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The Rector writes

Dear Friends

The schools will be breaking up for their Summer holidays this month. What a variety of things people do for their holidays! It seems that nowadays practically everybody has a holiday, in fact some people seem to have several holidays a year.

When you go on your holiday, at home or abroad, you will always find a church, or many churches, nearby. If you are going abroad, go in and have a look at whatever church you can find. In the heat of the day it may be closed, but in the morning and in the evening you will find it open and services taking place. Find out what you can about it, and sit peacefully and quietly reflecting on why the Church is there.

If you are spending your holiday in England - why not do the same? Walk round the church, read and examine the gravestones if you are visiting a country or village church and churchyard. The stones are very interesting, they tell us much history, and many of them are most wonderfully carved.

Whichever church you visit, compare it with our churches in Alveley and Quatt. Look at the altar and its ornaments, and the colouring. Look at the pulpit and the lectern and the font.

These are the four essential pieces of furniture in our churches.

The font is near the door, where we are baptised, and so become members of God's family, starting our journey of faith. Then into the body of the church where we celebrate and worship God, onto the lectern, where we have the Bible read to us, and then to the pulpit where we have the Bible and our faith explained to us.

The chancel step is the next phase in our Christian journey, because it is there we are confirmed. So we are on our way to full membership of the church as we approach the altar (the Lord's Table), and kneeling at the altar rail we receive Holy Communion, the Lord's supper, as celebrated by Jesus and his disciples on the eve of his crucifixion.

Such is the common ground we find in all our churches. If you haven't visited your local church, either St Mary's Alveley or St Andrew's Quatt, I invite you to. Both churches are open daily.

I invite you, therefore, on your holidays be a church explorer, and see what you can learn, but always remember it is God's house you are visiting.

Never leave it without saying a prayer.

With the summer holidays approaching we have a number of events happening at the park, so now seems the perfect time to let you know about them.

NEW LIFE NEPAL SUPPORT TRUST

The last report I wrote for the Parish Magazine shared the disappointing news from our friends at New Life House in the far west of Nepal that the annual application to renew the licence for the orphanage had been refused by local officials. The result of this was that all the children had to leave the orphanage and be retuned to impoverished family members, if they could be located.

Early continuing contact with the children revealed some disturbing stories of lack of suitable clothing and footwear and in one case a child being housed in a small shed with holes in the roof. The family of the late Gyanu Pradhan who founded and ran the orphanage continued to support the children as best they could but some had been placed long and difficult journeys away from the orphanage.

In March 2024, the Dixon family, James, Janette and Sarah their daughter flew out to Nepal. On 9th June 2024, Janette, who is the Support Trust treasurer, and Sarah, also a trustee, visited St Mary's Alveley to give an update.

The orphanage has been reopened and rebranded as a hostel for young people in need providing food, safe accommodation and help with education costs. The hostel is called Sitkar Hostel and the first child has been enrolled. She is a seven-year-old whose parents cannot afford her education and food.

In addition to continuing support for Sitkar Hostel, the support trust is hoping to raise extra money to pay the fees for some of the older children who used to be at the orphanage and are now wanting to move on to further education. There is also a project to provide hostel residents with bicycles to use for the journey to and from school.

SUSTAINABLE BRIDGNORTH

Sustainable Bridgnorth are hoping to host a (hybrid) presentation on local Repair Cafés, to coincide with the AGM on 12th September at 7.30 p.m at St. John's Roman Catholic Church Hall, Bridgnorth. Our aim is to have representatives from Broseley (intending to run their first on Saturday 27th July), Ludlow (where a well-established Café operates), Highley (with upcoming information days on 15th June 11.30-13.00 Parish Hall and 6th July at the Carnival, Severn Centre, and aiming to start in September), and possibly a couple of others to talk about their experiences, successes, and challenges. These Repair Cafés play a crucial role in reducing landfill

and saving people money. If anyone is interested in initiating one in Alveley, we encourage you to join us at this event.

One of the problems we face on land, in our rivers and oceans is plastic pollution. When it comes to cutting down on plastic waste, studies indicate that individuals are interested in reducing single-use packaging, but often struggle to find access to re-usable options, with exceptions such as the affordable community refill stores like 'Our Green Shop'. Two possibilities are Deposit Return Schemes and Extended Producer Responsibility, which were promised by the Government back in 2019 but have continued to be postponed year after year. The implementation of a comprehensive 'all-in' Deposit Return Scheme could prevent at least 55% of plastic packaging on beaches and generally reduce overall littering. Extended Producer Responsibility should encourage producers to prioritise the production of reusable and refillable packaging.

It is crucial that the new government will take action and prioritise reuse and refill initiatives to stop unnecessary plastic usage and prevent pointless plastic. In this time of purdah, consider urging local parliamentary candidates to endorse mandatory 5% reuse targets by 2026 and 30% reusable packaging by 2030, as well as the adoption of Deposit Return Schemes and Extended Producer Responsibility to promote a circular economy. Will they support the right to repair legislation, and incentivise reuse and resource-efficient production?

A final ask. Keep supporting or start visiting 'Our Green Shop', now located at Waterloo Terrace in Bridgnorth High Town, and help to increase its customer base. It offers low-cost items as well as various zero waste alternatives, reducing packaging waste and serving the community, and we want to help ensure its survival.

NEWS FROM ALVELEY SCHOOL

April to June is always the busiest time of year at Alveley Primary School, and this year has been no exception. May and June are when we complete our statutory assessments in Years 6, 4, 1 and Reception. The whole of school have been working hard to ensure the year ends well, with all pupils reaching their potential in academic subjects. However, this is only one part of life at school and with the weather (in theory) improving and as the chance to use our outdoor spaces increases, Alveley really comes alive.

We have again been investing in our forest school area, developing an outdoor reading area complete with outdoor book cupboard, a water feature with solar power and new potting shed. The crops are all in for this season and the classes have enjoyed watering them each day while beginning to see them grow.

Pupils have had the opportunity to partake in several sporting competitions and we are proud to be entering our first team into the Oakengates athletics competition for the first time in many years.

Our oldest pupils have just returned from a 3-day residential trip to Blackwell Adventure, near Bromsgrove. They took part in kayaking, raft building, the zip wire, tree climbing, orienteering and many, many other activities. Despite the variable weather, the class had a wonderful time, and all came back very tired but very happy.

Elsewhere across school, our Year 1/2 class had the chance to visit the Craven Arms Mosque to learn more about the faith of Islam and how the Mosque meets the needs of those in the community. The class have also had a special visitor in from Severn Trent Water, who has helped them to understand the importance of conserving water. Year 3 and 4 will be going to visit a Hindu Mandir later in the term, and as part of their topic on 'Inventors and Inventions', spent a day at Enginuity in Telford, learning about famous local inventors and building buggies that they could then race!

Thanks to the generous support from Whittall Meadows Trust, we have been able to begin revamping reading areas in classes, building on the 'reading for pleasure' provision that we have tried so hard to embed more firmly across school. Thanks to support from The Howard Thompson Bequest, we have had a large, 5 metre-long timeline commissioned and fitted to our corridor. Not only does this timeline show key events chronologically sequenced across all of the areas of History that we study, it also has several local events, including the opening of Alveley Colliery and construction of St. Mary's Church placed on it.


We are excited about the Summer Fayre on July 6th, with our school playing a large part in both the preparations and events of the day.

NAMES

Names can be fascinating things and the hunt I had a month or so ago for the origin of Quatt and Quatford set me looking at other names around our parish. However, it did not turn out to be as simple as I had hoped. The more sources I looked at the more confusing it became. They frequently don't agree with one another and spelling was very fluid years ago, much like it is becoming now on social media. Some recent howlers I have seen include 'are' and 'our' being used for each other, 'accept ' and 'except' getting confused and it seems that 'there' 'their' and 'they're' are interchangeable. Let's hope I don't have any typos in this article.


So back to names. The first book I looked at had some straightforward examples. Harley between Much Wenlock and Cressage is from hares ley or field of hares. Tupsley, where our former vicar Nick Armstrong is minister, is tups ley or field of tups. Entire male sheep are rams but many farmers still call them tups. And so to our own parish. I thought Romsley would be Rams ley or field of Rams but not so. Romsley was Hrammeslege in Saxon times, which was possibly a man's name but most likely from the old English word hramsa which is wild garlic, so ley or field of wild garlic. Onto the three 'greens' Birds Green, Fenn Green and Turley Green. In Saxon times a Green was a clearing or pasture in a forest. So Birds Green is simply a field with many birds. Fenn Green, a place with a boggy or wet field. (think Cambridge or Norfolk fenns) but the books could not agree on Turley Green. It maybe from the old English 'pyrre' meaning dry field, possibly from Pori or Puri, a man's name but I think most likely from turf, which would mean a place with good grass.

And the name of our village? The Romans were big recorders and a lot of our very early history comes from Julius Caesar. He mentions Jesus and the Druids of Anglesea among many things. The Saxons that came after the Romans were not writers and we have just a few sources. Bede wrote 'a history of the English church and people ' in 731. Gildas in the 6th century wrote 'on the ruin of Britain' and in the early 890s King Alfred of Wessex compiled his Anglo Saxon chronicle, but it is considered unreliable. Then at long last the Domesday book ordered by William the Conquerer to see what was in the land he had just won. In 1086 it records our village as Alvidelege. In 1195 it is written as Aluitheleg and in a pipe roll in 1196 as Alfithelea. A pipe roll was a medieval government financial record kept so that they knew how much to tax people and farms. The village was also recorded as the Leah of AElfgyp at this time. (See what I mean about spellings?) All of the above are considered to be the name of a Saxon woman which is unusual. Why not a man's name? They were the powerful ones. The Lords. The nobles.

This brings us to one other possibility. The eldest daughter of King Alfred the Great (he that burnt the cakes) was named Aethelflaed and was born around 870. At the age of 16 she married one Aethelred and after King Alfred died in 899 they seem to have become one of the most successful King and Queen partnerships. When her husband died in 911 the Anglo-Saxon nobles agreed that Aethelflaed could become ruler in her own right. History records her as the Lady of the Mercians. She never

remarried, thus retaining all the power for herself. These powerful Anglo-Saxon women were sometimes used as mediators between warring factions where men could be considered too aggressive.

In 917 Aethelflaed and her army pushed eastward capturing Derby from the Vikings who then surrendered Leicester without a fight. Even York, the stronghold of the Vikings, promised to obey her. During her reign towns such as Stafford, Tamworth and our own Bridgnorth were fortified to secure roads and rivers. She died in 918 and was buried in Gloucester and would certainly have travelled through the lands bordering the river Severn many times. But was her name misspelt and corrupted until it eventually became Alveley? Your guess is as good as mine. *Roy Page.*

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
