "What if I get passed over for that promotion, what am I going to do?", or "What if I get sick, what am I going to do?"

As human beings we seem to need a healthy balance between certainty in our life - the normal, routine stuff - and a bit of uncertainty to make life interesting and slightly unpredictable, so that we don't get bored by a constant routine. If everything in our lives is predictable, we often feel like we're stuck in a rut; but if everything is uncertain then we are anxious about the future.

So, with this huge political, economic and safety uncertainty hanging over us, how about I try and balance it with a bit of certainty?

Here's three certainties: on Palm Sunday we will be celebrating and remembering once again Jesus' entry into Jerusalem the week before he was finally arrested; on Good Friday we will gather and remember his death on the cross; and on Easter Sunday we will be gathering once again, but this time to celebrate Jesus' resurrection.

For me - as a Christian, as a priest - the resurrection, though I may not fully understand it, is up there in terms of its certainty along with "death and taxes". It is at the heart of my faith. I hope that you will be able to join us as we celebrate once again this incredible event. You will see from the calendar of events further on in the magazine that there is a lot going on between Palm Sunday and Easter Sunday. If you can't make any other service, please come and join us for the biggest celebration of the Church year: Easter Sunday 10.30am in St Mary's.

This reminds me of another certainty: there will be bacon rolls/cobs/baps - never quite sure what is the correct way of saying it here! -served at our 20 -20-20 service on Palm Sunday starting in the Old Chapel before we walk to the church for the rest of the service. Come along and enjoy one.

May I wish you all a peaceful, joy filled Easter.

MEMORIAL BENCHES, ST. MARY'S

Many of our readers will know that in St Mary's Alveley lower churchyard there are several seats which have been placed there as a memorial to someone who has passed away and is probably buried in the churchyard.

During a recent inspection some of these seats have been found to have become unsafe mainly due to rotting of the wooden seat bars. Because of safety issues, it is the intention to remove three seats from the churchyard. The three seats which have obviously become unfit for purpose are dedicated to Fred Reeve (1928-2005), Diane Knowles (Wife, Mom, Nan and Great Nan) and Rose Collins (9/9/1921 to 31/1/1989 donated by The Friends of St Mary's).

ALVELEY STROLLERS AND STRIDERS WALKING GROUP

I guess you'll have heard of the famous <u>Route 66</u> that was constructed nearly a century ago and ran across a huge part of America. Well what about **Route 45**, a little nearer home?

This, or should I say, **The Mercian Way**, is an award winning cycle network some 230 miles long, that runs from Chester to Salisbury, passing through our own Parish and onwards to Arley, via the Severn Valley Country Park.

(By the way, Chester has the oldest racecourse and largest amphitheatre in Britain, and Salisbury, the tallest Cathedral spire). Who knew?

The **Mercian Way** gets its name from the ancient kingdom of Mercia, circa 6th to 7th century, once ruled by Offa, the first man to claim the title, 'True King of England'.

Our walking group often walks some of this route. Although primarily set as a cycle route, it is also ideal for walkers. You will no doubt have seen the Anglo-Saxon cast iron marker post on the approach to the Miners' bridge just before crossing the Severn, depicting a warrior (see front cover), designed by Owen Thorpe. The lower half shield is more of an Iron-Age design. The helmet is a replica of one found at a burial site at Sutton Hoo in Suffolk. These were commissioned at various strategic points along the trail, the soldiers being on duty all year round, to ensure travellers can easily get their bearings. The route is also periodically indicated along the way with blue **Route 45** sign posts.

Walkers can enjoy some of Shropshire's most spectacular scenery by travelling the **Mercian Way**, along quiet rural lanes, including miles of off road tracks, lost worlds of riverside woods and meadows, far from the main roads and energetic pace of modern life.

Locally it gives you the opportunity, to walk alongside the majesty of the Severn Valley, with the steam trains as they pass alongside part of this route to Hampton Loade.

Intrigued to find out more? Why not try a section for yourself, in a safe and family friendly traffic free environment, or join us any Tuesday morning throughout the year, and explore some of this route, or any other wonderful tracks and paths within our area.

We meet just before 10am, for registration purposes, outside the Three Horse-shoes, Alveley.

If it's true that we are here to help others, what are the others doing here?

SEVERN VALLEY COUNTRY PARK

You may have seen a lot of activity happening in Spring Pieces Meadow recently. Our rangers and volunteers have been working to strengthen the hedgerow. The hedge was 17 foot in places and is being thinned down and then manipulated from the vertical to horizontal to form a strong, natural barrier. At certain times of the year the fields will have sheep grazing in them (as part of the traditional hay meadow management practices) so the improved fence will help keep the sheep where they are supposed to be! If the work isn't completed by March, it will need to stop as we enter nesting season.

The brash from the hedge is then being burnt in our biochar kiln. This is a way of reducing carbon emissions in the air which occur during burning as oxygen is limited. The brash becomes biochar which can then be returned to the soil. It has already been used around the park in places where new trees have been planted. Burning in the kiln also protects the meadow itself, as the burning is contained to the kiln and doesn't happen directly on the ground.

During March, the café and visitor centre is open Wednesday to Sunday and from Monday 25th March to Sunday 7th April they will be open every day for the Easter holidays.

During Easter we'll have an Easter Pond Dip on Wednesday 27th March (11am-12.30pm) and a ranger-led Spring Scavenger Hunt on Wednesday 3rd April (11am-12.30pm). It's £4 per child, accompanying adults free. Call 01746 781 192 to book your place. We'll have a free self-led trail from Friday 29th March to Wednesday 3rd April. It will be spring-themed and available to collect when the visitor centre is open.

We look forward to welcoming you at the park as the weather improves.


We can guarantee that the music will be both moving and uplifting, so do please join us for the very best of "Music in Saint Mary's".

A HORSE LOAD (THE BUTTERCROSS, PART 3)

In 1155 Henry 11 granted land to three brothers, John, Hamo and Guy l'Estrange. Guy received the manor of Alveley by service of a half knight's fee. A knight's fee was a measure of land deemed sufficient to provide for a knight, his family and servants, but also to furnish himself and his retinue with horses and armour to fight for his overlord in battle. A knight's fee was between 1000 and 5000 acres, depending on location, the richness of the soil and any quarries or mills etc, but it could also include wasteland and woods. Henry 11 visited Bridgnorth in 1175 or 1176, possibly both. Guy l'Estrange was in attendance and he provided the castle with 92 horse cart loads of corn worth £9 0s 6d. (pre-decimal!), 120 hogs at a cost of £10 4shillings, 120 cheeses costing £2 6s 8d and 20 loads of salt worth 10 shillings. This must have been some barbeque! All this probably came from Guy's Alveley estate. Guy died in 1179 but not before founding St Marys.

Last year the pop star Rod Stewart offered to pay for 30 to 40 MRI scans. Bill and Melinda Gates have given millions to help medical science. This tradition (a little diminished of late) of a wealthy person wanting to help those less fortunate than themselves is not new. Guy's son and heir Ralph l'Estrange (born 1163) now took over the running of the manor and he decided to found a hospital in Bridgnorth for the relief of travellers skirting the great forestry of Morfe, which stretched from Alveley to Worfield and from the river Severn to near Claverley in the east. It was called the Hospital of Holy Trinity and St. John the Baptist and was located on the corner of St John Street and Mill Street, about where the car park of the Co-op and Marks and Spencer is today To help fund the hospital Ralph endowed it with three and a half virgates of land. A virgate was approximately 30 acres.

Does the Butter Cross mark this land? He also gave the hospital permission to take a daily horse cart load of dead wood from the Morfe forest which extended right down to where the Tesco petrol station is now. At the other end of Hospital Street in Bridgnorth was the leper hospital of St James, which was on the right immediately as you turn up the old Stourbridge road towards Aldi. It is first recorded in 1224 when the king granted the inmates a horse load of dead wood daily from the Morfe forest which adjoined it. This hospital was in existence until at least 1574.

And if you really want to live your history, on the outskirts of Codsall is a place called Colony Farm. Situated near to a sulphurous well believed to have curative properties, the farmhouse is called the leper house and one of the barns is for sale. (Rightmove). As you leave Wolverhampton from junction 2 of the M54 towards Telford, after you pass over the canal and then pass the house on the hill to your left glance quickly to your left and the leper house can be seen with it's many windows. The house was divided into many individual rooms each with a window for the privacy of the inmates.

SUSTAINABLE BRIDGNORTH

Our February meeting was a presentation from My Low Carbon on 'How to get discounted solar panels for your roof and help your community go green at the same time with a Community Donation Scheme'. The session was very informative covering the details behind solar PV including what determines the output (this can range from the orientation and tilt angle of your roof to its size, shading and the electrical capacity of panels), component parts, optional extras, planning and the economics. ALL IN THE MONTH OF MARCH

750 years ago, on 7th March 1274 St Thomas Aquinas, Italian Dominican friar, Catholic priest, philosopher, and theologian, died.

250 years ago, on 16th March 1774 Matthew Flinders, British navigator and cartographer, was born. He led the first inshore navigation of Australia, and was the first person to call the country by that name.

150 years ago, on 30th March 1874 Charles Lightoller, British naval officer, was born. He was Second Officer on the RMS Titanic, and the most senior member of the crew to survive the sinking in 1912. He was also a commanding officer in the Royal Navy during WW1, and took part (as a retired volunteer) in the Dunkirk evacuation in WW2.

125 years ago, on 6th March 1899 the German pharmaceutical company Bayer patented aspirin (acetylsalicylic acid).

100 years ago, on 25th March 1924 Greece became a republic. The monarchy was abolished, and the Second Hellenic Republic was proclaimed.

90 years ago, on 9^{th} March 1934 Yuri Gagarin, Soviet cosmonaut, was born. He was the first man in space. (Died 1968)

80 years ago, from 24th to 25th March 1944, the Great Escape took place. 76 Allied prisoners of war broke out of the Stalag Luft III prisoner-of-war camp near Sagan, Germany after digging three tunnels. Three of the prisoners escaped, 73 were recaptured, and 50 were executed. The event was dramatized in the film *The Great Escape*.

75 years ago, on 10th March 1949 the 1948 Arab-Israeli War ended. Israeli victory.

70 years ago, on 1st March 1954 the USA tested the most powerful nuclear device it has ever detonated – a thermonuclear hydrogen bomb codename Castle Bravo, at Bikini Atoll, in the Marshall Islands. Due to a design error, the 15-megaton blast was 2.5 times greater than expected, and caused extensive contamination, deaths, burns and birth defects.

65 years ago, on 9th March 1959 the Barbie doll was launched at the International Toy Fair in New York City. 9th March is Barbie's official birthday.

50 years ago, on 29th March 1974 the Terracotta Army was discovered in Shaanxi, China by a group of farmers who were digging a well. The 8,000 life-sized warriors, plus chariots and horses were buried with the first Emperor of China, Qin Shi Huang (247 BC 0 221 BC) to protect him in the afterlife.

30 years ago, on 12th March 1994 the first women priests in the Church of England were ordained.

25 years ago, 21st March 1999 Ernie Wise, British comedian and actor (Morecambe and Wise) died.



His memoirs made it easy for the family to prepare their funeral tribute. Perhaps it's something we should consider doing ourselves!

A happier side of funerals is that you meet up with friends and family you haven't seen since the last funeral! We reminisced about our child-hood haunts on Dartmoor and the fact that the Head Gardener and I revisited many of them last year. Cousin Jean, several years younger than me, kindly reminded everyone that when she was a girl I had held her dangling from a bridge over a canal - I was clearly a delightful youngster. I pointed out that I couldn't do that nowadays, adding quickly that it was more due to my increased age and decreased strength than her increased size!
