ALSSAR working on patriot grave data base

Compatriots Gene Gravlee and Hoyt Smith are in the process of completing a data base to ensure Revolutionary War soldiers' and patriots' graves in Alabama will not be lost.

The pair are in the process of creating a Web site, but in the meantime are asking every ALS-SAR member to get involved with the project.

"We need for each member to assist in this project as it will take a team effort to complete," Gravlee said. "This project will be a part of the Graves Registration project now being led by Hoyt. We need as much of the following information and we realize all will not be available."

The following information is needed for every soldier's or patriot's grave site:

Last Name; First Name; Middle Name; Rank; Service; Birth Date; Death Date; County of Death; Cemetery buried in; City; Township-Range-Section where buried; GPS showing Latitude & Longitude; and Source.

"We can use all of the above information in order to make a more complete data base," Gravlee said. "I have used 'Owen's Revolutionary Soldiers in Alabama' as well as the DAR book and other sources. Please have them to forward this information via email for the present time."
