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Khadijah O. Miller, Ph.D. is a professor of Interdisciplinary Studies and chair of the Department of History and Interdisciplinary Studies at Norfolk State University. In this role she also provides oversight of the undecided/undeclared students at NSU and works across the University to support the online, military and accelerated programs in History and Interdisciplinary Studies. She has served in the role of department chair for 12 years, initially in 2007 for the Interdisciplinary Studies program until 2014, when History and Interdisciplinary Studies merged into one department.

Khadijah O. Miller serves as a member of the University's Quality Enhancement Plan (QEP) committee. She also serves as the chair of the University's Black History Month committee and supports year-long programming for the Honors College and other "months," including Women's History Month and Domestic Violence Awareness Month. She serves on many committees across the University including SACSCOC reaffirmation and accreditation, the advisory board for transfer students, Enrollment Management, and Academic Credits and Standards.

Khadijah O. Miller is a native of Brooklyn, New York. She received the Bachelor of Arts in Print Journalism from New York University, the Master of Arts in African American Studies, a Graduate Certificate in Women's Studies, and the Ph.D. in African American Studies with a focus on U.S. Black Women's History all from Temple University, Pennsylvania. Prior to joining NSU, she was director of the Women's Studies program and Women's Center at Rosemont College, Rosemont, Pennsylvania.

Her research interests include Black women's studies, African American studies and Interdisciplinarity. Khadijah has numerous academic and professional conference presentations as well as publications that include book chapters, peer-reviewed articles, and essays on online learning and teaching, and the interdisciplinary experiences of African American women.

She is the Vice President, Relations for the Association for Interdisciplinary Studies (AIS)—the oldest interdisciplinary studies program nationally and Historian for the Tidewater Branch of the National Association of University Women (NAUW). She has served as the Institutional Representative for the Virginia Network since 2016 and participated in the VA Network Senior Seminar in 2012-2013.
