Parish Membership: Every family and single adult to be considered active members of St. Bartholomew's Parish must be properly registered in the parish, receiving and regularly using the parish weekly donation envelopes. SHARING THE WATERS OF LIFE



Water is necessary for life. It is so essential that scientists search for its presence on other planets to determine whether they can support life. The Israelites were desperate for it when wandering in the desert. The well in Sychar had supplied water to residents going back to Jacob. This source of water had sustained life for generations. But Jesus raises the stakes on

the woman at the well. His source of water sustains life eternally.

Repeatedly Pope Francis has stressed the missionary character of the Church. The woman at the well typifies this character. She encounters Jesus, has a transformative experience, then drops everything to go tell her friends and neighbors. Her testimony bears fruit, as it leads them to go out, find Jesus, and convince him to stay. They begin to believe, but after hearing for themselves, they become convinced. Like living water, her faith in Jesus flows out from her to transform those around her.

In the passage from Exodus, God would have every right to punish the people. They were openly revolting against Moses, complaining that they were worse off than when they were enslaved. Instead, God gave them the water they needed to survive in the desert. Similarly, Jesus could have condemned the woman for repeatedly divorcing her husbands and now living with a sixth man outside marriage. Instead, he offers her living water. Neither the woman nor the Israelites deserved the life-giving water they were given. Nor did we do anything to deserve the life-giving waters of baptism. But, to paraphrase Paul, God gave us the waters of salvation while we were still sinners.

QUESTION OF THE WEEK:

What do I thirst for spiritually? Can I find sustenance in the life-giving water I have received? How can I share this living water with those around me?

SAINT PATRICK'S DAY—MARCH 17TH
ABOUT SAINT PATRICK

St. Patrick wasn't actually Irish. He was born to wealthy parents in Britain. St. Patrick was kidnapped at the age of 16 and brought to Ireland. His captors forced him to tend sheep in the mountainous Irish countryside. Just imagine how desolate and lonely it must have been for him. Remember, he was only 16 years old and used to a life of British wealth. At about 22 or 23 years old, St. Patrick returns to Britain. Legend says he escaped on a pirate ship.



After reuniting with his family, St. Patrick decides to dedicate himself to Christianity. He became a priest, after a vigorous 16 years of study. St. Patrick returned to Ireland to convert the Irish to Christians. You will see notes that a 'voice in his head' told him to convert the people of Ireland. As with many patron saints, he was apparently spoken to by God.

He's responsible for the Celtic cross, one of the symbols of Ireland. Familiar with the Irish culture, incorporating the sun, a powerful pagan symbol, into the Christian cross, helped the Irish adopt it. He used the clover leaf, with 3 leaves, to explain the Holy Trinity (another popular Irish symbol).

St. Patrick didn't drive literal snakes out of Ireland. He drove away the symbolic serpents representing evil in Christianity. Ireland never had any snakes; it's too cold.

Until the 1970s, St. Patrick's Day was a minor celebration of the patron saint of Ireland. Today it has become a celebration for all!!
