Class History

On November, 1948, we had the Junior Carnival. The carnival was more of a success than anyone had thought it would be. On February 19, 1948, we had our Junior play, "Everybody's Getting Married" and on March 19th of the same year, the Juniors and Seniors presented a Spanish play, "La Dama Del Alba" (Maid of the Dawn).

Since the two plays came so close together, we decided we needed a rest so we took a Junior-Senior Sneak Day on March 23. It was a beautiful day. We had a lot of trouble getting away from Mr. Fox (Giron), but finally in desperation, the girls escaped by distressing means while the boys led the principal a merry chase. By 10:30 a. m., we were all gathered at Evett's Drugstore and ready for a day of adventures. We went to Hop Canyon for our main destination. While there, some climbed mountains, others explored about and a couple of us got lost. We also visited Kelly and the GRAVEYARD! At the end of the day, we were all very tired but with memories in our hearts that would linger forever.

After that we had to settle down and make plans for our Junior-Senior banquet and prom that were to be held on April 16. We were ready by the specified day, the banquet being given at the high school home economics department and the prom at the gymnasium.

Now we came to the height of our education. We were now 6 proud Seniors. Still prouder when we received our class rings on November 16, 1948.

Our officers of the class were Ramon Salas, president; Paul Pino, vice-president; and Augustina Montano, secretary and treasurer. Our sponsor was again Mrs. Muriel Ingle.

The first thing we did was make a schedule of our activities for the whole coming year. We were granted concession to all the basketball games. We gave a Thanksgiving Dance on November 29. On December 3rd, we presented our Senior play, "The Nutt Family." The rest of our activities were cancelled.

In the middle of the year, through some misfortune, we were left without a sponsor. We then elected Miss Madie Yeates.

On March 2 we took a Junior-Senior Sneak Day. What fun!! We went to Water Canyon even though there was still quite a bit of snow up there. Snow balls were in order, of course, and we all had a splendid time.

Since our past has been so adventuresome, we hope our future will twice as exciting.





Remember Mary Tom and her "Tales from Texas"? How else could she have acquired the nickname of Texas?


You will remember Sonny Harris by the noise he didn't make instead of by the noise he did make. He did what he set out to do without noise.







THE FRESHMAN CLASS ACTIVITIES





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ROOSEVELT GRADE SCHOOL ACTIVITIES

Enrollment in Roosevelt Grade School reached three-hundred-fifty-two in the spring of 1949. A group of twenty-nine graduates planned special festivities for their commencement and ordered caps and gowns to wear instead of formal attire as had been the custom for some years. Work was departmentalized this year from the fifth through the eighth grades. Girls of the seventh and eighth were given an opportunity to study Home Economics and all Anglo-American students of those grades were given an introductory course in Spanish. A full Arts and Crafts program was carried out through all grades with Mr. Ray Smith teaching the upper grades and with lower grade teachers conducting their own classes.

Both the Midget and Calves basketball teams were coached by Mr. Ernest Garcia as Principal J. D. Stewart suffered a broken foot just as the season started and was unable to assume his duties as coach for the Calves team. In the Socorro County Tournament, the Midgets lost out in the first game, but the Calves gave a good account of themselves and brought home a fine trophy for having taken third place.

The P.T.A. helped grade school very much in two definite projects. The Visual Aids program--that of sponsoring moving pictures for instructional purposes--was greatly appreciated by both pupils and teachers. Pictures were requested by the various teachers and the lists were compiled and final orders made by Mr. Roy Ingle, director of the Visual Aids program in the schools. The other project in which the P.T.A. was very active was the mid-morning lunch program carried on in the lower grades. At the beginning, foods and juices of high vitamin content were served in co-operation with the Government Surplus Commodities program. On Jan. 31, 1949, the P.T.A. began supplying bi-weekly servings of milk and graham crackers in addition to the foods already being served. As a result of this program, fewer children were absent because of colds and other diseases and some children gained as much as five pounds in weight.

Aside from regular academic work, usual holiday programs and parties were held throughout the year. Home room teachers and Room Mothers were responsible for entertainment and refreshments on these occasions. In addition to these parties, the P.T.A. gave a free party each month to the grade having the most parents present at monthly meetings. The annual Christmas program was presented to an appreciative audience on Thursday evening, Dec. 24, 1948. Assembly programs were put on by students of grade school at Thanksgiving and Christmas times and on Washington's Birthday. Commencement was set for Thursday, May 12, 1949, at eight o'clock.



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S P O R T S

The Steers having lost two of last seasons lettermen and two in the early part of this year's season had a fair season of basketball overlooking the handicaps. The Steers won nine out of twenty-two games including the District Tournament.

The Steers opened up the basketball season of 48-49 with a good start. They played at Quemado defeating the Eagles 49-7. Coach Smith had for his starting lineup Paul Pino and Telesfor Chavez at the guard position, Solomon Armijo at the post, Hubert Larribas and Tommy Innerbichler as forwards. Using for the reserve team he had Ramon Salas and Bacilio Gomez as guards, Adan Montoya at the post, Pete Sanchez and Albert Montano as forwards. Hubert Larribas sparked off the Steers collecting a total of nineteen points. Paul Pino and Tommy Innerbichler staring at the defensive end.

On November 12, 1948, the Steers won their second victory at Reserve defeating them 31-24. Albert Montano replaced Hubert Larribas, who had recently dropped the team, at the forward position. In the reserves Robert Baca stepped into Montano's place.

Two weeks later the Steers went over to Mountainair to get their first defeat of the season, losing to Mountainair 40-44 in a two overtime thriller. Solomon Armijo received high honors collecting a score of eleven points. Albert Montano was runner up with ten points.

December 4, 1948, Magdalena played their first home game of the season in a return game with Quemado. The Steers defeated the Eagles 76-30. Solomon Armijo was high again with nineteen points and Ramon Salas was runner up with thirteen points.

The following week the Steers played another thriller at Grants coming out on the short end by a margin of two points, the score being 35-37. Armijo playing his last game was high once more with twelve points. Telesfor Chavez was runner-up with ten. Innerbichler stared at the rebounds and Montano and Pino at the defense, but this still wasn't enough to pull the Steers through to the lead.

On January 15, 1949, the Steers struggled through a game with Bernalillo. Having hard luck they were defeated by the Mustangs 23-33. Adan Montoya replaced Armijo, who had recently dropped the team, at the post position.

On the following week the Steers met their rival, Socorro, which was the game of the year. The Steers ran the Warriors ragged through the entire game but the Warriors squeezed through on the last few minutes of the game. Socorro won by four points 29-25. Chavez and Montano were high with seven points each, Montoya played a staring defensive game and Pino and Innerbichler played both a defensive and offensive game. That was enough to worry the Warriors ragged. The undefeated warriors almost saw their first defeat of the season with their rivals Magdalena.

January 21, the Steers went over to Albuquerque to play the Albuquerque Indians. The Steers getting off to a late start toward the end of the game checked the Indians and won by a close margin of two points. The score being 31-29. Chavez and Pino were high for the game, Chavez making fifteen and Pino making thirteen points. Montoya, Montano, and Innerbichler controlled the backboards and played good defensive ball.

On January 28 , Mountainair came over to play Magdalena their return game and again defeating the Steers by four points in another thriller. Montoya collecting twelve points was high point man.

On the return game of Grants the Steers again gave Grants a good fought game losing by seven points. Innerbichler not being able to play this game was replaced by Robert Baca , one of the reserves. Due to the handicap the Steers played an excellent game. Chavez was high with fourteen points and Montano was runner-up with eleven.

The next week the Steers broke a five-game losing streak by whipping Reserve 51-35. Chavez led the attack scoring twenty-two points, Innerbichler's fine ball handling and Montoya's controlling the backboards and Pino at his best in defensive ball.

On the next encounter the Steers played Estancia , losing to them by seven points the score being 45-52. Pino was high for the Steers with twenty points and Innerbichler with eleven , but this just wasn't enough to check the fast moving Estancia team.

February 18, 1949, the Steers once more played Quemado. This was the Steers next to the last game of the season. The Steers once more ran over the Quemado team. The score was 70-36. High point men were Chavez who led the Steers with eighteen points and Innerbichler who was runner-up with fifteen points.

The Steers played their last home game of the season with the Bruins from La Joya. The Steers were once again victorious taking La Joya by fourteen points, the score being 42-28. Innerbichler received high honors with eight points. Chavez and Montano tied for runner-up with each having seven points.

The Steers were now ready for the most important part of the entire season which was the District Three Basketball Tournament. The Steers managed to place and play in the semi-finals in the consolation bracket. Coach Smith made no changes in the starting line-up.




