

The Rector writes

Dear Friends

As I sit in my study writing this letter I can see the trees beginning to wear their autumn colours but with many of the leaves already falling before they've really had time to change. For me autumn is both a beautiful and a sad time. In the midst of the beauty things are withering away and dying; winter is waiting in the wings. In late October you often start to get a sense that the coming winter means business – gales, fog, cold and frost are all likely to be part of the picture. Following a summer of many long, bright, sunny days, the days are definitely shorter, and the nights longer. Autumn is well and truly underway and some of us may not be looking forward to the dark cold winter nights ahead. Fortunately, there are highlights along the way such as Bonfire Night, Christmas Lights, Advent and Christmas. Imagine winter without those events. The winter months would be darker.

One person who turns darkness into light is Jesus, who said, "I am the Light of the World", which is a very strange thing for Jesus to say if you really think about it. What does he mean? It's not so much that Jesus magically changes everything or everybody, but it does mean that he is the beacon of all that is true and all that is right, and by keeping our eyes on him as he lights our way, we will be transformed, as more light fills our lives.

A public meeting has been arranged to discuss the results of the two recent community surveys and the way forward for the proposed new organisation. The meeting will be held on Wednesday October 23rd at Alveley Sports Club at 8.00pm.

SEVERN VALLEY COUNTRY PARK

Work to improve our play areas will have begun at the end of September. As the work happens, the play areas will be closed . For the 'Boat' play area, this will be from 23rd September. The 'Sand Pit' play area doesn't have a confirmed date yet, but it will be more towards the beginning of October. Both play areas will have fencing installed to provide an enclosed space for children to enjoy. Equipment in the 'Boat' Play area is being replaced. The type of the equipment will practically be like for like but the material used will be more durable and longer lasting. (And the roundabout should spin more smoothly!) The whole area will be covered in durable matting which will help combat how muddy the play area gets during winter. The 'Sand Pit' play area is going to have a top up of sand, the wooden posts in the middle of the sand will be removed and the basket swing will return.

The funding for this work has come from the UK Shared Prosperity Fund. This is part of the UK Government's Levelling Up scheme which is providing funding around the country to support improvements in community and place, local businesses and, people and skills. Elsewhere in the village the work, undertaken by the Rights of Way team, to improve some of the footpaths is also being funded this way.

Through October, the visitor centre and café will be open Wednesday to Sunday. For half term, (28th October to 2nd November), they will open every day. After half term we possibly may go straight to opening Friday, Saturday and Sunday only so keep an eye on our Facebook page or webpage for more details.

Our Wild Toddler sessions continue until 16th October, starting at 11a.m.. The themes for the sessions are Autumn (2nd Oct), Smells (9th Oct), and Halloween (16th Oct). It's £5.50 per toddler (younger siblings up to 18 months are free) and the price includes jam on toast and a squash. During half term, our ranger will be leading a 'Camouflage Fun and Shelter Building' session on Wed 30th October. It's £4.50 per child and accompanying adults are free. We are taking bookings for our Christmas Wreath Making sessions. This year there will be 4 sessions in total. SUSTAINABLE BRIDGNORTH

The AGM and Repair Cafe Presentation, in the very cosy Platform 10 at the rear of Our Green Shop (which was also open for viewing), provided good food for thought and created an interesting discussion. Repair Cafés are community-based initiatives where people come together to repair various items, such as electronics, clothing, furniture, and appliances, instead of discarding them. They save people money, reduce landfill, teach fast-disappearing mend and repair skills, and fix "non-usable items".

As I conclude my tenure as Chair (and many other roles), I am proud of the milestones we have reached. Our grassroots efforts have empowered residents, businesses, and organisations to embrace sustainability, focusing on waste and energy reduction.

Notably, our #PreventPointlessPlastic campaign, launched in 2018, gained significant local support and media attention, leading to impactful changes in our community's approach to plastic use and resulted in Bridgnorth being accredited as a Plastic Free Community. As a result of that, we now have the community-owned 'Our Green Shop'. I also got my 15 seconds of fame on Midlands Today! The 2021 "Make One Change" initiative encouraged individuals to replace single-use plastics with sustainable alternatives, resulting in the potential reduction of 18,720 plastic bottles annually, which if laid end to end is the equivalent of 23 times the length of the Severn Valley Railway.

Our online conferences/webinars: 'A Wasteless Britain?' for Plastic Free July 2021 and 'From Global to Local - Positive Solutions for the Climate' for Plastic Free February 2022 were very informative and well-attended sessions. Additionally, our two Bridgnorth Green Festivals have been great platforms for raising awareness about environmental issues, showcasing local ecological groups, and businesses, and promoting sustainable practices.

I'm delighted to share that my contributions during my incumbency earned me the honour of being selected as a Baton Bearer for the 2022 Commonwealth Games Queen's Baton Relay. Additionally, I have twice been a finalist for the Environmental Professional of the Year Award and progressed from a chartered member to a fellow of the Chartered Institution of Water and Environmental Management (CIWEM).

While our achievements are commendable, the group continues to face challenges, particularly in securing volunteers and funding for future events. I would like to encourage community members to step forward and support our initiatives, ensuring that Sustainable Bridgnorth continues to thrive. Together, we can carry on making Bridgnorth and district a model for sustainability.

ALL IN THE MONTH OF OCTOBER

200 ago, on 21st October 1824, British mason, bricklayer and cement manufacturer Joseph Aspdin was granted a patent for Portland cement. His son William developed a stronger version and is regarded as the inventor of modern Portland cement.

175 years ago, on 17th October 1849, Frederic Chopin, Polish composer and piano virtuoso, died.

100 years ago, on 15th October 1924, the Statue of Liberty in New York Harbour, was designated a National Monument.

90 years ago, on 16th October 1934, the Long March took place. Chinese communists led by Mao Zedong began a year-long 8000 mile march from south-east China to north-west China to evade the armies of the Chinese National Party and establish a new base. It led to the founding of the People's Republic of China.

Also 90 years ago, on 24th October 1934, the earliest known recording of the song *Santa Claus is Comin' to Town'* was released. Performed by banjo player Harry Reser and his band and sung by Tom Stacks, it has since been recorded by more than 200 other artists.

65 years ago, on 11th October 1959, Britain began introducing postcodes. They began in Norwich and by 1974 had been rolled out across the whole country.

60 years ago, on 14th October 1964, American civil rights leader Martin Luther King Jr was awarded the Nobel Peace Prize for combatting racial inequality in the USA without violence.

50 years ago, on 2nd October 1974, US researchers announced that smoking cannabis causes lasting brain damage. More than 50 medical schools and research centres took part in the year-long government-funded study.

Also 50 years ago, on 9th October 1974, Oskar Schindler, Austria-Hungary born German businessman died. He saved more than 1100 Jews during the Holocaust by employing them in his factories. The story is told in the film *Schindler's List*.

40 years ago, on 12th October 1984, an IRA bomb exploded during the Conservative Party Conference at the Grand Hotel in Brighton, killing 5 people. Prime Minister Margaret Thatcher is believed to have been the primary target, but she escaped injury.

Also 40 years ago, on 16th October 1984, South African Anglican bishop Desmond Tutu won the Nobel Peace Prize for his role in the opposition to apartheid.

20 years ago, on 2nd October 2004, the first Parkrun was held in Bushy Park, London. Parkruns are now held every Saturday morning at more than 2000 locations in 22 countries - including Severn Valley Country Park in Alveley!







LITTLE GREEN MEN

Does anyone remember Mike Harding? He is a stand up comedian, singer and song writer and known for his poetry and writing. He became president of the Ramblers Association and now at the age of 79 is life vice-president of that organisation. As a comic most of his shows would be in an evening and he liked to spend his days exploring churches in the towns where he was staying. It was in these that he started to notice stone carvings. Gargoyles, symbols, strange animals, monsters and faces peering through leaves and foliage, often with vines or similar coming out of their mouths. They are called green men. Mike was also a keen traveller and noticed these green men appearing in many places around the world including Borneo, Kathmandu in Nepal and Dankhar in northern India. These would be Tibetan Buddhist temples.

They are also in Jain temples in New Delhi, India and in Ranakpur, Rajasthan. A bit nearer to home they are in the Rosslyn Chapel near Edinburgh, as seen in the film 'The DaVinci Code' starring Tom Hanks. In that Chapel there are said to be 103 images of green men but only one of Jesus!

They are in cathedrals including Beverley in Yorkshire and Exeter in Devon. Many churches in Shropshire also have them. A beautifully carved wooden head is on one of the misericords in Ludlow church. Misericords are fold-up seats used by the choir. A most unusual one is over the north door at Linley church between Bridgnorth and Broseley. The north door was often left open at baptisms so that any devils in the child would be driven out. The north side was facing the dark and it was believed that was where evil came from. The Linley green man is unusual in being one of the few full bodied ones, not just a head.

In terms of multiple carvings the real gem is Kilpeck church in Herefordshire and it is the carvings there that give us the Alveley connection. The sculptors at Kilpeck were from the Herefordshire school of Romanesque sculpture (1134-1155) and they covered the doorway and outside walls with the most wonderful monsters, serpents, animals, green men and Sheila-na-gigs. The parish magazine is probably not the place to discuss Sheila-na-gigs.

The former Bell Inn in Alveley, which is now a private house, contains 19 similar carvings by the same people. Among them are Sampson and the lion, a pelican, St Michael and the dragon, a Knight in foliage and two more dragons. They range from 8 inches square to approximately 2 feet square. They are not believed to be originally from this building but where they came from is not certain. They could have been in our church and then removed in one of the remodellings that St Mary's has undergone over the centuries. The period of these carvings (1134-1155) coincides with the building of St Mary's (1140-1180) Or they could have come from a now ruined Chapel at Romsley which was very near to the Manor house where Guy LeStrange lived. He was given the Manor and its lands by Henry the second and was the founder of St Mary's. His stone coffin is to the right of the main door.

St Mary's is notable for having almost no carvings or other embellishments but there is a Green man. It is not a very good one and it may be an unfinished carving but it is definitely a Green man. If you stand a few feet away from the vestry door you will see a stone pillar either side. At the top of the left hand pillar is a square stone and on the corner of this is a carving that has eyes, a nose and vines coming from it. It is not particularly easy to see. There are similar ones in a church in Huntington and one in Peterborough. These Green men are said to represent our unity with the natural world and were regarded by early Christians as representing the energy of life reborn in Christ. They were adopted by the early Church to symbolise Easter and the resurrection. Medieval legend has the tree of life growing from seeds planted in Adam's mouth.



THE BACK PAGE

If you should meet me in the near future you may find that I exude a healthy glow and wonder if I have been spending too much time in the sun. That's not too likely this year for sunshine has been here in fits and starts - though the Head Gardener and I did hit lucky with the weather during the last week of August when we were in sunny South Devon. (I was brought up a little further north on Dartmoor where we used to say 'Come to sunny Devon, where it rains six days out of seven).

The reason that I may have a ruddy hue is all down to tomatoes. We went to the R.H.S. Malvern Spring Show in May and I purchased three different varieties of tomato plants. They were planted in growbags outside the greenhouse and left on the solar automatic watering system while we were in France in May and June. They have produced a wonderful crop, but with the downside that the tomatoes have all appeared at the same time and so we have a glut.

Tomato chutney or pickle doesn't particularly appeal, despite the fact that a girlfriend, pre-Head Gardener I hasten to add, always used to call me 'pickle' - I have no idea why!

Buñol in Spain has a unique way of using its tomatoes, though it does seem rather extreme, a terrible waste of food and leaving a huge mess to clear up. La Tomatina Festival started the last Wednesday of August in 1945 when some young people spent time in the town square to attend the Giants and Big-Heads figures parade. One participant's Big-head fell off as a result of the festivities. The participants flew into a fit of rage, and began hitting everything in their path. There was a market stall of vegetables that fell victim to the fury of the crowd, as people started to pelt each other with tomatoes until the local forces ended the fruit battle. Events during the days before the fight include a paella contest near the town's square, tomato fireworks, and different music bands and parades around the medieval city centre. On Wednesday morning, the first event before the tomato battle is the "Palo Jabón", centred on a long greased pole with a piece of ham at its top. The goal is for participants to climb the pole and make the ham drop, which requires them to climb on each other. During this effort, other celebrants sing and dance in circles, and all participants are doused with water from hoses. Once the ham falls, the tomato battle commences. This year more than 23,000 people from 51 countries participated.

I think I'll stick to tomato soup, salads, tomatoes on toast and recipes from the Italian cook book - it's healthier and less wasteful!
