

From May 2 to 6, students at St. Bridget Catholic School, in grades 4 to 8, will demonstrate their dramatic talents as they present the musical production of Beauty and the Beast Jr. This will be the school's tenth musical production since it was opened in 2004.

The rehearsals for the play started in October, and through their hard work in memorizing lines, songs, and choreography, the students will mount nine amazing performances. A total of 150 students are involved in the production as performers and backstage crew, which is about thirty percent of the school's population. There are two casts because of the huge number of students involved.

Matinees performances of Beauty and the Beast Jr. will be enjoyed by over 1600 elementary students from various schools in Durham Region. There will also be two evening performances for members of the community, one on Tuesday, May 3 and the other on Thursday, May 5, both starting at 7:00 pm. Tickets can be purchased at the school before the performance date or at the door the night of the performance.

According to Justin Pugelj, teacher and Co-Director of *Beauty* and the Beast Jr., putting on production like this is the result of many people. "This includes," he says, "teachers and staff, who put their hard work and patience into set building, choreography, or helping during the performance itself; parents, who help backstage, donate props for the play, provide or alter costumes and provide other support; and the students, whose hard work, determination, focus, courage, and enthusiasm will make this another wonderful production in the school's history."

M NOTICE OF PESTICIDE USE

Between May and October 2016, the Regional Municipality of Durham and the Ontario Ministry of Transportation will be conducting larviciding programs, under the authority of Durham Region's Medical Officer of Health, to control larval mosquitoes in order to prevent their development into vectors of West Nile virus.

The pellet and/or briquette formulation of the larvicide methoprene (Altosid - Registration No. 21809 and No. 27694 under the *Pest Control Products Act*, Canada), or the water soluble pouch formulation of the larvicide *Bacillus sphaericus* (VectoLex WSP - Registration No. 28009 under the *Pest Control Products Act*, Canada), will be placed into catch basins of storm drains in areas across the Regional Municipality of Durham.

The liquid and granular formulation of the larvicide *Bacillus thuringiensis subspecies israelensis* (Vectobac 1200L - Registration No. 21062 and Vectobac 200G - Registration No.18158 under the *Pest Control Products Act*, Canada) will be placed in temporary pools of standing water, ditches, and storm water retention ponds in areas throughout the Regional Municipality of Durham.

The granular formulation of the larvicide *Bacillus sphaericus* (VectoLex CG - Registration No. 28008 under the *Pest Control Products Act*, Canada) may be placed in sewage lagoons in areas across the Regional Municipality of Durham.

All larvicides will be applied by Ontario Ministry of the Environment and Climate Change licensed applicators or trained technicians.




the bronze medal in 200m Individual Medley and swam to a top 8 finish in the 100m freestyle.

Whitby Town Council Update **By Derrick Gleed, Regional Councillor**



There has been a lot of activitv at Council over the past couple of weeks. A number of files that impact Brooklin were dealt with this past Monday evening, and several projects are moving forward.

A report of rural road speed limits came to Council. In particular, the speeds on Ashburn Road north of Columbus were revised. There has been a great deal of confusion as to the actual speed limits. Many people thought it was an 80km zone. In fact, the actual limit has been 50km for over ten years. The fact that it was not posted added to the confusion.

We have now finalized the speed limit, and it will be a posted 60km per hour zone from Town Line in the north all the way to south of the 407. This will allow for a consistent limit that is reasonable, and it will provide a safe environment for cyclists.

As a side note, I have reported previously that the Town is doing road work on Ashburn this year to improve its condition and to provide bike lanes. Further, the province has recently confirmed funding of \$325,000 towards our bike trail initiative. This will see the Ashburn Road bike lanes flow into the Heber Downs Conservation Area and then down through Cullen Central Park. Once complete, later this year, the trail will allow riders to go all the way to the lake and then proceed on the Waterfront Trail.

In addition to the Ashburn speed limit approval, the Operations staff will be coming to Council in June with a more detailed analysis and recommendations regarding the various rural roads in our community. With so much development over the years, these roads have seen a drastic increase in traffic. In many places, these roads were not designed to accept this volume, and, thus, there are serious safety and road damage issues to consider.

Speaking of roads, with spring comes our annual construction season. I am sure anyone travelling north on Baldwin through the downtown will have noticed a new construction zone. The Ministry of Transpor-

tation has undertaken to do the long-needed bridge refurbishment. It is a project that will take several months and obviously cause a fair degree of disruption. Unfortunately, it is one of those things that simply has to be done in order to maintain our infrastructure. The nice part is that the MTO is doing this now, under their budgetary structure, and

not after the Town assumes control of Baldwin.

Council approved the demolition of the buildings at 72 and 76 Baldwin this past Monday. You will soon see these structures come down and be replaced with a new development. We await the finalized site plan, but early indications are that the new structure will fit well with the vision of downtown Brooklin.

Finally, I would like to remind everyone that an election for the open North Ward seat on Council is scheduled for Thursday, June 16, 2016. Interested candidates have until the end of April to register with the Town Clerk's office.

For this by-election, the Town is introducing a new way to cast your vote. It is our first foray into online voting. You will have an entire week to cast your vote, and you can do so from home or anywhere else you have computer access. Other communities have been introducing this process, and it is our hope that it will be accepted well here so as to be available in our next general election, set for fall 2018. Please mark your calendar and be sure to cast a vote. Further information will be coming from the Town over the next weeks.

As we are now seeing sure signs of spring, let us put away the shovels and get out the rakes. This includes the annual spring park clean up this weekend in Brooklin. Let's all get together and make our community shine. See you this Saturday!



I look out the front door often. Neighbours who spot me must think me a modern day Gladys Kravitz, the woman constantly peeking through her front curtains on the show Bewitched.

I want to see what the birds are doing.

Mom and Dad bird show up regularly. I watch one feed them, another preen them.

Days pass by. Nights down to minus 7 and I wonder, will they be okay?

It warms up.

A new roof goes up behind us. I think of our cat Patty. She was terrified any time a house got a new roof. The constant hammering, the noise noise noise noise, as Dr. Seuss says, sent her scrambling beneath the green couch for cover all day.

I would lie on the carpet and reach in and pet her softly.

Though it betrays my housekeeping skills, I admit to finding tufts of Patty still, stuck to the bottom of one of her hiding places. She was sweet delicate taupes and tans too.

Gilbert sleeps. The noise doesn't seem to bother him.

The baby birds move from one side of our garden to the other. Now hidden amongst leafless branches. They meld into the back-ground.

We watch an episode from season one of *The X Files*. I find myself wandering constantly back to the front

The other baby wanders among the small rocks.

Ten minutes later, all is undisturbed again. I read that this is their most vulnerable time. Cats and other beasts that roam could find these somewhat helpless things on the ground.

I watch.

The next day at school, my son tells me he cannot carry both his trombone and his dirty soccer ball home at the same time. Not enough hands.

I offer to bring the ball home at lunch.

It is covered, caked in brown mud.

I immerse it in a soapy bowl outside and wipe at the dirt with a brush. A sparkling white ball emerges.

I am reminded of a boy I knew in university who told me that he never cleaned his ears two days in a row. In fact, he waited at least a week between cleans because then he had the satisfaction of truly cleaning a filthy ear.

I rest the ball on the grass for my son to spot as he arrives home.

Then I take a coffee out to the sunny front porch and sit above the resting babies. Sip and read and soak up some sun.

A column out front has started to disintegrate at the porch floor level. Salt and wet has worn away at mortar and brick. We have already bought new mortar, new bricks and my husband gets ready to work on Saturday morning.

"But the babies," I say.

He pries the railing away and then leaves it at that.

He will await the birds' departure.

It should take four days, I have read.

It has been four days.

He and my daughter clean out the back garden. The lilac bush has tiny buds. A tree from a neighbour is being pollinated by busy bees. Sheets hang on our line.

That evening, as we share a drink out front and watch the street, we notice only one baby now.

Later, the second one is gone.

The next morning, mortar mixed and ready for application, my husband comes out from the garage and sees two baby doves in the cherry tree by our rockway. He calls me outside and we gaze.

> They seem hesitant, yet less vulnerable now, ten feet up. Beautiful to look at. Bewitching, almost.

I still watch for them, even though they are gone.
