Instructions of a Father

There was a man who had four sons. He wanted his sons to learn not to judge things too quickly. So he sent them each on a quest, in turn, to go and look at a pear tree that was a great distance away.

The first son went in the winter, the second in the spring, the third in summer, and the youngest son in the fall.

When they had all gone and come back, the father called them together to describe what they had seen.

The first son said, "The tree was ugly, bent and twisted."

The second son said, "No - it was covered with green buds and full of promise."

The third son disagreed. He said, "The tree was covered with blossoms that smelled so sweet and looked so beautiful. It was the most graceful thing I had ever seen."

The last son disagreed with them all. He said, "The tree was ripe and drooping with fruit, full of life and fulfillment.

The father explained to his sons that they were all right, because they had each seen but only one season in the tree's life.

He told them that you cannot judge a tree, or a person, by only one season. The essence of who they are - and the pleasure, joy and love that come from that life - can only be measured at the end, when all the seasons are complete.

If you give up when it's winter, you will miss the promise of spring, the beauty of your summer, and the fulfillment of your fall.

Don't let the pain of one season destroy the joy of all the rest. Don't judge life by one difficult season. Persevere throughout the difficult patches and better times are sure to come some time or later. 1


In the middle of the street and on either side of the river, was the tree of life, which bore twelve fruits, each tree yielding its fruit every month... (Revelation 22:2)

The Acmar Community Quilt

According to Wikipedia, the Boy Scouts of America was founded in 1910, and since then, about 110 million Americans participated in BSA programs at some time in their lives. Most people are familiar with some of the basic principles that scouting was meant to teach like values, responsible citizenship, character development, and self-reliance through participation in a wide range of outdoor activities.



In addition to the many aspects of creating "communities" rather than just mining "camps", Alabama Fuel & Iron Company also sponsored Boy Scout troops. Lessons learned in scouting fit in well with DeBardeleben's emphasis on patriotism and self-sufficiency. The troop in Acmar was organized by Mr. R.C. McClain in 1938. The troop held their meetings in the Acmar Church.

In July of that year, the Acmar scouts hiked from Acmar to Margaret. There, they cooked out, played games, had contests and then hiked back home to Acmar. There were many activities shared between the two company sponsored troops. Acmar's youth baseball teams were also a part of the local Boy Scouts. Charlie DeBardeleben paid for the boys' "official" uniforms up front, and then the scouts did odd jobs around the community to make money and repaid the cost. The Acmar scouts' team



played against other company teams from Margaret, Overton, and anywhere else games could be arranged.

As times changed and the US moved toward war, the scouts were no longer meeting regularly. Several members of that original troop called the "Senior Platoon" went on to be serving in the Armed Forces during the war. They were: Lloyd Adams, Kent Adams, Elmer Alverson, Anon Bosworth Jr., Fulton Bosworth, Coy Bradshaw, Buel Clements, Harold Cole, Grady Davis, Clifton Eagan, Emmet Forehand, J.W. Forehand Jr., Coy Fulmer, Raymond Franks, James Alfred Hammock, Bobby Hyde, Grady Lovell, Clifton Minyard, Otis Moore Jr., Harold Newton, Charles Nix, Prentiss O'Barr, Eugene Prance, Miles Prance, Bud Phillips, Donald Richardson, Walter Rodgers, Frank Riley, George Smith Jr., Ray Smith, Burl Shirley, and Willard Tice.

In 1943, the Acmar Boy Scouts were reorganized by Mike Slovensky, who had served as Assistant Scoutmaster. Mike planned a full program of activities that he outlined for that summer, so the boy scouts could look forward to some real outings. In that June, they had a special Friday night camp out near Mine No 6, which was located near the White's Chapel community. That was just one of the campouts and camp experiences they shared. Neal Rodgers remembers that all his brothers were members of the Acmar Boy Scouts. He remembers going to Camp Arrowhead on the Coosa River east of Clanton. He stayed active in the scouts until his family moved to Talladega in 1945.
