AMANA NEWS AND NOTES

AAG Haus Tour Dec. 6 and 7

How do you take an 1800s building and make it your home? That's the question charmingly answered in the upcoming Amana Arts Guild Holiday Haus Walk.

On Saturday, Dec. 6 open 10 - 4 p.m. and Sunday, Dec. 7 open noon - 4 p.m.

Four colony homes will be open to the public, plus the West Amana Blacksmithing Shop and the Arts Guild Folklife Center in High Amana where a pop-up art/ craft show will focus on Amana heritage artists who will be selling and making willow brooms and baskets, knitted hats, crochet work, tin ware and handwoven rugs. Be sure to stop by the Amana Arts Guild's new Gallery in Amana right across from the Visitor Center.

Hour tour ickets are \$20 (children under 10 are free). Your admission ticket is for both days and enters you into a raffle to win a handcrafted, three foot tall, Christmas pyramid for your home. Tickets may be purchased during the event at any of the homes or at the Amana Arts Guild Gallery, 619 46th Ave. in Amana or the Arts Guild Folklife Center, 1210 G. Street, High Amana.

The Myers Home at 23 220th Trail, Upper South Amana In 1883 the Chicago, Milwaukee and St Paul Railroad built a rail line one mile south of South Amana and "Upper South Amana" was born on this scenic hilltop.

The Amana Society built general store there which opened in 1885. The store was a retail destination for Iowa County and Johnson County residents as it sold groceries, housewares and Amana-made furniture along with factory - produced furniture from the "outside." The Upper South Store closed in the 1940s so the Amana Society converted the space into a huge commercial bakery baking and selling bread and baked goods to a wide market under the Amana Society Bakery label. In 2024 the Myers family purchased this 19,000 square foot building and wasted no time creating their home us-

ing every ounce of their considerable abilities and creative craft.

Rawson B and B and the Roads Home at 4424 V Street, Homestead. (We apologize for the spelling error two weeks ago.) This 1862 brick home is a stunning example of communal Amana residential architecture. The Roads family embrace every inch of it and have created the most charming country home which they decorate for Christmas with loving care and in great style. A magical country home that expresses the Roads' creative vision - it's comfy cozy yet elegantly appointed with period antiques and elegant touches. When they took on this home they had so much to do to make it their own and to create a thriving bed and breakfast - hear and see how the Roads family has transformed the house located just next door to the new Amana Folk Art Museum in Homestead into a photo op masterpiece.

The Brost Home, 705 E Street, West Amana The second oldest village among Amana's seven villages, West Amana was founded mere months after the village of Amana to give the community a western outpost to bust sod and begin farming here. That first winter was so bleak they slept in hastily constructed log and frame cabins with roofs that were no more than thin canvas. But within two years they had a block of sturdy homes built of sandstone quarried from a hillside just 1/4 mile away.

The Brost home built in 1858 is the oldest home on the tour. It was the original village bakery and for a short period it also served as the general store and cobbler shop for the new village. In 1998 Robert and Jill Brost bought the home and set about doing a full scale restoration paying close attention to the history of the structure. So much has been done to recreate and preserve the unique elements of this house including the vaulted ceiling and the original stone hearth. Serenely elegant this home exemplifies a thoughtful approach to design and contemporary living.

The McCarty Home, 2605 J. Street Middle Amana.

Built in 1888 on Middle Amana's "back street" this was the wagon shop for the village Middle and that made sense as it was located right next door to the Cooper shop where wagon wheels were made. During Amana's "Great Change" when the communal order was set aside the Trumpold family purchased the building and made it their family home for three generations. Today it is lovingly occupied by the McCarty family who have blended rustic, yet contemporary touches with the simplicity of Amana colony design. There are design elements that speak Amana, handcrafted furniture and art by local artists, plus treasured family pieces and so much holiday sparkle and joy in a home created by one of Amana's most celebrated designers, homeowner, Lyndsey McCarty.
