Prelude Welcome

Jesus' Triumphal Entry into Jerusalem Mark 11.1-11

11 When they were approaching Jerusalem, at Bethphage and Bethany, near the Mount of Olives, he sent two of his disciples ² and said to them, "Go into the village ahead of you, and immediately as you enter it, you will find tied there a colt that has never been ridden; untie it and bring it. ³ If anyone says to you, 'Why are you doing this?' just say this, 'The Lord needs it and will send it back here immediately.'" ⁴ They went away and found a colt tied near a door, outside in the street. As they were untying it, ⁵ some of the bystanders said to them, "What are you doing, untying the colt?" ⁶ They told them what Jesus had said; and they allowed them to take it. ⁷ Then they brought the colt to Jesus and threw their cloaks on it; and he sat on it. ⁸ Many people spread their cloaks on the road, and others spread leafy branches that they had cut in the fields. ⁹ Then those who went ahead and those who followed were shouting, (Wave those green branches, hold your plants high! And shout it out together:)

"Hosanna!

Blessed is the one who comes in the name of the Lord!

¹⁰ Blessed is the coming kingdom of our ancestor David! Hosanna in the highest heaven!"

¹¹ Then he entered Jerusalem and went into the temple; and when he had looked around at everything, as it was already late, he went out to Bethany with the twelve.

You are holy, you are whole. You are always evermore than we ever understand. You are always at hand. Blessed are you coming here to your church in wine and bread, raised from soil, raised from dead. You are holy, you are wholeness, you are present. Let the cosmos praise you, Lord! Sing hosanna in the highest! Sing hosanna! Sing hosanna to our God!

We have seen that the stories of Jesus' healing ministry are filled words and deeds. When Jesus rides into Jerusalem, the people had hopes that Jesus would heal them from the oppressive system of Roman rule that they were living under. We know that the healing of Jesus was not confined to that moment in history, but even now Jesus offers a new way of life that is compassion for all, especially "the least."

As we head into the events of Holy Week, we have to look at sin. The healing that is forgiveness of sin and that sets us free to forgive ourselves and others is anchored and based in the events that we celebrate this week. The parade of compassionate power we celebrate today is united with another healing story that involves a very different parade. On this day we glorify God for beautiful words *and* works of wholeness and we ask for the courage to share that treasured beauty with others. We know there will still be pain, but we also know love will win.

Vessels, holy and whole, broken, needing the One Open, body and soul. Healer, come. (Sung twice, on the second time, all sing)

Leader: Beach glass begins as something whole and yet discarded. As it is tumbled by the sea, it is broken and polished until it becomes a treasured "mineral gem." We do not accept that suffering is necessary or God-given, but we accept that suffering is a part of life. When pain comes and brokenness enters our lives, Jesus reaches out to touch and remind us of the Treasure that we *all* are—worthy of new life in the midst of hopelessness.

Vessels, holy and whole, Broken, needing the One. Open, body and soul. Healer, come.

Prayer of Confession

We have approached confession each week in Lent by being open about our brokenness in order to begin the process of healing. Along the way we have acknowledged our need to restore our own Holy Vessels while attending to our role in the healing of the community and the world.

On this day, we remember how hard it is to move from thinking to doing.

Let us pray:

Forgiving God,

We have opened ourselves to healing and sometimes it is easier to pray nice prayers, than to do the hard work of putting into action what needs to happen.

Help us remember the sacred nature of the holy vessels that we are, fragile and so easily shattered and yet capable of transformation. Help us to see ourselves as you see us.

Help us to believe in our ability to change and heal as you believe in us. We acknowledge our need to restore, repair, renew your Holy Vessels: ourselves and our health: physical, emotional, and spiritual; the health of our communities, and the health of the beautiful planet on which we live.

Let us pray:

Help us, Healer.

Show us our strength. Forgive our inertia.

Move us to move one step at a time toward greater care for others and for the world you so love.

In this silence, we sense and acknowledge our yearning for wholeness.

Silence

Vessels, holy and whole, Broken, needing the One.

Word of Assurance and Forgiveness:

Throughout the season of Lent, we are contemplating the symbol of broken glass—sea (or beach) glass to be specific. Time and adversity make something beautiful out of what was once seen as ordinary and broken. It becomes a transformed and precious piece.

Jesus attended to those considered ordinary, broken, even those deemed unworthy.

Jesus attends to us.

Know this: You are never alone in the struggle.

No. Matter. What.

Jesus is on the journey with us.

Life's parade is not passing you by.

You are part of this Body of Christ, a community seeking healing.

For you, for me, for all.

In the name of Jesus Christ, you are forgiven.

In the name of Jesus Christ, you are forgiven.

Glory to God. Amen.

Prayer of the day: Everlasting God, in your endless love for the human race you sent our Lord Jesus Christ to take on our nature and to suffer death on the cross. First Reading: Isaiah 50:4-9a

⁴The Lord GoD has given me the tongue of a teacher, that I may know how to sustain the weary with a word. Morning by morning he wakens— wakens my ear to listen as those who are taught. ⁵The Lord GoD has opened my ear, and I was not rebellious, I did not turn backward. ⁶I gave my back to those who struck me, and my cheeks to those who pulled out the beard; I did not hide my face from insult and spitting. ⁷The Lord GoD helps me; therefore I have not been disgraced; therefore I have set my face like flint, and I know that I shall not be put to shame; ⁸he who vindicates me is near. Who will contend with me? Let us stand up together. Who are my adversaries? Let them confront me. ⁹It is the Lord GoD who helps me; who will declare me guilty? All of them will wear out like a garment; the moth will eat them up.

And after getting into a boat he crossed the sea and came to his own town. And just then some people were carrying a paralyzed man lying on a bed. When Jesus saw their faith, he said to the paralytic, "Take heart, son; your sins are forgiven." Then some of the scribes said to themselves, "This man is blaspheming." But Jesus, perceiving their thoughts, said, "Why do you think evil in your hearts? For which is easier, to say, 'Your sins are forgiven, 'or to say, 'Stand up and walk'? But so that you may know that the Son of Man has authority on earth to forgive sins"—he then said to the paralytic—"Stand up, take your bed and go to your home." And he stood up and went to his home. When the crowds saw it, they were filled with awe, and they glorified God, who had given such authority to human beings.
