Windshield Wipers

Windshield wipers were first patented in 1903 by an Alabama woman, Mary Anderson. She was visiting New York, riding in a streetcar and it was snowing. She noted that the driver had to continually get out and clear the windshield, causing delays.

Anderson thought - What if there were some sort of blade that could wipe off the windshield without making the driver get out of the streetcar?

Back in Alabama she made a sketch of her device, wrote up a description and applied for a patent.

The patent application describes how the wiper was to be operated by a handle from the inside. She was awarded a patent on 11/10/1903.

Anderson tried to interest manufacturing firms in the device, but was turned down, one firm saying in part "we regret to state we do not consider it to be of commercial value".

As they say, the rest is history
