Dear Aldersgate Family,

This month our worship series has centered on "Faith in the In-Between." Each of us knows what it feels like to live in those seasons where life is not quite what it used to be, and not yet what we hope it will become. The in-between can be uncomfortable,

uncertain, and even discouraging at times. But it is also the place where God does some of His most powerful work.

Throughout Scripture, we see God's people living in the in-between: Israel wandering in the wilderness, the disciples waiting in the Upper Room, and even our own journey of faith as we live between the "already" of Christ's resurrection and the "not yet" of His coming again. These stories remind us that the in-between is not wasted time, but it is sacred space where faith is stretched, patience is tested, and trust in God is deepened.

Here at Aldersgate, we too are in a season of the in-between. We are celebrating the roots of our history while also trusting God to grow new fruit for tomorrow. We are seeking revival and renewal, believing that the Spirit is still guiding us into fresh mission and deeper discipleship. And that means being willing to step outside of our comfort zones. Sometimes it may involve trying new things, or even doing things that we've seen other churches doing, but when we do it, it's not just a program, it becomes alive because it's us, God's people at Aldersgate, reaching our community in our own authentic way. True revival will never come from staying within the walls of the sanctuary; it comes when we carry Christ's love beyond them.

My prayer is that each of us will lean into this season with hope-filled faith, to trust that God is not only with us, but actively shaping us for His purposes. As Paul reminds us, "The one who began a good work among you will bring it to completion by the day of Jesus Christ" (Philippians 1:6).

So let us not grow weary in the waiting. Instead, let's walk forward together in faith, believing that even in the in-between, God is already at work, calling us to courage, creativity, and community.

And as we turn the page to September, I invite you to journey with us into a new series: "Lord, Teach Us to Pray." Together, we'll rediscover the power of prayer, not just as words we speak, but as a way of life that draws us deeper into God's presence and equips us to face the world with faith and boldness.



The **Neighborhood Widows' Bible Fellowship** is a wonderful group that meets in a home in our neighborhood every
Thursday from 10:00 am to 11:30 am.

During September, we will continue to study and discuss the book "Finding Peace at the End of Life, A Death Doula's Guide for Families and Caregivers" by Henry Fersko-Weiss. Most of us were familiar with birth doulas whose job it is to help mothers-to-be bring their babies into the world, but were unfamiliar with death doulas who help dving people and their families at the end of life. In the United States, almost 70% of all deaths still occur in hospitals and nursing homes. A growing number of Americans say that they strongly prefer dying at home. Our group was very intrigued by this idea. "This groundbreaking book encourages us to face our fears our fears and engage in an open, honest dialog about death. The author, a long-time death doula, helps the dying discover meaning in their lives, express that meaning in powerful and beautiful legacies, and plan for their final days with dignity. The doula approach to death emphasizes thoughtful planning for how the last days should look, sound, and feel, and ... calls for emotional and spiritual support for both the dying person and their loved ones."

Near the end of September, we plan to begin our study of "Widow to Widow" by Genevieve Davis Ginsburg. "This book explores every aspect of the challenges facing widows: Shock, grief, guilt and anger; Surviving the special days; Emptying his closet; Appliance repairs; Making decisions; Dating and sex; Money matters; Traveling and eating alone; Keeping a journal; Family relationships; Special needs of young widows; Special needs of widowers; Survival checklist; and How to start a support group."

I hope this message finds you well. As your treasurer, I want to share a brief update on our church's financial health.

Thanks to your generosity and careful budgeting, July ended on a positive note—our donations exceeded expenses by \$1,828.21. We're currently staying affoat due to reduced spending and the fact that we are not paying Conference Apportionments.

It's also important to acknowledge that if Aldersgate were to return to a full-time pastoral appointment and we no longer received rental income from the parsonage, we would face significant financial challenges.

That said, I have faith that with God's continued guidance and your unwavering support, we will keep moving forward together. Your dedication allows Aldersgate to grow, serve, and make a meaningful impact in our community. Please continue

to lift our church in prayer, and thank you for all the ways you give—seen and unseen.





A few months ago I was asked why do we use purple for lent, what do the Chrismon's mean? So since we have extra room this month, I found these three symbols on the church art online web site. Hope you find them interesting.



where the Communion elements are prepared and placed, reminding us of Jesus' sacrifice as the Lamb of God. In some churches, the altar looks more like a table, with open legwork. We remember that Jesus invites us into fellowship with God now and to the heavenly banquet for eternity. We place offerings on the altar to symbolize our sacrificial response to God's redeeming love.



Centuries later, when people wonder who Jesus is, his answers hint at his divinity: "I AM the light of the world; I AM the good shepherd; I AM the bread of life" and, perhaps most profoundly, "Before Abraham was, I AM" (John 8:58). On Pentecost, God's Holy Spirit comes upon the apostles as fire. Thus the burning bush is a powerful symbol of God's presence echoed through time.

PELICAN — In the Middle Ages, the pelican came to represent Jesus' sacrifice of his blood for the world. According to legend, a mother pelican, in times of famine, would pluck open her chest and feed her young with her own blood. An alternate myth was that she fed her

dying young with her blood to revive them, losing her own life in the process. The depiction of a pelican with a drop of blood on her chest is called "the pelican in her piety."



Have we become a Sunday only church??

When I am out on the road, I have the tendency to listen to talk radio. Recently I have stumbled on several pastors speaking about the same message-Sunday

only Christians.

Growing up, the churches in my neighborhood were open 24/7. You could walk in any time and sit in a pew and just pray or speak with the Lord. Unfortunately, in today's world we can not do that for security reasons.

But does that mean we only think about church on Sunday? Since the pandemic we have given up many of our ministries and missions and only meet on Sunday mornings. People have not returned to worship, young people are not interested in attending and young families are too busy with sports or other things.

The question is how do we restart some of our ministries? Maybe we have to find new ways to help in our community. We have to start looking outside the box for new ideas. If you have something that you have a passion for such as feeding others, collecting clothing for the homeless or just writing letters and cards to missed members, give it a try. Most missions only take two to begin and then others follow. Think about it.
