

Easter Explained

When Mary came to the tomb and discovered it empty, she became the first to proclaim Christ risen to her sibling disciples. This proclamation, "Christ is risen, He is risen indeed!" is an echo of her words down through the centuries. It is this moment of victory over death that we celebrate on Resurrection Sunday or Easter Day.

The term "Easter" dates back to the time of Bede. He identified the root of this word came from the goddess Eostre, for whom the month of April was called at that time. Bede translated it as "Paschal" which originally comes from the Greek via Hebrew to denote the Jewish festival of Passover. We, here in the USA, use the word "Easter" while most of the rest of the world uses the word "Pascha." Regardless of what we call this important day and season—it is all about the Resurrection of our Lord Jesus, the Messiah.

From the earliest church this festival became the most central expression or our faith. Luther stressed it in this way:

In Christ, suffering and triumphant, he has decisively asserted his Godhead in the midst of a hostile world; and in the Incarnate and Crucified Savior we behold the supreme majesty of that 'uncreated love, that is God.'

Jesus, who was arrested, abused, tried, convicted, and hung on a cross until he died, did not acquiesce to the powers of this world. The powers of earth only know violence and death. The power of God that is revealed in Jesus, is about peace and life! This is what we celebrate. This is why we sing Alleluias!

Though we celebrate an Easter Day, we also make it a full season. The season is marked by seven Sundays—to remind us that we have a new creation in Jesus. It begins with Easter Day and then Ends on Pentecost Sunday. "Pentecost" is derived from the Greek meaning "fiftieth."

Here at First Lutheran Church in Bothell, we adorn our space with flowers and white banners to signify this special season. You may have put a flower in our cross. This symbol is a way for us to take what was meant as a sign of oppression and death and to turn it into a witness to resurrection and victory. We give thanks for the work that is done for us through Jesus. It is truly a gift of Grace that we do not deserve or earn. Jesus says to us, you are mine and I am yours. Nothing can take that from us.

Peace be to you this Easter Season.





once you had not received mercy,



and the life of the world to come. Amen.





and the glory are yours, now and forever. Amen.


INVITATION TO COMMUNION

Come and know Christ, broken and poured out for you.


