

Discontinuities in the trim elements and wall cladding suggest that the front gable portion was a later addition to a side-gabled, mossed-planned house with central brick chimney. The original block also has a single story, gabled wing attached to the western eave wall. Windows throughout the house are 2/2, | | 20. | 21. History and Significance This house was built c.1885 on land acquired from the George Kelley Estate, probably by Montgomery Lincoln. Born in 1848, Mr. Lincoln was the third son of Joseph and Zepporah Lincoln, farmers and fruit growers, who came to the island before 1860, from New York with their five children. 42. (Cont'd) double-hung with aluminum stormwindows, with the exception of a large two light fixed sash, Queen Anne style window in the front gable. Trim elements are limited to frieze, end and watertable boards. Other additions/alteratjions include an enclosed shed-roofed porch with jalousied windows on the rear wall and an aluminum awning over the front door.

43. (Cont'd.)

As a young man, Montgomery carried the mail between the island and Marblehead, and later worked as a quarryman for the KIL&T Co. In 1882, he married Elizabeth Mischler (aka Miskler), daughter of Elizabeth and Daniel Mischler, German immigrants who settled on the island before 1860. Elizabeth was born in 1863, on the island. Soon after their marriage they settled in this new house and raised their four daughters. Meda and Ellis worked as operators in the telephone exchange (ERI-1686), c.1924. Virginia and Olive were clerks in the General Store (ERI-1559). In addition to his work at the quarry, "Colonel" Lincoln had a small dairy barn, pasturing his cows in the lands south to the small quarry pond near the road, and sold the milk to hisneighbors. He also raised grapes, and trained horses.
