## President's Report

The Literacy Volunteers of the Tarrytowns is celebrating its 36<sup>th</sup> year anniversary this year, after its founding in June, 1974.

A successful Annual Meeting was held on June 19, with the attendance of 29 members in person or by proxy. The meeting included the election of the Board of Directors for the 2010-2012 term. I welcome Marilyn Ghilardi as our new Secretary, Niamh Fitzgerald, Susan Lewis and Terry Sullivan as new Directors, and Susan Gitlitz as Community Representative. I would also like to thank Anne Cahill who retires from the Board after many years of service, past Secretary Carol Hagglund and past Community Representative Sr. Lynne Jacoby.

We currently have a total of 89 volunteer members, including 43 currently active tutors who tutor 45 students. In the past year we provided 1,783 hours of tutoring English as a Second Language (ESL) to 77 students; all tutoring was done by volunteer tutors, in 860 tutoring sessions. We also held two tutor

training workshops and trained 27 new ESL tutors. In addition to the tutoring, volunteers provided approximately another 800 hours of non-tutoring volunteer work.

#### Tutor for Two Hours a Week

In late 2009, the Directors created the Theodore and Lucille Hutchinson Student Attendance Certificate as an incentive for students to increase their learning time with LVT. The certificate is awarded to students with 16 or more classroom hours during a bi-monthly reporting period. Five certificates were awarded during the most recent (March-April) period. Although our experience with the certificates and other policies to increase attendance is still quite limited, these appear to be having a positive impact.

## The Work We Do -

After the holiday party, Mary Jane Driscoll got together with Barbara Breen and Sandy Mirsky as a follow-up to the Fall workshop. Barbara reported that after a brief period with her first student who had a busy life and a hard time showing up for tutoring sessions, she was assigned to a second student, a woman from the Dominican Republic who has been in the U.S. for 20 years. She works as a receptionist for a BOCES ESL program and manages to get by, but her English vocabulary is limited and her pronunciation needs help. Her goal is to pass the Civil Service exam so that she can work full time and get benefits. She is enthusiastic and would like to meet more than once a week for English lessons.

## Milestones

Joe Ambrose reports of his student: "Juana (Berta) Toyos, a student at LVT for the past five years, received her Bachelor of Arts degree from Mercy College on May 26. Berta, who is a native of the Dominican Republic, has a full-time job at the Kraft Foods testing facility in Tarrytown and attended school nights and weekends in order to obtain her degree. She lives in Tarrytown with her son Danny, who attends Sleepy Hollow High School. All of us at LVT are very proud of Berta's achievement."

## Best Plus Testing

It's time to have your student tested if you have not done so this year. We need to have all students tested with the Best Plus assessment in order to qualify for ALE grants. Sandy's student is a young man from Colombia who has been in the U.S. for 1.5 years. He is a college grad in electrical engineering. He needs conversational skills. He comes to lessons with an electronic dictionary and a computer. He writes on the computer and then Sandy helps him correct what he has written. His biggest problem now is finding a job. He has been studying for a commercial vehicle license and just passed four of the required tests in Spanish to get a bus driver job. Sandy says he is very

bright and motivated and they have been using the Voyager series of books to work on the proper use of prepositions like “on May 4th” and “in the month of May.”



On June 5<sup>th</sup>, Christine Pepe, Jane Berger and Mary Sands came together for the Spring workshop follow-up.

Christine is tutoring a young woman from the Dominican Republic who had “no English at all” and who has been in this country for one year. Her ESLOA test score is barely a level one. They meet twice a week for 1 hour. Christine says her student has such a great attitude – they both look forward to getting together. Her student brings her four-year-old daughter sometimes. Christine says her student wants to tell her stories in Spanish and Christine has to keep reminding her to try to speak English. They have worked on dialogues about topics like what do you put in your coffee? Her homework assignments have been to watch an English TV show.

Jane’s student is a young man from Nicaragua who tests at about a level two on the ESLOA. She says he works six days a week but still finds time to meet her two times a week for an hour or more. He is always on time and always has his homework completed. He tells her that he tries to watch TV but he thinks they speak too fast. He has found recreation in going to

the Set Back Inn where they have a pool table. He has played pool since he was 12 and enjoys playing there.

Jane has worked with her student on measurement – feet and yards. She says he listens carefully. They have also worked on tenses and have used English Line By Line. He speaks well on the phone now. On his first phone call with her he had to have his cousin speak for him. They have found ESL materials from the Warner Library collection useful – particularly an easy reader about rodeos. They have also been writing little dialogues and using them to practice “in” and “on.”

Mary’s student is a young man from Ecuador who is married and has two children. He has been here 12 years and has worked as a jack of all trades – in kitchens and as a groundsman. He is punctual, but he needed help leaving a voice message. She said there is a big difference between “I can come to class” and “I can’t come to class.” He reads and understands English, but needs help speaking. His boss speaks English. His goal is to become a citizen. Mary copies pages of the textbook they are using – The Salsa is Hot - and gives them to her student for homework. She says his nine-year-old son sometimes helps him do his homework. They meet twice a week for an hour or more. Mary tries to watch the same game show that her student watches with his family so that they can discuss it in their lesson. She has taped her student to help him hear himself. They work on pronunciation and then she tapes him again.
